# Placards and applause greet Tommy Hunter

CBC Showcase featuring Tommy Hunter, The Rhythmn Pals, the Allan Sisters and Daniele Dorice accompanied by Max Ferguson and Allan McPhee arrived at Wabush Airport Saturday last, to a welcoming committee of approximately thirty poster-carrying residents.

The demonstration was to protest the quality of television and radio programming supplied by the CBC to Labrador West.

A spokesman for the demonstrators explained that they were not protesting against the arrival of the Tommy Hunter group, "But as this is as close as we get to CBC people, we would like for you to convey our dissatisfaction with services provided by the CBC, upon your return."

Many of the signs in evidence was: "CBC is for lovers...Labrador is unloved," "Mission Impossible.....Live TV for Labrador, Christmas comes twice a year to Labrador."

A spokesman for the CBC group said that they were aware

of the television and radio problems in the area.

The CBC Showcase group were visiting the area for a show Saturday afternoon in the Arena and to entertain at the Iron Ore Company of Canada annual party later that night.

Television service is provided to Labrador West and Schefferville areas by stations owned and operated by the Iron Ore Company of Canada, with the CBC providing programs on a delay basis of from one to eight weeks.

There was not even standing room in the Labrador City arena, as ticket holders lined up in zero-degree temperatures an hour or more before the doors opened, a spokesman for the group indicate that the applause received from the audience was tremendous, in fact he said he had not seen such enthusiasm before.

Tommy Hunter and the group will be leaving for Cyprus to entertain the Canadian troops stationed there with the United Nations peace-keeping force.



**FORTHAT BACK GARDEN** - Crosscut logs make fine paving blocks if you like an informal look on your terrace. They're nice to step on in bare feet or heels. And they can be set in concrete, sand or sod without much trouble. Have the lumberyard cut logs in sections three or four inches deep. Dig a trench almost the depth of the sections and set them on end as close together as you wish. Then fill in the trench with concrete, sand or topsoil. Allow wood tops to protrude a little but not enough to trip over. Wash them off with a hose. If you want sod between the logs sow seed so grass will be level with wood and the lawn mower can pass smoothly over the tops of both. For greater durability treat logs after they have been cut with wood preservative - (Barbara Barnes).

## Replacing "The Pill"

Concerned with the potential hazards of the Pill, U.S. Government scientists are seeking safer methods of birth control. Researchers at the National Institutes of Health, aided by the drug industry and the universities, hope within a few years to come up with a variety of safe but sure alternatives to the oral contraceptives now used by more than five million American women. These pills contain powerful synthetic sex hormones that suppress the female reproductive cycle and effectively prevent conception. But the pills also pose the risk of such serious side effects as fatal blood clots.

One possibility raised by NIH is a "modern male contraceptive" that would remove the responsibility from the woman and yet have no lasting effects on male sexual functions.

Along with safety, convenience is a prime objective. The experts are eager to explore such imaginative antifertility approaches as a "morning - after" pill to block conception following sexual intercourse rather than before and a "once - a - month" pill to furnish longer lasting protection and avoid the daily habit of drug taking now needed.

Headquarters for the Government's new contraceptive program is NIH's recently established Centre for Population Research. The center has a broad mandate to undertake behavioral as well as biological studies, but for now most of its money and manpower are going for birth control.

Within the next year or so, the centre expects to award contracts totalling more than \$5 million for research on new contraceptives. The first batch will be announced any day now. Initially university and other non - profit researchers will get the bulk of the business, but eventually NIH hopes to involve many of the major drug houses. Some drug firms are already carrying on intensive research on new contraceptives.

"Large doses of the pills seem to affect every part of the body," says an NIH expert. The most serious known danger is that of blood clots that inflame the veins and, if lodged in the lungs, cause death. The incidence of such fatalities among pill - taking women is slight but substantially higher than among women who don't use pills. The Food and Drug Administration requires that the manufacturers warn on their package labels that deaths and disability from blood - clotting run seven to ten times higher for pill - takers.

Most of the advances so far in birth control technology have come from non - Government sources. One promising development now on the horizon, the "mini - pill", was pioneered by the Population Council, which focuses on family planning abroad. This pill is an oral contraceptive that contains only one hormone, progesterone, in very small doses. Current birth - control pills contain larger amounts of both estrogen, which is believed to cause most or all of the side effects, and progesterone.

Instead of blocking ovulation, the mini - pill is thought to exert a localized antifertility effect, perhaps making the woman's cervix impervious to sperm penetration. While less sure than the most effective birth - control pills now in use, the mini - pill does promise increased safety. "We'll all breathe a lot easier with it," says one expert. Syntex is likely to be the first on the market with the mini - pill; Mead Johnson and Wyeth Laboratories are also working on such products.

The Population Council is carrying the mini - dose a step further by attempting to develop a version to be implanted under the skin. A small capsule would slowly diffuse the drug into the body, furnishing protection for a year or more, and permitting a further dramatic reduction in dosage. The Federal officials argue that Government leadership is essential to get results fast enough. At any rate, Congress' interest in family planning is high, and the Population Research Center's activities are likely to expand in the years to come.

Safety is one of the major motivations for pushing ahead. Besides the hazards of blood clots, some experts suspect the present pills' estrogen component may increase the possibility of breast and cervical cancer, though long term follow - up will be needed to prove or disprove this suspicion. An effort will also be made to explore the frequency of strokes among pill - users.

## Here 'n' there

**FOREIGN INVESTMENT:** Net investment of the United States in Canada rose about \$600 million to \$20.7 billion between 1967 and 1968, the U.S. Commerce Department reported recently. The increase occurred as total U.S. assets and investment in Canada climbed from \$29.4 billion to \$31.7 billion. Rather surprising, Canadian Investment in the U.S. rose from \$9.3 billion to \$11.0 billion.

**THE PRICE OF COFFEE:** For the second time since the end of August, General Foods Ltd., Toronto, has increased the wholesale price of its ground coffee. A 4 cents per pound advance, attributed to sharp rises in Central and South American coffee bean prices (30% since August), makes the wholesale price 7 cents higher than at the end of August. Instant coffee goes up less than a cent per ounce, wholesale.

**QUEBECAIR SOLD:** Control of Quebecair Inc. of Montreal is being sold by the Jules Brillant family of Rimouski, Que., to a group headed by Mr. Howard Webster of Montreal. Sogebry Ltd., a private investment company for the Brillant family, will sell its 97% holding in Quebecair to a new company that will be controlled by Imperial Trust Co., of Montreal. Mr. Webster is president of Imperial Trust and chairman of the Toronto Globe & Mail Ltd.

**THE HOT SEAT:** Nothing in the world is less inviting than a freezing car seat in winter. Anticipation of the impending chilling experience is enough to make you want to drive all the way home standing up. Now a U.S. company has a warming cushion for car seats which starts heating the instant you sit on it, and stops as soon as you get up. The gadget is called a "sit - on - stat". It becomes fully warm in 60 seconds and can be switched from high to low to maintain a gentle warmth. The unit plugs into the cigarette lighter, so the invention not only keeps your seat warm but it also prevents you from smoking.

**HAPPY VALLEY:** From its beginning in September

1943, the town of Happy Valley has expanded to a population of 6,000 people. Today the amalgamated school system, which includes the civilian population on the base, operates 58 classrooms with a total student body of 1,545 while the Roman Catholic school has a student body of 529 in 22 classrooms. Both school boards operate buses for transportation of students.

**PROGRESS:** The news about pollution and spoilation of the countryside is not all bad. One in point is the successful attempt to rehabilitate a 250 - acre hillside area in British Columbia, from which six million tons of fill were taken for B.C. Hydro's Dams. The result was a vast sterile hole in the ground, resembling an open pit mine. CBA Engineering Ltd., of Vancouver, which designed the dam, last year started a reclamation program, in which seed and fertilizer were spread by aircraft over the barren ground. The mixture worked, and the ground is now covered by tall grass and is a feeding area for deer, game birds, bear, coyotes, fox and bobcat.

**SOMETHING TO CHEW ON - CHEAPER MEAT:** With just about everything else going up (mortgages, interest rates, cars, etc.,) There's good news at last for the consumer. Food

### Mind teasers

If Tom were to give away \$3.50 more than 3/8 of the number of dollars he has in his wallet, and this left him with \$2.50 more than 1/2 of his dollars, how many dollars has Tom in his wallet now?

ANSWER

\$48. Letting X equal his present number of dollars, form equation:  $3X/8$  plus 3.50 plus  $X/2$  plus 2.50 equals X. Solve for X.

If the rear wheels of a truck are 3 feet in diameter and are 5-1/4 feet apart, how many more revolutions will the outer wheel make in turning the truck around a circle of any size?

ANSWER

$3\frac{1}{2}$  more revolutions. Multiply  $5\frac{1}{4}$  by 2 to find how much greater the diameter of the circle described by the outer wheel is than that by the inner wheel. Multiply  $10\frac{1}{2}$  by  $22/7$  (pi); divide this result by the product of 3 and  $22/7$ .

Those expensive arrots and potatoes have been due to continuing government tariffs and fewer domestic suppliers, McKichan said. However you'll pay more for that cold this winter. Facial tissues rose 2% last month.

To turn on an appliance, the company says, a pronged probe is placed anywhere in the carpeting.

## Solve - a - crime

# Mining news

**NEW MINE FOR OUR AREA?** Quebec Cartier Mining Co., subsidiary of U.S. Steel Corp., is proceeding immediately with preliminary engineering and related studies for the development of its Mt. Wright iron ore property in Northeastern Quebec. The Mount Wright ore deposit is located about 75 miles northeast of the company's present Lac Jeannine mine at Gagnon, P.Q.

The area forms part of the Quebec - Labrador iron ore trough and is no more than about 25 miles southwest of Wabush Lake where Wabush Mines and Iron Ore Co. of Canada have large iron ore operations. The Mt. Wright project will be carried out over the next eight or nine months and will include additional investigation of the ore deposit, land surveys, soil testing, preliminary engineering design for iron ore mining, concentration, transportation, handling and other related facilities. This recent announcement by the company indicates that it is very seriously considering Mt. Wright as an important future source of iron ore.

Quebec Cartier is now producing high grade concentrates (about 65% iron) from its Lac Jeannine mine at an annual rate of 9,000,000 long tons. This involves the mining of over 22 million tons of ore per year. When brought into production eight years ago the deposit was estimated to have an open pit life of around 15 years. But, the company had a half dozen other deposits in the district, including Mount Wright, which is very much bigger. Because of the limited size of Lac Jeannine it was a foregone conclusion that sooner or later the company would develop its other deposits. Now it appears the time is at hand.

In order to bring Lac Jeannine into production, a 193 mile railway was constructed and a deep water harbor was developed at Port Cartier, some 40 miles west of Sept Iles. The harbor which can receive ships up to 100,000 tons, is presently being excavated and enlarged to accommodate vessels of substantially larger tonnages.

**ASSISTANCE FOR 29 GOLD MINES:** There were 266 gold mines operating in Canada in 1939 and 31 are

in operation today. Of this number only two, Campbell Red Lake Mines and Camflo Mines, which came into production in 1965, receive no assistance under the Emergency Gold Mining Assistance Act of the Canadian Federal Government.

**BRINCO'S LABRADOR PROGRAM:** British Newfoundland Exploration (Brinex) is expanding its operations and facilities at North West River, site of the company's base camp for mineral explorations in Labrador.

E.P. Graham, vice - president and general manager of Brinex, a wholly - owned subsidiary of British Newfoundland Corp., says that the expansion of base camp facilities reflects increasing exploration activity in the field by the company in Labrador, notably in a 14,000 sq. mile belt where diamond drilling is now carried out year-around.

This belt stretches from central Labrador to the coast. It includes the Kaipokok - Big River uranium area, where three diamond drills will continue in use all winter; the Makkovik area; site of molybdenite showings, where two drills will work through the winter; and the Seal Lake area, where copper showings are being investigated. Throughout Labrador 110 men supported by five helicopters had been at work in the field last summer.

Robert P. Watts, who was appointed Brinex field manager at North West River, earlier this year, will be located year - round at North West River to direct operations of the base camp, so that it can continue to supply crews at work in the field through the winter. Mr. Watts, a graduate of Memorial University, was employed at the Brinex Whalesback Mine, near Springdale, Nfld. prior to his recent appointment. Meanwhile, new buildings have been added to the North West River installations, including a new office building, a warehouse and a residence.

**U.S. NATIONAL MINERALS POLICY:** The United States Senate has passed legislation which would

establish a national mining and minerals policy. Under the legislation the Secretary of Interior would make an annual report to the U.S. Congress on the state of the domestic mining industry. Included in the report would be a statement of the trend in utilization and depletion of these resources and recommendations for mining legislation.

A national policy would be established under the legislation to guide the federal government in fostering and encouraging: (a) Development of an economically sound and stable domestic mining and minerals policy; (b) The orderly and economic development of domestic minerals, resources and reserves to help assure satisfaction of industrial and security needs; (c) Mining, mineral, and metallurgical research to promote the wise and efficient use of domestic mineral resources.

**PROFIT FOR JAVELIN:** William Wismer, Canadian Javelin President, stated recently that the company's Melville Pulp and Paper subsidiary has shipped its first two cargoes of pulpwood to Europe. He also reported the recent loan in German currency provides the company with a profit of \$1.6 million from the revaluation of the mark.

**BAN EXPORT OF CANADIAN COINS:** The Canadian government recently moved against the export of Canadian 5 - cent coins destined for the U.S. "grey market". The nickel shortage has given rise to several recent shipments through border points and ports as far west as Vancouver, some of them running as high as \$100,000. Trade Minister J.C. Pepin has announced that a permit is now required to export Canadian coins, and will only be granted for shipments of their U.S. branches or agencies by Canadian banks and financial houses.

It is a criminal offence to deface or mutilate coins in Canada, but not in the United States. Hence, there can be no extradition of those accused of melting down Canadian coins in that country. The ban on nickel coin exports is similar to that which went into effect on silver coins a few years ago. At that time officials moved against huge shipments of silver into the U.S., where a combination of high silver prices and the dollar exchange premium increased their value about 15%.

# Scanning the market

We don't want to say "I told you so." However two comments made in last week's column (written several days after Finance Minister Benson's "Robbin Who" tax paper) already seem to be coming true.

(a) "Make it by Dec. '70 after that it will be too late."

(b) "Investors will probably look to Caribbean tax-free havens." The rise of 8.75 points, in the Toronto Industrial Average (the best weekly gain on record) during the first full week of trading following Benson's "white paper" seem to confirm this writer's thinking. There was obviously no reason, other than the "tax reform" report, to send the market up sharply. We will be paying capital gains on 1971 earnings; this is a fact. Don't believe the nonsense that this is merely a positional paper. This is government policy and it will become law.

On the second point: there was an interesting article on this subject in a recent issue of the Gazette. The writer stated that already many Canadian investors are making plans to invest elsewhere. Barbados is mentioned as an ideal spot to invest. I feel capital gains will, in the long run cost Canada a lot more than it will gain from the tax. We need only to look across the Atlantic and see what the imposition of this tax did to the U.K. It may be good politics but is it good economics?

Last month the Financial Post and University of Toronto school of business administration sponsored what they called the Million Dollar Investment Fund contest. Teams from 10 Canadian Universities started out with a hypothetical \$1 million portfolio (valued as of 27 Oct., 1969). The teams, competing for a \$1,000.00 fellowship, may trade as often as they like up to 31 Mar. 1970. After the end of March no changes in the portfolio will be allowed. The hypothetical funds will be valued 30 Sept. 1970. The team whose portfolio shows the highest market value wins.

I was somewhat surprised by the number of "pennies," and junior oils, mines, and industrials selected. And I would like to pass them on for your further investigation. (Prices quoted are as of closing 27 Oct. 1969).

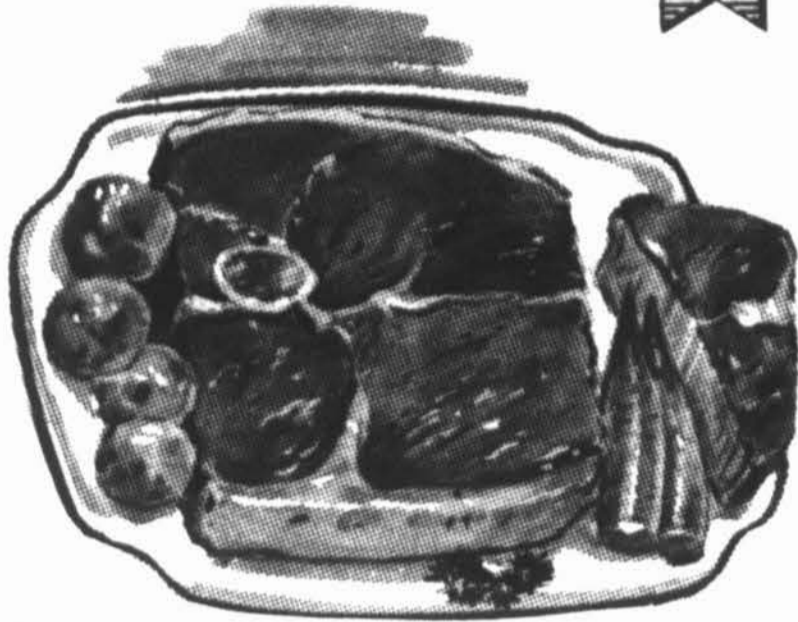
