On the local scene

COURT NEWS: Two women residents who went on a shop-lifting "spree" were caught during their third "attack" on Carol Shopping centre's, stores. Both were fined \$50.00. Another lady shoplifter was fined \$25.00. (2) Local "Ladies" were charged with assault and fined \$25.00. (3) Young men were convicted of stealing gasoline to the value of \$48.00 from Lundrigan's construction camp. They were placed under bond of \$200.00 each and ordered to restitution of \$16.00 each. (2) Vehicle operators were found guilty of "hit and run" and were fined. (3) Men were convicted of a breach of the Wildlife Regulations. A local youth convicted of stealing a motor vehicle were fined \$50.00. A large number of offences against the Alcoholic Liquors Act and Highway Traffic Act were dealt with.

Magistrate Rowe had a busy session at Churchill Falls disposing of no less than (4) impaired driving charges. In all cases, operators lost their license for a period of six months and were fined \$50.00. Another resident was found guilty of peddling liquor and was fined \$300.00 for "bootlegging." A C.F. worker was convicted of "jigging" fish in inland waters. He was convicted and fined \$25.00 and had his "jigger" confiscated.

POLITICS: Unless an election was called yesterday this Province has another first against democracy. Five years ago today (8 Sept. 1966) Premier Smallwood and his hordes just about obliterated the P.C. Party winning 39 out of 42 Provincial seats. But for St. John's East there would have been no opposition. However things have certainly changed since that great victory. If the Legislature was called together tomorrow the count would be 20 — Opposition 9 & Vacant 14 (and this without an election). According to a Political Science friend of mine at Memorial University, this is the first time in Canadian history — and to his knowledge — a first under the British Parliamentary system — were a government has exceeded its maximum 5 year mandate. And he seriously questions the legality of this Smallwood government after today.

I, and presumably many local residents, recently received their August edition of the Newfoundland "Bull" — paid for with your tax dollars — having on page one pictures of "the leader" and his 19 cabinet colleagues, (Five minister's without portfolio). A cabinet of 20 for a Province of this size is another Canadian first — Newfoundland which ranks 9th in population of Canada's 10 provinces — now ranks 3rd in size of its Cabinet (and 1st in number of Minister's without Portfolio). At the bottom of Page 1, Nfld. "Bull" is a sentence. "The average age of this Cabinet is 48." Now we are at a loss to know what this means. Possibly it's to show that with "new blood" the average age of cabinet minister's has decreased. However to our knowledge it must be just about

the eldest in Canada. Why from Alberta to P.E.I. there isn't a Canadian Premier over 45 — the average age being slightly in excess of 40 years. We recall that about ten years ago Duff Roblin has a Manitoba Cabinet in which the oldest minister was 47. The "new" Nfld. Cabinet has 9 men over 50. Possibly the age of this Cabinet will be reduced considerably after next month's Provincial election.

WABUSH AIRPORT
According to the latest figures received from Aviation Statistics in Ottawa, Wabush airport has 1,460 "movements" in June. This compares with 3,678 at St. John's and 6,195 at Gander, during the same period. While we are not too sure as to the interpretations of "movements," it seems that our airport is handling about 40 per cent of the number of flights processed by St. John's — and Wabush airport is probably no larger than the Snack Bar at Torbay.

On Wednesday of last week, at 2:45 p.m., we saw (2) BAC 1-11's & (1) F-27 from Quebecair and E.P.A.'s 737, plus a number of smaller aircraft attempting to off-load and board, hundreds of passengers. The result was complete chaos. Earlier this year announcements from Ottawa indicated some hundreds of thousands of dollars would be expended this year to up-grade facilities at Wabush. However but for several rolls of cable near the ramp area, we haven't seen any work to date. The situation has become completely tolerable and Aurora would suggest all local organizations band together and send a delegation to Ottawa and present our case.

R.C.M.P. & SAFETY:
According to Sgt. Evans, N.C.O.I.C., Lab. City detachment, members of the force will be conducting safety sessions in L.C. schools during the next few weeks. With over 2,000 now attending classes in about a ¼ sq. mile area, it has become imperative that all students should have the basics of safety. Cross-walks are being repainted this week and parents are urged to inform their younger children that these walk-ways are laid out for their protection. Cross-walks will be patrolled by police on foot and by car. After 1 Oct. the Highway Traffic Act — which requires pedestrians to use only cross-walks when they are in the immediate area — will be rigidly enforced. Failure to do so will result in a minimum fine of \$5.00.

Although comparatively late in the season, education and control of bicycles is also being stressed. It is hoped to have bicycle stands installed at Carol Shopping Centre before month end. Tickets will be issued to kids who ride their bikes about or leave them unattended near business premises. Fines of up to \$20.00 can result, if cyclist's fail to obey regulations. Bicyclist's are advised that while riding on public thoroughfares it is essential bikes should be kept as close as possible to the right side of highway. Bicycling on sidewalks is not permitted under any circumstances.

Editorially Speaking

DRUGS, CON'T: The day following writing last week's editorial on Drugs, a committee on youth — commissioned by State Secretary Pelletier some two years ago and prepared at a cost of \$500,000 — released their report (to be perfectly frank, this writer was not aware such a commission existed) recommending among other things that: "The cultivation, sale and use of cannabis drugs such as marijuana and hashish should be legalized. Purchase and use should be allowed at 18 and distribution and marketing should be regulated by the government."

Our first observation was the committee members; now aged 28, 28 and 31 who began work on this document two years ago. We don't believe that people of this age — none of whom has medical training — and certainly do not have teenagers of their own, were wisely chosen. However we would prefer to read the LeDain inquiry report — scheduled for release this fall — before passing a final opinion.

But these two news stories, the day after the Pelletier commission's report, were quite revealing:

"TEEN HIPPIES SELL SELVES FROM HASHISH": Young hippies from the United States and Europe wander around cities and town in Afghanistan "begging like dogs" for hashish and selling their bodies for a fix, a British educator said yesterday. Peter Willey, senior house-master at Wellington College, in Berkshire County, said he saw scenes such as this again and again during recent travels to Afghanistan for a study of slavery for the British Antislavery Society.

"Two evils, slavery and narcotics which, acting together, are destroying not only the lives of the Afghans, but tens of thousands of young men and women from all over western Europe, the United States and Canada," Willey said. He termed Afghanistan the main supplier of narcotics to Britain. He told of hippies "in sun-drenched squares that reek of death and decay or in sordid, tawdry lodging houses. They have become dependent on scraps of food, contemptuous charity, and a daily supply of hashish or other narcotics provided by Afghans who treat them as weird human pets," Willey said.

DRUGGED TEENAGERS SLEEP IT OFF AT FAIR: About 60 teenagers went into bad drug reactions at a Man and His world rock music concert last night, and all Montreal police could do was help them to sleep it off. "What can you do?" said one harried officer as he steered a 12-year-old girl toward a patch of lawn. "We just try to make sure they don't hurt themselves, or get hysterical." Some 300 music fans showed up at Place des Nations to hear a group called MAD Dog play. Hashish, marijuana and chemical drugs were passed around quite freely.

The festival was peaceful and orderly, but about 20 per cent of the teenagers present last night had a "bad trip." Seven youngsters were rushed by police ambulance to St. Luc Hospital in Montreal, and at least thirty or forty others were treated by accident prevention officer for "downers" associated with the drug. At one point, three police ambulances were operating a shuttle service between Place des Nations and St. Luc. But most of the youngsters were led to the nearest plot of grass by police and drug-aid teams, to sleep off the drug's effects.

No arrests were made, and no names taken by any of the fifteen Montreal policemen on hand at the show. "This happens at every rock show, only tonight it's worse than usual," said a policeman.

Aurora feels we should not jump into legalization overnight. Much more study is required before such a move is made.

SAFETY SOCIETY

Mr. Dennis Storey, National President of the Canadian Society of Safety Engineering, was in the Labrador City - Wabush area on August 29-30, to help organize a local branch of that society.

Approximately twenty people, including safety personnel from the Iron Ore Company of Canada and Wabush Mines, attended a meeting at the O'Brien Hall on Monday, August 30.

At this meeting Mr. Storey explained the purpose and function of the Society. After a discussion period a steering committee was elected to

organize a chapter of the Society in this area. The officers elected were Mr. John Murphy, Safety Supervisor, Iron Ore Company, as chairman; Mr. William Rough, Safety Supervisor, Wabush Mines; Mr. Eric March, Safety Inspector, Iron Ore Company and Mr. Phil Bolanger, Safety Supervisor, Canadian Bechtel, as vice-chairmen; and Mr. Frank Etsell, Safety Inspector, Iron Ore Company of Canada as Secretary-Treasurer.

It is hoped that through this society safety personnel in the area will gain new knowledge and techniques and become better qualified to cope with the safety needs of the industrial complexes.

MAIL-A-WIFE FRAUD CHARGED: John McPhee has been charged with fraud after seven lonely Westerners lost out on a mail-order wife. McPhee, 33, of Toronto, was arrested at a post office where he picked up mail from a box. Police said advertisements were placed in newspapers in British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan, saying a young, attractive Toronto woman was seeking a companion with the object of marriage. Follow-up letters signed Ellen Ball or Jeanine Roberts enclosed pictures of a beautiful girl and asked for travelling expenses to meet the prospective husband. Police said seven westerners complained after they sent money and no girl arrived.

JUST HOW BAD UNEMPLOYMENT IS IN CANADA! Nembled by all those DBS statistics on unemployment? Here's one, from another source, that makes the whole problem come dreadfully alive. A new 100,000-barrell-a-day oil refinery built by Golden Eagle Canada Ltd. recently opened at St. Romuald, near Quebec City. To fill the 125 production and maintenance jobs the company received 6,000 applications. "And that's just a minimum figure," said Jean Hardy, personnel manager for the refinery. "It's really hard when you can accept only a small proportion of applicants, especially when most have adequate qualifications and are either unemployed or underemployed."

BACHELOR OF SEX? Amsterdam University is opening a department of sexual relations this month. And 66-year-old Dr. Conrad van Emde Boas has been appointed sex professor. "Sex problems are increasing all the time," he says. "My students will become experts at dealing with these love-life difficulties by the time they qualify as family doctors and specialists. Many older doctors have not had the opportunity of developing the right attitude."

Here and There

ST. JOHN'S, NFLD. GETS HOUSING AID: The Federal Urban Affairs Secretariat has announced it will spend \$3.38-million to help St. John's rebuild and renovate its 416-acre Mundy Pond area. The Federal Government will supply half the \$3.4 million cost of the project, lend the city \$1.1-million to cover two-thirds of its share of the cost and lend the city a further \$550,000 to assemble a 161-acre tract of land in the area. Mundy Pond is an older residential area, about a mile north-west of the Water Street business area. There are about 580 houses in Mundy Pond area but the city says it intends to demolish only 65. The occupants of those houses will be given priority in a new public housing project being considered for the area by the provincial authorities. A further 44 houses will be relocated, either because they are now remote from municipal services or because they stand in the path of planned roadways. Officials say existing industry and schools will not be affected by the renewal project, with the exception of an asphalt plant, which will be removed. Local residents have complained for some time that the plant is a source of pollution and is an eyesore. The renewal calls for paved streets, sidewalks and storm and sanitary sewers, new power, telephone and street lighting lines and an adequate water supply system. The pond will be cleaned up through dredging and filling to become part of a municipal park and playground, with a foot-bridge, benches and play equipment. The program will be carried out in several stages, to be entirely completed within three years.

FOUL PLAY

PREFERRED: Two male players were sent off during a men-versus-woman soccer game in Yorkshire, England — for twanging the girls' bra straps and tickling them when they got them on the turf. One of the victims said afterwards: "We were enjoying it."

PRODUCTIVITY LEAGUE: OEDC has

released a comparison of productivity in its member countries, measured in terms of gross domestic product per employee. Rating Germany — where productivity is about average — as 100, the U.S. scores 210 and Canada is in second place with 155. Productivity leaders in Europe are Sweden (125). France and Switzerland (120 each). Belgium and Denmark are near the average with 105 each. After Germany comes Iceland (85), Britain, Italy and Finland (75 each) and Austria (70). Portugal and Turkey bring up the rear with 31 and 15 respectively.

STRANGLES IN HAMMOCK: A 22-year-old Mexican servant girl strangled recently in the hammock where she was rocking herself to sleep. Police said the girl rocked herself so hard that she became tangled in the hammock cord, and died of strangulation.

BABY-SITTING: The baby-sitting business has come a long way since the days when you just handed the pig-tailed teenager next door a quarter and asked her to keep an eye on Junior while you and your wife took in a movie. The Canada Safety Council, Ottawa, hopes to instigate the training of 200,000 baby sitters over the next couple of years, by means of a course the CSC had devised in cooperation with the Ontario Safety League. Basis of the course is a \$10 kit from which any volunteer instructor (from women's groups, parent-teacher associations, Girl Guide troops and such) can lecture on and demonstrate such subjects as child care, safety, child behavior, responsibilities and rights, games to play and safe toys to use. At the end of the eight-lecture course, each newly qualified baby sitter is equipped with a pocket-sized manual of do's and don'ts to refer to on the job. Representing a streamlined version of an older course that was found to be too technical for part-time sitters, the new kits are to be distributed through safety associations in all 10 provinces. And now that Fiance Minister Benson proposes to make day-care a deductible expense for working mothers, the new course seems just in time to meet a rising demand.

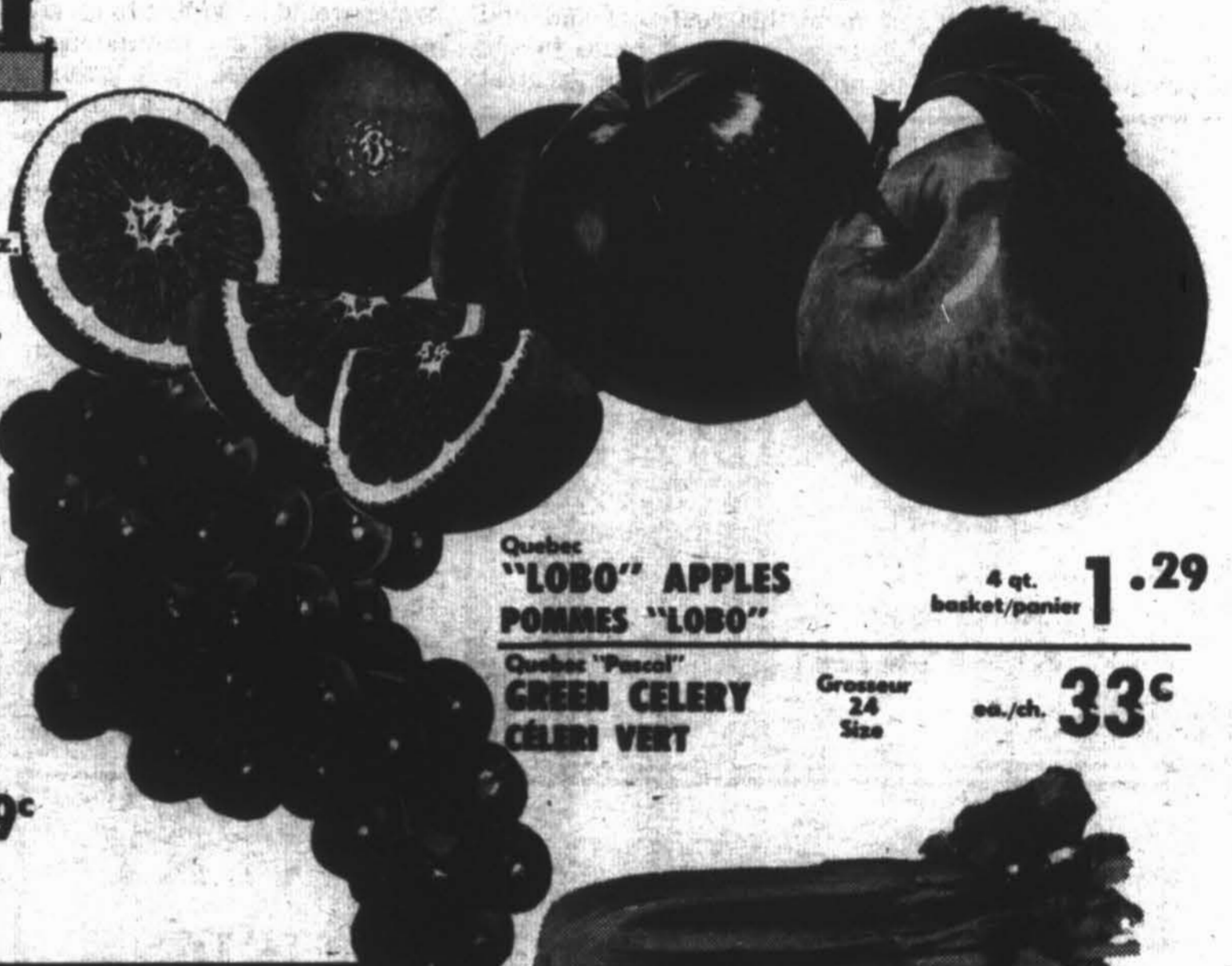

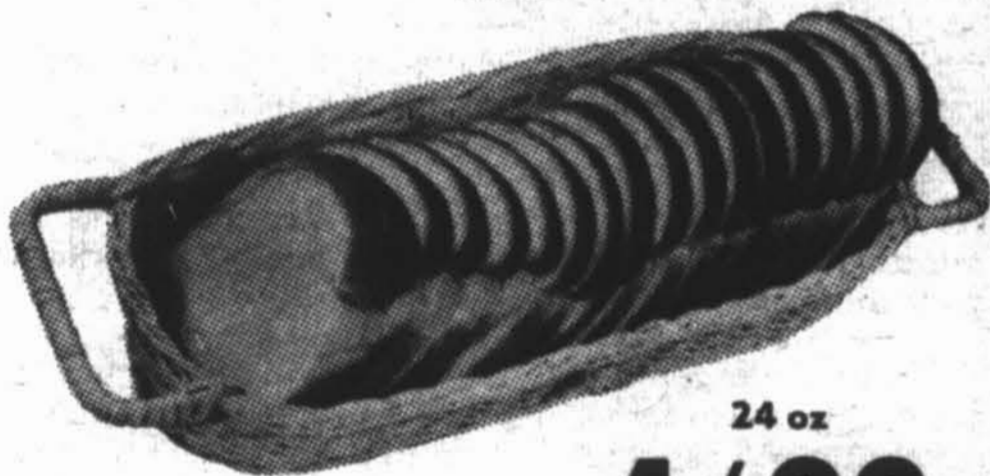

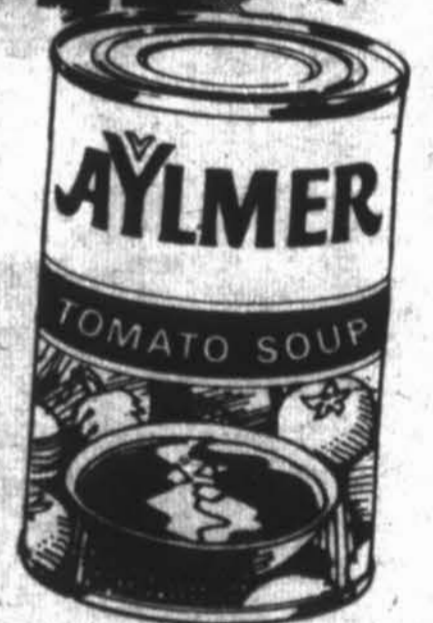

Roaming The Globe

MARTINIQUE: HANDY RIVIERA: For those who have neither the time nor the cash to join the swells perambulating about the French Riviera, the nearest fascimile is nearby Martinique. It is somehow as Gallic as a Gauloise and twice as handy as a niche in Nice. Stretched out along the Baie des Flamades, Fort de France might just as well be a corner of Cannes or Villefranche. One expects to stumble upon Picasso or the

Begun or Brigitte at every sun-swept turning.

The boites even have names like Au Coq Hardi (after that glorious flowered inn outside Paris), Un Coin de Paris, Rive Gauche, and, with a look towards the Levant, the Baalbec which serves up gastronomic memories of Lebanon, once a French corner too. The straw-making ladies who gather at the waterfront are a reminder that this sandbar really is in the West Indies. But walk a

block inland and there is the grand emporium of M. Roger Albert where 50 girls, all done up in pink smocks, are waiting to spray you with sample scents of all the perfumes of Paris. Or sell you the molded crystal of Lalique. Or, if the mood is overwhelming, a ticket to Paris. M. Albert also maintains a plush air-conditioned travel agency on the second floor presumably just for such emergencies.

Still, there are faint evidences that one isn't really in France. One can summon a Pernod or a Suze, but the favorite refreshment is a punch—white rum and sugar syrup. A watering hole called Le Saloon near the waterfront offers to serve you a sea urchine pancake. Outside Fort de France, Martinique turns into a West Indian isle rolling with hillsides covered with bananas, the fruit hanging in pale blue bags as a protection against insects. Against the green of the fronds, the combination is handsome. Where there are no bananas there is cane, and here and there, for punctuation, the inevitable palms.

Once reticent, if not even coy about sharing its lovely island with intruders from America and Europe, Martinique can now offer a full range from a comfortable Hilton to a rousing Club Mediterranee. The Hilton is just outside Fort de France within easy reach of the shops, and it is a proper pad with elevators, rooms overlooking the sea, an assortment of full-fledged restaurants and snack stations and Martinique's lone casino. Gilded and attractive, the house of chance offers such U.S. cultural exportation as craps, blackjack and American roulette. In deference to the growing French and Italian

clientele—their winters are not so hot either—the casino will add baccarat, chemin de fer, and French roulette. The Hilton has no beach, but it has set up a handsome pool overlooking the bay and built an engaging marina for water-skiers, sea water dunkers, and those who would merely lie on the dock and roast. Snorkelers and small boys with fishing lines are also invited.

One of the liveliest nests in all the West Indies is surely the Bakoua, a resort which faces Fort de France across the bay. Not far from the birthplace of Empress Josephine Napoleon's royal consort, Bakoua manages that seaside Riviera luxury that is executed with such perfection at Cap d'Antibes and Beaulieu. It has both a pool and a beach and the rooms are imaginatively arrayed on the sloping hillside looking across at night to the lights of Fort de France shining there like a miniature Hong Kong. For those with patrician tastes, the Bakoua offers the Suite Imperiale, an incredible apartment equipped with a canopied bed, glass walls, a sunken marble bathtub with gold faucets, a terrace hanging over the sea, and in the living room, inevitably, a portrait of Josephine herself. An empress thus installed might take her meals in seclusion, but then she would miss the dining saloon sitting high on the butte, open to the trades and the view. The nourishment is Gallic and gorgeous.

Club Mediterranee, far on the southern end of the island, has found the best beach of all, one of the best in all the West Indies. Soft and seemingly endless, it provides a fringe for an enormous playground where 600

refugees are seemingly in constant convention. It takes a staff of 300 to keep them going, not to mention a flotilla of boats for scuba diving, picnics, and excursions. Established in an old coconut plantation, the Club has put in tennis courts, pavilions and a whole village of bungalows where the participants install themselves between frantic activities. The lodgings are monkishly simple, the meals bacchanal. The bar where the hip meet and mingle goes all day, and so does the music: beguines and hard rock at lunch and more of the same after dark. The quiet hour is sunset when the visitors gather in a seaside pavilion to listen to Mozart on the stereo and contemplate the fish.

U.S. AIR LINES SEEK CUTS IN DOMESTIC FARES: Three major U.S. airlines have applied for substantially reduced fares—up to 66 per cent discounts—on various domestic routes. United Air Lines, the largest U.S. air carrier, Trans World Airlines and American Airlines filed petitions recently with the Civil Aeronautics Board, which regulates domestic air fares.

A husband-and-wife maximum five-day excursion fare requested by TWA would cut its lowest coast-to-coast fares from \$326 to \$99 round trip. One of the couple, however, must pay the full coach fare. A similar American Airlines plan is only slightly more expensive. TWA plans to offer 25 per cent reduction to individuals travelling during the off-season, October to May. Although American and TWA plan to offer family and individual fare reductions, United programs apply only to groups of 25 to 154 people.

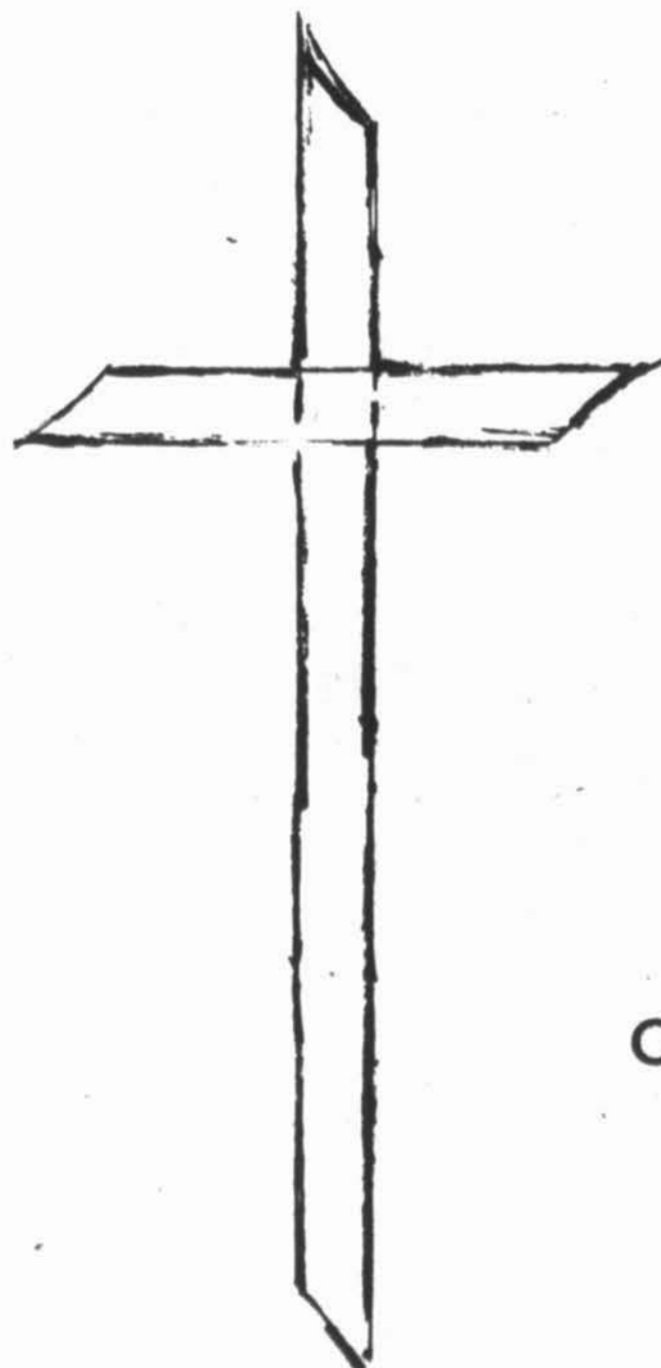

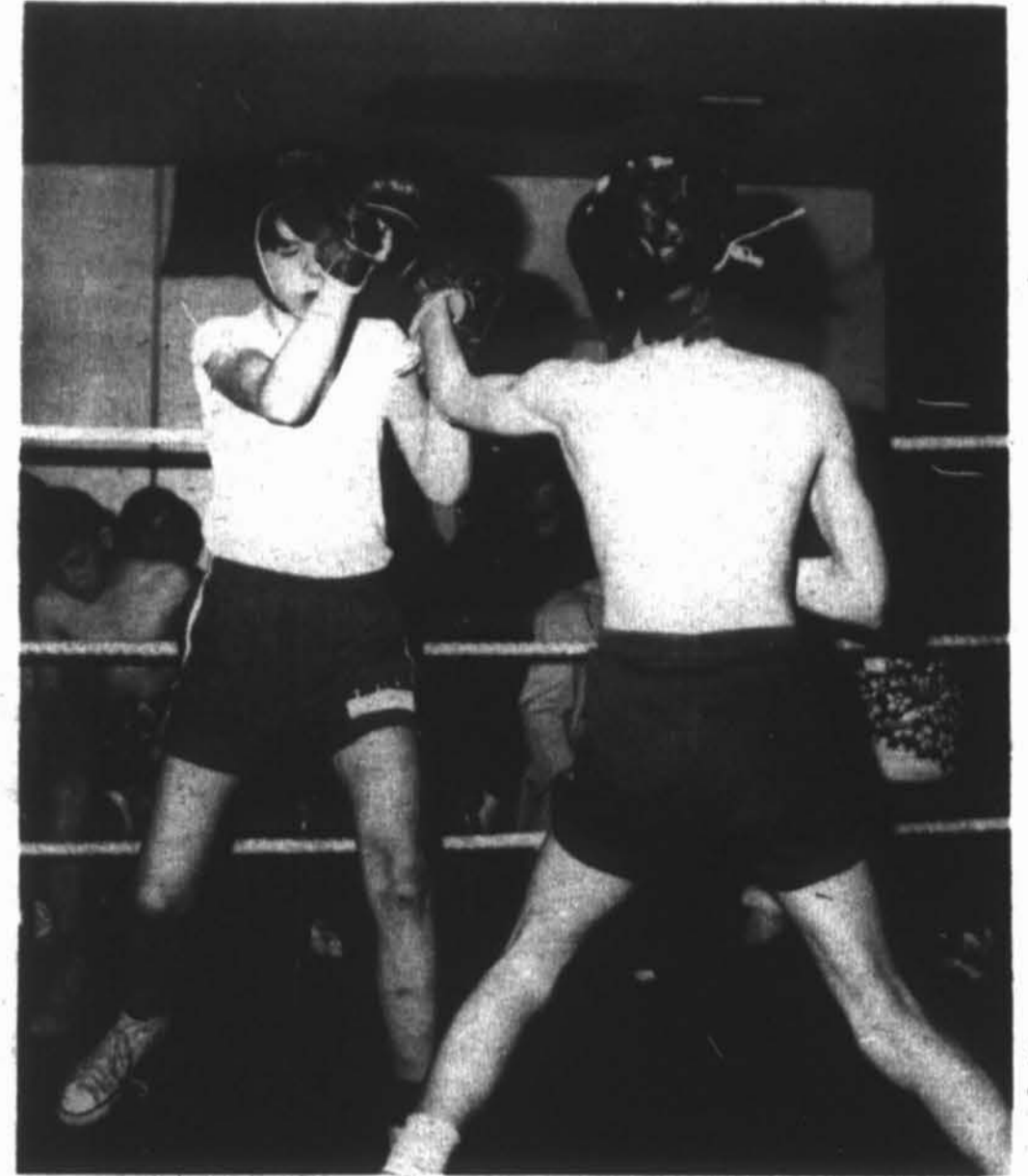

Calls for advance polls

STATEMENT BY MR. FRANK MOORES CONCERNING THE NEED FOR ADVANCED POLLS IN THE 1971 ELECTION RELEASED THE 31st DAY OF AUGUST, 1971

The Progressive Conservative Party now calls upon the Government to make the necessary preparations for an advance poll to be held during the week preceding the day set for Polling Day in the 1971 Election. The Progressive Conservative Party has repeatedly stressed the

fact, in previous elections, and stresses the fact again now that many of the voters of Newfoundland can be protected with respect to their voting rights by the establishment of advance polls in the week preceding Election Day if the necessary action is taken by the Government of Newfoundland.

Under Section 157 of The Election Act the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, which means the Government of Newfoundland, may order that an advance poll be held in any

election for the purpose of receiving the votes of persons qualified to vote at such election who have reason to believe that on the day fixed for polling at such election they will be absent from and unable to vote at the polling division in which they are ordinarily resident. This was provided for in the amendments made to the Election Act in 1968. There will be many hundreds, if not thousands, of such persons who will be unable to vote in the coming General Election unless advance polls are provided for by reason of the fact that they will be absent from their own polling division on Election Day.

Under the legislation passed by the House of Assembly, the Government has the power to fix the number of advance polls to be held in any electoral district, the places for such advance polls and the hours and days when advance polls may be held. Such advance polls may be held on any or all of the 7 working days immediately preceding the ordinary Polling Day.

The House of Assembly has

AURORA, LABRADOR, SEPTEMBER 8, 1971-15 provided the opportunity for there to be voting at advance polls for those who will be absent from their homes on Election Day. The legislation cannot be carried out without the cooperation and direction of the Government. I now call upon the Government to state whether or not the Government is making provision for the general holding of advance polls in all the electoral districts of Newfoundland, during the 7 working days

previous to the day to be set for the Election.

If such steps are now being taken they should be taken in sufficient time to provide for the proper system of advance polls as is done in all other democratic jurisdictions. No person in this Province, eligible to vote, should be deprived of that right by reason of any failure of the Government to provide for a system of advance polls in accordance with the legislation passed by the House of Assembly.

Urbana College in Ohio has decided to cancel all classes on Wednesdays to give faculty and students a free day to participate in informal seminars, meetings or independent study projects. Dr. Thomas Bellavance, faculty dean, hopes the day off will promote greater faculty and student participation in decision-making committees.

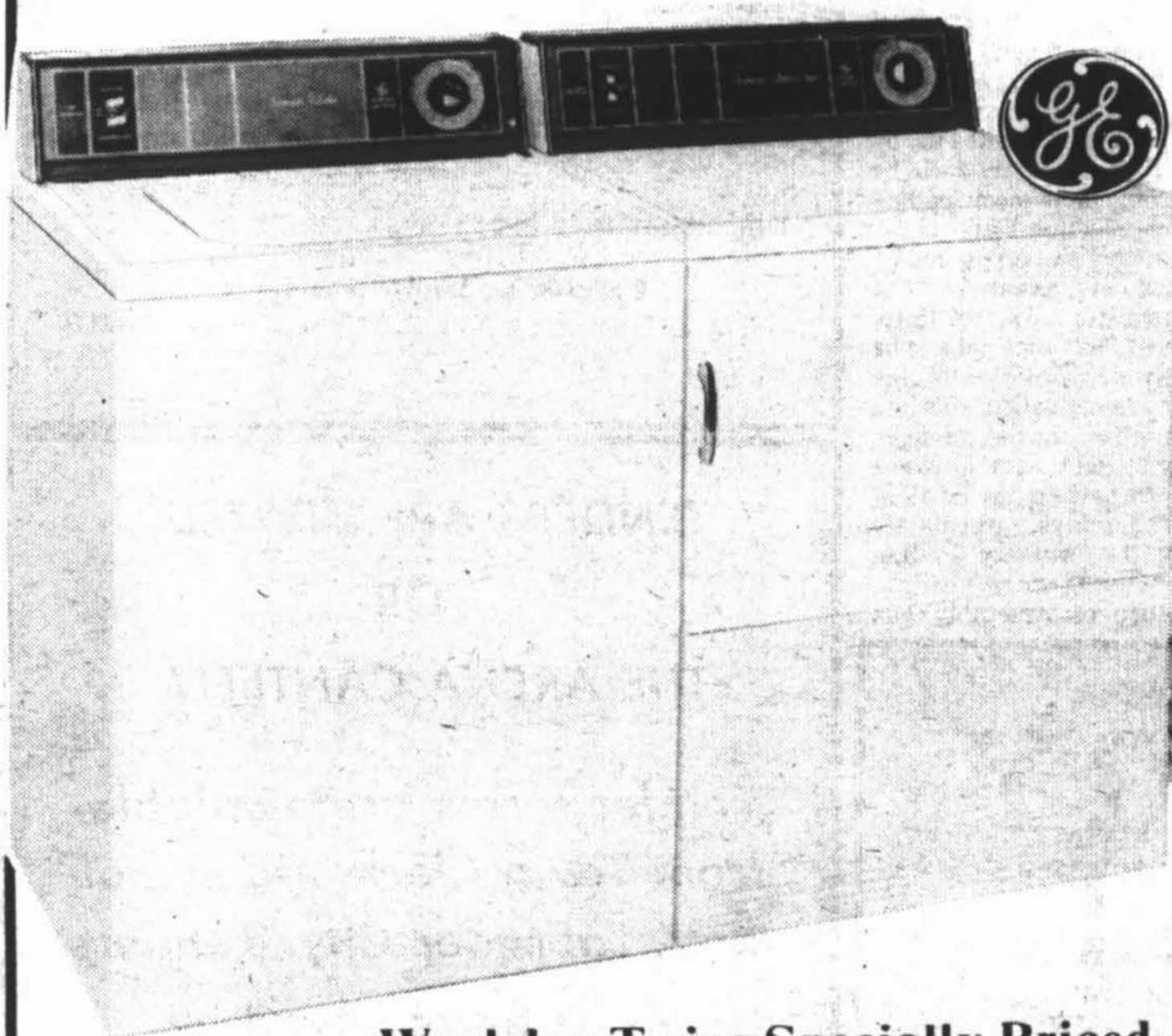
