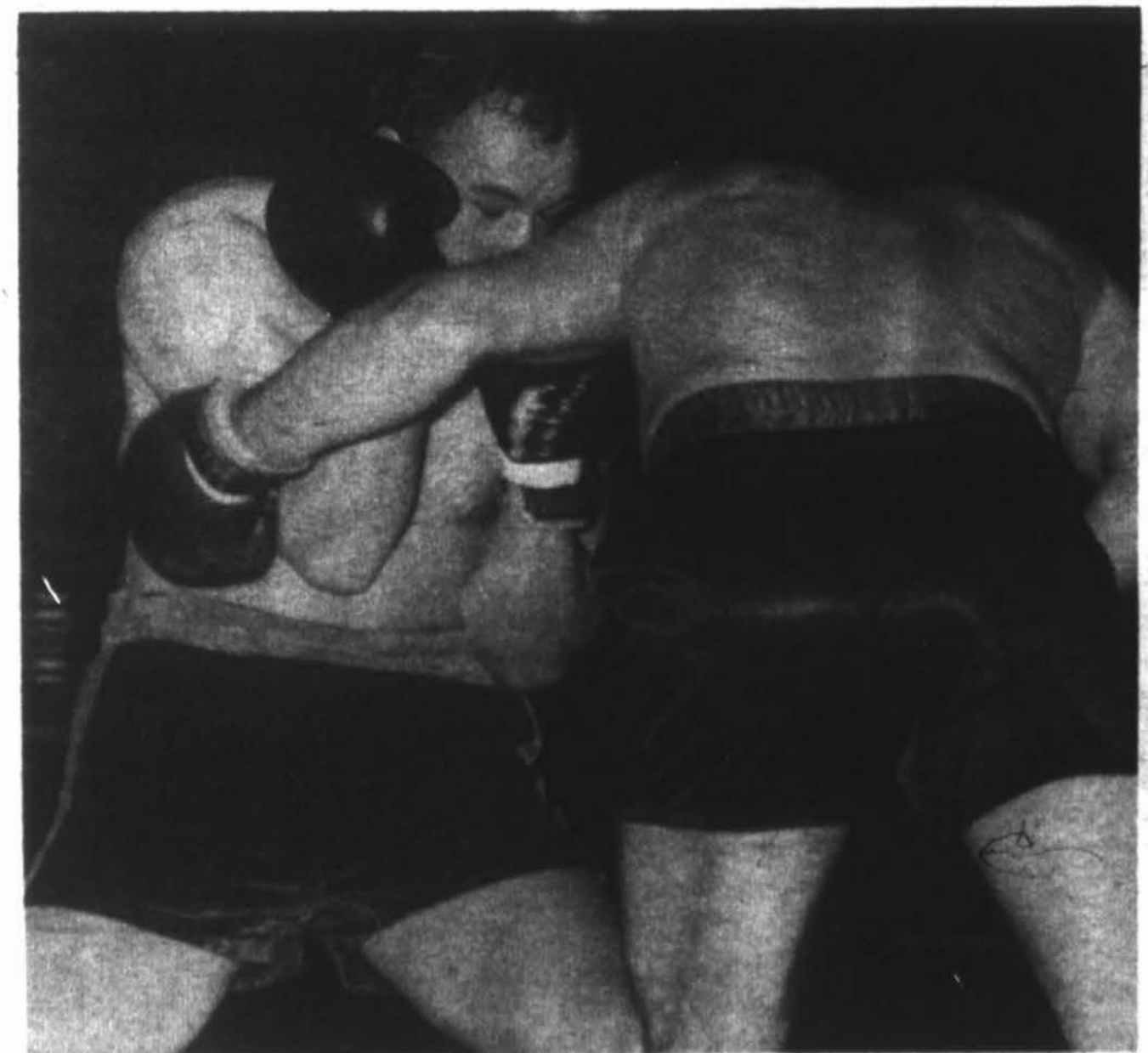

# On the local scene

**COURT NEWS:** Things have been comparatively quiet of late — however a small number of cases were dealt with by the Magistrate. (2) local drivers were convicted of "Hit and Run", in both cases fines of \$100 were imposed. (2) people were found guilty of disorderly conduct and fines of \$20 each were handed down. Another resident was convicted of issuing worthless cheque to cover purchase of a coat. The cheque was in excess of \$50. He was given a suspended sentence and ordered to make compensation. One impaired driver lost his right to operate a vehicle for a period of six months and was fined \$50.00.

At Churchill Falls six workers were convicted of disorderly conduct and were fined \$20.00 each. Two residents were found guilty of impaired driving. Both lost their license for a period of six months and were fined \$50. Another worker was found guilty of unlawful possession of liquor. A fine of \$25 was imposed. Two brothers, operating a bootlegging ring, were convicted of offences against the Alcoholic Liquor Act and fined \$100 each.

**PROVINCIAL GENERAL ELECTION:** The following official figures were obtained from Magistrate M. Rowe, Returning Officer of Labrador West — 28 Oct. election. Registered voters 6,191 — total vote 6,447. Turnout 104.1 percent. Votes received by each candidate: (1) T. Burgess, 3,243 (50.3 percent). (2) P. Walsh, 1,659 (25.7 percent). (3) R. Legge, 1,445 (22.4 percent). (4) M. Neville, 100 (1.6) The percentage turnout for Labrador West was the highest district in this Province.

**TOWN NOTES, LABRADOR CITY:** During a visit to St. John's, Town Manager Rendell, spoke with officials of the Department of Health on present doctor situation here. Evidently the Deputy Minister was not too hopeful of recruiting personnel for this area. A meeting is being held this week with store operators of Carol Shopping Centre re. general condition of off-loading area and disposal of garbage. The town will take legal action if there is no improvement.

While on the whole residents seem generally satisfied with early snow clearing operations, several complaints have been made. The Town is studying the possibility of having all snow removal done at night, which would mean entire streets would not have to be closed during these operations, as at present. However, noise from equipment could prove a nuisance. Also operators will be asked to provide additional signs, in areas being cleared. This year Labrador City has awarded two contracts. All areas South of Hudson Drive are the responsibility of Inter City Transport Ltd. Hudson Drive and north is being handled by General Trucking and Cleaners Ltd.

IN A LINE: Understand A. & W.

will be opening before 15 Dec. This will be followed by the Pizza Parlor which will be located in Bruno Furniture Building. Opening date is tentatively set for 20 Dec. An Italian Chef has been hired. Balance of equipment is in transit — so we should have Pizza before Christmas.

## WABUSH COUNCIL NEWS

Regular meeting No. 56 of the Board of Trustees for the Town of Wabush was held in the council chambers on November 24th at 1:00 p.m. Chairman James Lemke presided.

### TOPICS DISCUSSED:

(1) The Board received a letter from Bell Canada concerning their proposed new rates for the area.

The Board voted unanimously to reject the rate increase. A letter will be sent to the Canadian Transport Commission concerning this matter.

(2) Council will be applying to the federal and provincial governments for a grant under the local Winter Initiatives Program. The grant, if approved, will be used in the construction of park facilities.

Council wishes to advise citizens that signs will be placed in and around the Municipal Park at Elephant Head Lake indicating that there will be no cutting of trees, dumping of garbage, or construction of any cabin, etc. This area has been set aside for the future enjoyment of all citizens.

(3) The Board of Trustees for the Town wishes to advise citizens that first, second and third prizes for the best decorated house or trailer will be given again this year. The prizes will be fifty dollars first prize, thirty dollars for second, and twenty dollars for third.

Houses or trailers will be judged on general appearance and neatness. Judging will begin

on January 1, 1972. Prizes will be awarded on January 5th.

(4) Council has received several verbal complaints regarding the use of snowmobiles around the recreation centre and staffhouse areas. Signs will be posted in those areas and violators will be dealt with.

(5) Council has also received complaints regarding the blowing of the curfew siren during the winter months. Citizens are advised that any complaints, regardless of its nature, should be in writing and forwarded to the municipal office.

## LABRADOR DEVELOPMENT

The Government of Canada should be doing everything to encourage, not discourage, development in Labrador, says the Member of Parliament, for the area, Ambrose Peddle.

Spaking in the Commons on Bill C-259, the massive tax reform legislation, Peddle declared that in Labrador "a buck is abuck" and much of the development in the near-north had been because of United States capital investment.

"We in Newfoundland and Labrador, have not reached the luxurious position of being able to turn down capital or take it only on our own terms," he told the House.

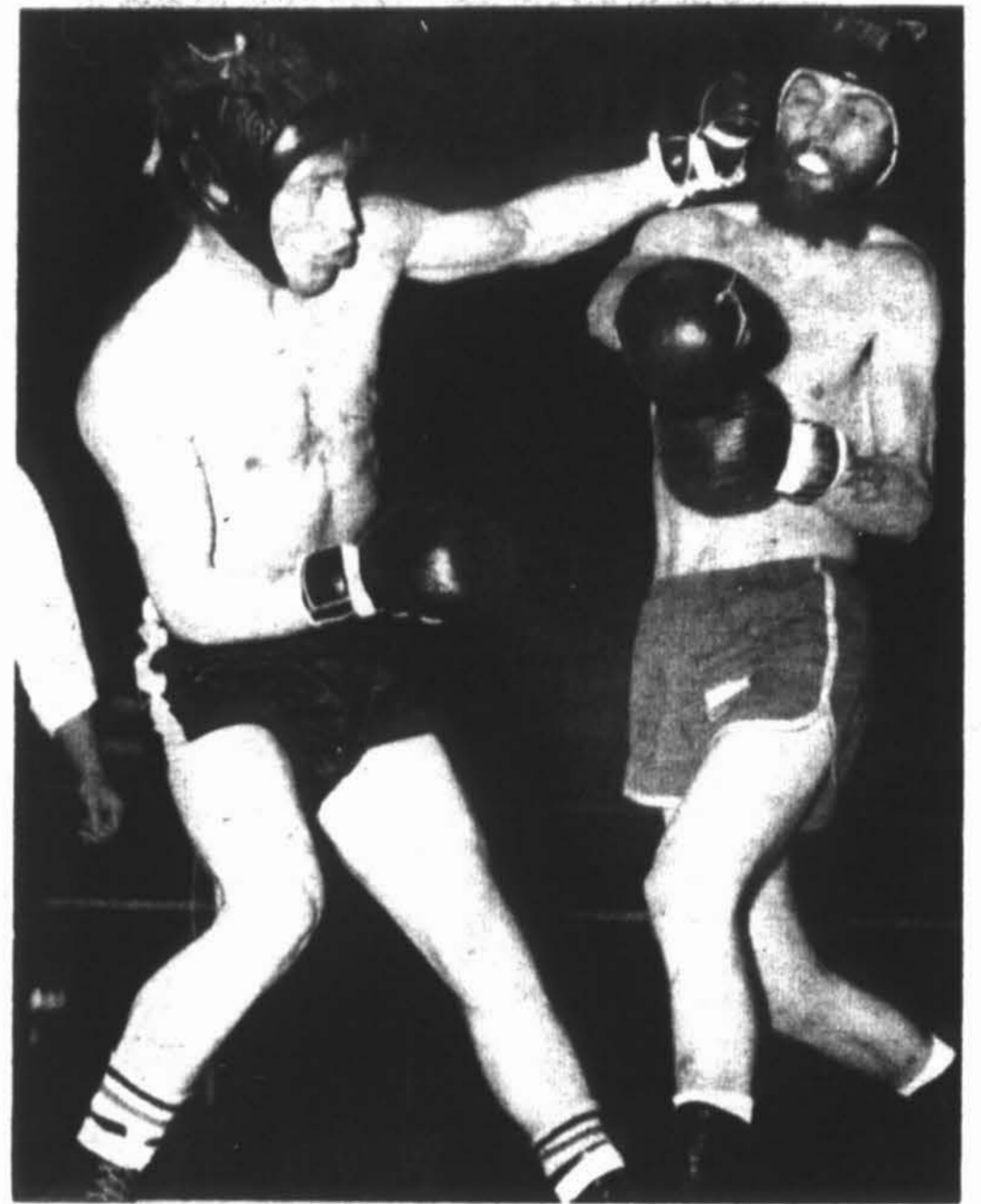
The Conservative Member for Grand Falls-White Bay-Labrador recalled that Wabush Mines had postponed plans for \$140 million expansion because of "the unfavourable tax climate."

He said he couldn't understand how the government could offer generous incentives, through DREE and other programs, to some not-so-sound projects, yet did nothing to assist Wabush.

Peddle described the government's attitude as "irresponsible"; he suggested as well that those who loudly proclaim that Canada controls its own destiny have probably discouraged millions of dollars of foreign investment. "I cannot buy the suggestion that this country of 20 million people does not want U.S. or other foreign investment."

He said that in Labrador, with its riches in ores, "common sense indicates that this government

## Editorially Speaking

**WHAT A POLITICAL MESS!** On Thursday, 28 Oct. the voters of this Province went to the polls — after a period of 5 years and 7 weeks — to confirm or reject the government of Joseph Roberts Smallwood. Fifty six per cent of the electorate voted against Smallwood and his candidates. Yet here we are, five weeks later, with "King Joe" still on his throne. Democracy is comparatively new — especially to the smaller areas of this Province. This was certainly proven by the actions of a Deputy Returning Officer in St. Barbe South. It seems this lady has been electing Popes for the past number of years. As is the practice in Rome when the Cardinals meet to choose a Pontiff — votes are burnt after each ballot — the returning officer burnt all votes following rejection of "King Joe." Unfortunately for the P.C. Party, this is not normal procedure and a by-election seems almost certain.

Aurora suggest to "the powers that be" that this exercise be cancelled and instead a new General Election called. It is now obvious that unless "King Joe" and his henchmen are overwhelmingly rejected by the populace "his Majesty" will continue to cling to power. Words from certain sources — especially Mr. D. Jamieson, Ottawa — that the Province cannot afford an election right now have an empty ring. "King Joe" has been rejected by 5 out of every 9 voters in Newfoundland & Labrador, yet he refuses to let go the reins of Government.

During the past several weeks we have attended a number of local meetings. On every occasion the matter of contacting a Provincial Government Minister has arisen. But whom do we phone or write! As of this moment there must be at least five important portfolios without even an "acting" Minister. This is no way to run government! Decisions must be made and as quickly as possible. We noticed last week a picture of Provincial Government Resources Ministers meeting in Toronto captioned "Newfoundland's Minister did not attend Conference." Mr. W. Callahan was defeated in the election of 28 Oct. and at this writing not even an "actor" has been appointed.

As we see it now another Provincial General Election must be called. A visit to polls in January is not the most desirable thing — but with a "ship of state" without crew it has become a necessity.

Aurora feels an election on January 31st. would be the first suitable, available date. Whatever your political beliefs, the interests of our Province come first. We require, we want, we must have, a government that can make decisions!

## Here and There

**ST. JOHN'S APARTMENT VACANCY:** St. John's has moved from having the highest number of vacant apartments for any city in Canada during 1970 to having the eighth lowest number in 1971 for the 19 cities surveyed. The vacancy survey, conducted by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) on a semi-annual basis took place in June. The survey was initiated in the metropolitan St. John's area in June 1969 and relates only to those apartment structures containing six or more dwelling units. The last survey was confined only to those structures completed and available for rental prior to Dec. 31, 1970 and does not include row units.

The vacancy rate for June, 1971 decreased to 3.6 per cent from 20.7 per cent vacancy rate for June 1970. The eastern portion of the city has a higher vacancy rate of 5.3 per cent as compared to .5 per cent for western St. John's. When broken down into the number of bedrooms available the survey showed a rate of .4 per cent bachelor units; 2.4 per cent one bedroom apartments; 5.6 per cent in two bedroom units and no vacancies in units with three or more bedrooms. The survey is the most recent official survey conducted by CMHC. A check with St. John's major apartments holdings showed that the present unofficial vacancy rate is nil with the three major complexes recording 100 per cent occupancy.

**ALLIS-CHALMERS:** Allis-Chalmers Canada Ltd. of Montreal said is has received a contract worth more than \$2 million from the Iron Ore Co. of Canada. Delivery of rotary dryers, vibrating screens and pumps is expected during the second quarter of 1972. Allis-Chalmers Canada is a subsidiary of Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Co. of the U.S.

**COMMANDER IS WOMAN:** Yielding to women's lib but avoiding the term France's defence minister, Michel Debre, has named a woman as commander of a military base. Genevieve le Creurer, 51, whose rank is captain, is the first woman to command a French military base. She is

taking over the Dieppe Military School for women from a retiring Colonel.

**HERRING SALE:** The value of cured herring and frozen herring products exported from Canada is expected to reach \$10-million by the end of 1971, an increase of 300 per cent from the 1969 value. M.S. Strong, deputy minister, Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce, told the Fisheries Technological Conference recently that in 1969, Canada exported 177,217 hundredweight of cured herring valued at \$2.2-million. In 1970, exports rose to 400,513 hundredweight valued at \$5.78-million. Markets in 1970 included Finland,

Denmark, Norway, Sweden and West Germany. From January to July, 1971, 420,057 hundredweight were shipped abroad. This was valued at \$5.78-million. The development of European markets, Mr. Strong said, was the direct result of the initiative taken by the department in bringing a herring buyers' mission from Europe to Canada in 1969.

**CHURCHILL:** Shipments through the Port of Churchill have exceeded last year's record 25 million tons and port manager Allen Wokes expects the final total will be close to 26 million tons. The port handles mainly export grain.

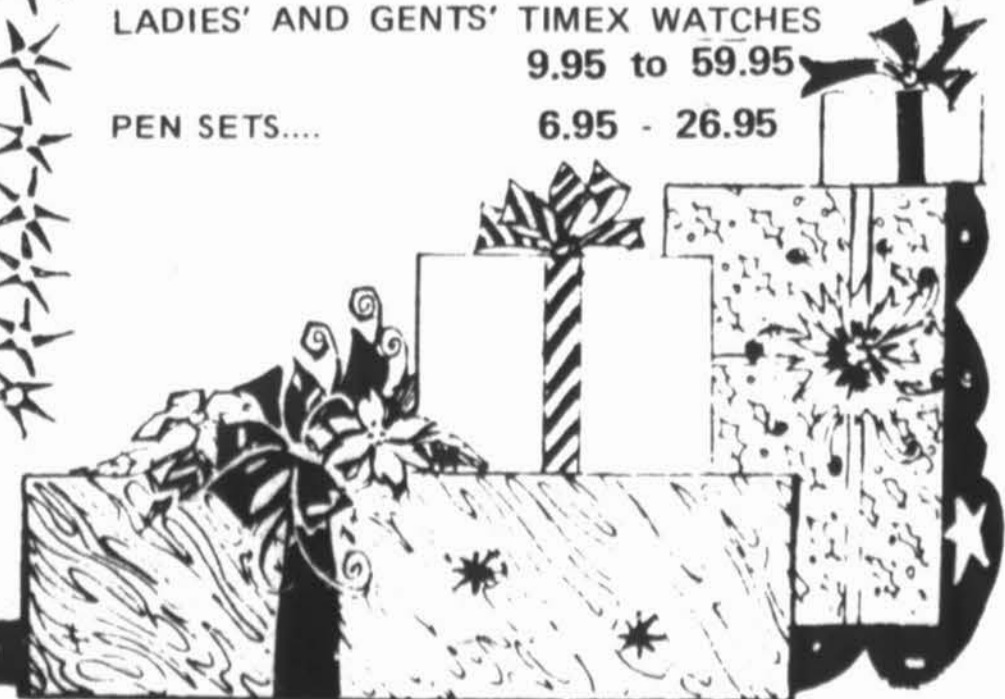

# The Labor Front

**WEST GERMAN JOBS:** The number of unemployed in West Germany in September was 146,700 or seven-tenths of 1 per cent, up from 145,800 in August, and up sharply from 97,300 a year earlier, the federal labor office says.

**'BLACKMAIL':** "The Government refuses to be blackmailed any longer by corporations setting up in Nova Scotia which find themselves in trouble with unions and construction problems," Premier Gerald Regan said recently at the final session of the Nova Scotia Federation of Labor's annual meeting. Premier Regan's main barb was at Acadia Fisheries Ltd., which closed its Canso, N.S., plant because of financial difficulties it attributes to a long fishermen's strike last year.

"We have three potential operators for the Canso plant and if none of them measures up, the Government of Nova Scotia will take over the operation and run it as we have done with the Sydney steel plant." Mr. Regan said, "If private enterprise is the answer it will be expected that the company concerned will put up

an agreeable equity. Otherwise, we will not be interested." Premier Regan declared that there will be no public money involved in the operation unless "it may be practical from a Crown corporation point of view."

Regarding the Sheet Harbor pulp mill operation of Scott Maritimes Pulp Ltd., which was closed as a result of storm damage in August, the Premier said either an amicable arrangement will be made with Scott Paper or more stringent methods will be imposed to protect the 115 workers involved. In addition to the pulp mill workers, 300 wood workers are involved.

**WAGE INCREASES:** New Brunswick Government employees will receive an additional 42 cents an hour under a new two-year contract covering 2,500 workers. The contract covers the general labor and trades group of the highways and works departments and provides a 20-cent hourly increase, retroactive to Oct. 1. The remaining 22 cents will be added to wages in October, 1972.

**60 PERCENT OF WORKERS IN SERVICE JOBS:** The service sector of the economy now employs 60 percent of Canadian workers and likely will continue to play a key role in the long-range outlook for the employment situation, according to the Bank of Nova Scotia's Monthly Review. On the short term, the bank predicts temporary U.S. economic measures will "almost certainly make a dent" in the improved employment outlook that was shaping up for the balance of this year, unless some steps are devised for cushioning the impact on sales and profit of the hardest-hit firms. At the same time, the U.S. measures should benefit Canada by providing a stimulus to U.S. business activity in general and continental auto production in particular, the bank adds.

Noting the high priority given to the problem of unemployment in government policy, the bank points out it now has become a difficult task to assess the real employment situation precisely. Through recent cycles and in long-term structural development, the Canadian Labor market has changed in many ways since 1960. A rapid growth in the labor force since 1965 has been fed by vastly larger numbers of new entrants and by a greater portion of women at work, linked especially with a big expansion of service em-

ployment. The increasing proportion of young people in the working force has had an impact on over-all seasonal employment swings, and strikes have had indirect impacts.

Against this background, the bank notes a firming of employment in the first six months of 1971 and sees an average year-of-year growth of 2 percent - "still not sufficient, of course, to keep step with the labor force growth, let alone to begin to overtake it." Looking at a longer perspective, employment growth has not mirrored output growth which has been concentrated mainly in capital intensive manufacturing industries, utilities and mining. The amount of direct employment stemming from these activities was modest, but indirectly they produced expanded demand for all kinds of goods and services. Hence service industries have shown a two-thirds increase in jobs during the past 10 years.

This trend seems likely to continue, in the bank's view. There will be increasing demands for more sophisticated business and personal services, as well as for public services such as education and health. But employment will also depend on advances in goods-producing industries, just as it did in the Sixties. "It must be hoped that a momentum will develop around some key areas and thereby generate expansion of em-

ployment, "But this would take time. Mayor improvement in the margin of unemployment seems a fairly long way ahead, the bank concludes.

**BRITISH LEYLAND:** Coventry Climax Ltd., a subsidiary of British Leyland Motor Corp. Ltd. of Britain, is to dismiss 140 employees producing fork-lift trucks because of a shortage of orders. The 140 represent 20 per cent of those engaged in the manufacture of this product.

**WOMEN'S WAGES RISING FAST:** The economic side of the women's liberation question is as hotly debated in Germany as in other countries. A recent survey by the Institute of German Industry shows that German women, in general, receive lower incomes than do men. But wages of female workers have risen considerably more sharply and salaries of women employees somewhat more steeply than those of their male colleagues. For example, in 1957-70 hourly industrial pay rose 175 percent for male and 207.5 percent for female wage earners. White-collar workers have lagged somewhat behind wage earners in the rapidity of pay increase. Gross weekly wages of male wage-earners rose 163 percent in 1957-70, gross monthly salaries of employees only 152 percent.

owes it to the people of Canada and to the people of our province to provide every possible incentive to see that the territory is developed, and not discouraged." Peddle accused the government of a policy of confrontation: "Confront everybody with a white paper which staggers them so they do not know whether they are coming or going."

"A government that is elected by the people should have the intestinal fortitude to govern without trying to cover every track they make politically. The government should be prepared to introduce tax changes which would encourage development."

### MANPOWER PROGRAM SUCCESSFUL

Skill training through the Canada Manpower Training Program has resulted in employment for 78 per cent of the 5,235 course graduates surveyed in the Atlantic Provinces.

William C. Stewart, Director General, Manpower and Immigration, Atlantic said the survey was encouraging, especially when compared with the national average.

The Atlantic Region percentage of graduates finding jobs was higher than the national rate of 76.5 per cent.

The survey covers the first nine months of 1970 and deals with graduates of skill retraining and skill upgrading courses.

"When compared with 1969, more emphasis seems to have been placed on upgrading and improving, existing skills rather than retraining for new occupations," Mr. Stewart said.

During the survey period, 71.6

per cent of retraining course graduates found employment as compared with 88.1 per cent in the skill upgrading training.

Last year 67.6 per cent of retraining graduates and 81.5 per cent of upgrading graduates found work.

"Although the 1970 training outcome reflects only the situation in the first nine months," said Mr. Stewart, "the outflow of graduates in the last three months of the year is not likely to change the overall comparability."

He explained the relatively higher post training employment rate for upgrading graduates as "mainly due to the experience and seniority of these individuals who would have returned to their former jobs during the survey period."

Nearly 92 per cent of the upgrading course graduates in the transport and communication field found employment within four months of graduation; 87 per cent were employed in the mechanics and repairman field; 88 per cent in machining, welding, plumbing, sheet metal, and related occupations; and 88 per cent in hunting, trapping, fishing, logging and mining.

"And graduates of skill upgrading training were also able to find work in their field of study more successfully than those taking skill retraining instructions," Mr. Stewart said.

Sixty-eight per cent of those surveyed for skill upgrading were able to find work in the area of their course study, while 28 per cent were able to do so upon successful completion of skill retraining.

"These results show that people met the challenge of today's fast changing work world, and are striving to ensure that they get and keep a significant place in it," said Mr. Stewart.

The charm of this region, however, lies in the Andalusian people and their natural way of life which makes the Costa del Sol a memorable holiday resort. The Phoenicians founded Malaga in the 12th century B.C. and they were followed successively by the Greeks, the Romans and the Arabs who brought their culture and their customs here in the 7th century A.D. The result, which is evident even today in the folklore of the people and in the architectural richness of the surroundings, has been a unique blending of these ancient civilizations.

Come to the Costa del Sol in February and you will become a part of the gay, spectacular Winter Festival which features folk dancing, including its version of the traditional Spanish flamenco. In addition, there is a

variety of sporting events such as golf championships, regattas and horse races. Later in the year, the Holy Week celebrations are regarded among the most beautiful in all Spain, rivalling, in fact, the magnificent Holy Week Fiesta of Seville, Malaga, too, is one of the few places in Spain where bull fights are held throughout the year. Throughout this culturally-rich setting one of the Mediterranean's most fashionable and fascinating holiday resorts has been developed. Modern, luxurious hotels cluster around favored beaches and attractive coves, creating havens of relaxation and holiday enjoyment in what were, but a few years ago, secluded villages.

Yet in spite of the rise of large hotels and holiday playgrounds, the traditional life of the villages goes on unconcerned. First of these villages to reach fame in the tourist world was Torremolinos, no more than a dozen kilometres from Malaga. No Benalmadena, Fuengirola and Marbella have joined in the development of the Costa del Sol. Further inland, up a spectacular, winding road over the Sierra de las Nieves, lies Ronda, noted for its steep little cobblestoned streets and ancient whitewashed houses perched precariously on the very brink of deep, wooded cliffs. Fly CP Air from Montreal to Madrid, connecting with domestic flights to Malaga. Or, you can take a CP Air flight to Lisbon, then motorcoach tour through southern Portugal to Seville and over the Sierras to Malaga.

Greek Line is offering "bonus plan" cruises to the Caribbean this winter. The price is reduced, but not the service, entertainment or festivities the line says. Under the "bonus plan", for double cabins, one person pays the published tariff rate while the co-occupant pays only the minimum rate. The "bonus plan" is being offered on the first two Caribbean cruises of the 1971 season: Nov. 29 and Dec. 13 aboard the Olympia - and on the following 1972 departures from New York: Jan. 7 and 15; Nov. 27 and Dec. 11, 1972.

**ST. JOHN'S DOCK:** Canadian National Railways laid off 28 men at its St. John's dockyard recently because of a seasonal decline in ship-repair work. CN says the layoff comes a little later than usual this year.

**HANDS OFF, PLEASE:** Parliament member Marcus Lipton wants the Chancellor of the Exchequer to loosen Britain's grip on the chastity belt. "I want him to reverse the ruling of Customs and Excise that chastity belts are items of clothing and not a safety device, and therefore eligible for Purchase tax," Lipton says. A 70-year-old widower, Lipton says his interests in chastity belts are purely academic. "They are valuable dollar earners and play an important part in our balance of payments," he explains.

**PHONE COSTS CUT:** Bell Canada cut rates on long-distance calls late at night and on Sundays in Ontario and Quebec for a six-month trial period beginning on Nov. 28. Charges for calls made between 11 p.m. and 8 a.m. were cut by one third and for Sunday calls between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. the present rate was cut by 50 per cent.

# Mining News

**JAVELIN:** John C. Doyle, chairman of the executive committee of Canadian Javelin Ltd. of St. John's, denied allegations made against him and Canadian Javelin during the recent Newfoundland election campaign and said the statements were made "to further the interest of others." The company earlier attributed the weakness in its shares to some of the pre-and post-election charges. The closing price on the Montreal Stock exchange was down to \$10.00. On the American Stock Exchange the closing price was \$9.87.

During the campaign, the Progressive Conservative Party questioned the soundness of certain deals made by Liberal Premier Joseph Smallwood with Canadian Javelin and Mr. Doyle. Latest results of the election show the Conservatives have a one-vote edge in the Legislature, but Mr. Smallwood says he will not step down until there is a vote recount and a possible court challenge. Mr. Doyle, answering allegations that Canadian Javelin received too large a royalty for mineral rights in Labrador, said "it must not be forgotten that it was Javelin and its shareholders that spent the initial risk funds both on development planning of the ore body and on a railway there." All agreements made with the Province have been the subject of legislative acts of Newfoundland, he added.

The work on Javelin's new linerboard plant at Stephenville has been closely supervised by independent accountants and consulting engineers, he said. Mr. Doyle says Javelin has made "a significant contribution" to Newfoundland and plans to continue its business operations there. Responsible provincial governments in Canada do not refuse to honor their contracts.

**BRINCO:** Brinco Ltd. said its exploration subsidiary, British Newfoundland Exploration Ltd., and Golden Eagle Canada Ltd. have entered into a joint venture with Mobil Oil Canada Ltd. to search for oil and gas in western Newfoundland. Seismic exploration will begin immediately. If results are encouraging, Mobil has the right to drill in the area.

**POLICIES AND MINING GROWTH:** Canadian mining men are growing increasingly apprehensive about the effects on their industry of the government's tax policies.

Specifically, these will mean the removal of the current three-year exemption from income taxes for new mines and the depletion allowances now charged against earnings and are to be replaced by a fast writeoff. Most commentators up to now talked of a period of five-10 years before the effects of the tax measures on growth would be felt. Now some opinion sees adverse effects coming sooner than that. The mining industry in British Columbia in the immediate future is facing times more uncertain than any period in the past decade, President Thomas H. McLelland of the Mining Association of British Columbia, said recently.

McLelland, who also is president of Placer Development Ltd., said "Today we are enjoying the momentum established under the more favorable economic and legislative climate that prevailed during the 1960's." (His remarks apply equally to the rest of Canadian mining.) But, he said, "the outlook for 1972 and immediately succeeding years is not comparably as favorable. "Sharp declines are forecast for claim-staking, exploration and development expenditures and new plant construction. There are convincing indications venture capital, the lifeblood of our industry, was up 30 per cent to a record \$352 million in 1970. Cumulative 10-year total to 1970 was more than \$1.500 million. "Certainly the economy of this province would be in a much worse position than it is today were it not for the thousands of men engaged on construction of new mining plants and for the large number of new and permanent jobs opening up every month as these plants commence production," the president said.

**LIBERIAN IRON:** Liberian Iron Ore Ltd. of Charlottetown, P.E.I. reports unaudited profit for the nine months ended Sept. 30 of \$3,724,000 or 94 cents a share, compared with \$4,792,000 or \$1.21 a share for the corresponding period in 1970. Third-quarter profit was \$1,360,000 or 34 cents a share, compared with 1,485,000 or 37 cents a share for the 1970 quarter.

**TIMMINS: GROWING MINING COMMUNITY:** Timmins, a town that faced the dilemma of a declining gold mining industry, is now building a healthy economy

on base metal mining. Texas Gulf Sulphur Co. discovered a huge zinc-copper-silver-lead-cadmium orebody in April, 1964. Since then there has been continual growth and expansion, not only in mining, but also in service industries, housing, tourism and highway construction. The population of Timmins was 27,937 in 1970. Continued growth is expected to boost this to 41,800 by 1976 and 45,000 by 1981. Studies are under way to consolidate the town of Timmins with three neighboring townships which would bring population immediately to 42,000. Here are some of the town's more interesting recent or in-progress projects.

Sheridan Geophysics Ltd., in cooperation with Texmont Mines Ltd. developed a \$3-million nickel mine, south of Timmins in Bartlett and Geikie Townships, which began full production in June. This development created 125 new jobs.

Noranda Mines Ltd. in partnership with International Nickel Co. of Canada is developing a second nickel mine in the area, Langmuir Township. Construction is under way on the 10-million dollar project.

Texas Gulf Sulphur has underground development in progress at its Texas Gulf mine site that will convert the present open-pit operation to underground operation. This will create an additional 350-400 jobs. The switch to underground from open-pit is significant in terms of jobs in the area because employment is much higher in underground mining.

Construction of a new waferboard plant (Aspenite Board) at an estimated cost of more than \$4 million is under way in the area. This plant will employ approximately 120.

Construction was started on a \$40-million housing project, providing 2,500-3,000 houses for more than 10,000 people. This project will cover 300 acres and include a \$3 million-\$5 million, 19-acre indoor shopping mall.

A new shopping mall has just opened in downtown Timmins. The three-story, \$2.5-million structure has a major food store, 15 other retail outlets and 40,000 square feet of office space.

Canadian Jamieson Mines Ltd., Toronto, is at work trying to establish the economic feasibility of still another nickel property, also in Langmuir Township.
