On the local scene

THE YEAR 1971 IN REVIEW FROM THE FILES OF AURORA: PICTURES COVERING THESE EVENTS ARE ALSO PUBLISHED.

JANUARY

In our first issue of 1971 we carried pictures and an account of the Pee-Wee Invitational Hockey Tournament, which was won by Sept Iles.

The first baby of 1971 was born to Mrs. E. MacDonald of Wabush at 1:20 a.m., Jan. 1. Her daughter weighed 6 lbs. 3 oz. Mother and daughter were presented with several gifts and certificates donated by Chamber of Commerce and various business concerns in the area.

Editorially speaking reported a crime wave in the area.

At mid month, we noted clubs and restaurants had been granted extended hours of operation by the Provincial Liquor Commission. We noted that December 1970 had been a particularly cold month with the average temperature being 6.7 degrees below zero.

Aurora reported the Motor Registration Department made a brief, almost unannounced visit to this area. Only 1,200 of the estimated 2,200 local private vehicles were licensed by the Provincial authorities.

The Carol Players of Labrador City and Wabush were selected to perform in the National Arts Centre in Ottawa at the 1971 National Festival. They presented their own adaptation of Hammond Innes' novel *THE LAND GOD GAVE TO CAIN*.

FEBRUARY

In our first edition of February we reported McNamara Construction Ltd. had been awarded a \$9-million contract to construct a 12,000 ft. tunnel and shaft for Iron Ore Company of Canada—as part of the company's Labrador City Expansion.

1971 Winter Carnival: At a recent meeting of the Labrador City-Wabush 1971 Carnival Committee, it was decided that this year's Winter Carnival will be held from Friday Evening 12 March to Wednesday 17 March. The slight change from the original dates will allow for more events over the opening week-end.

In our editorial of 3 February we noted Mr. Ambrose Peddle M.P. had prepared a brief for presentation to the House of Commons Standing Electoral Committee, requesting Labrador be given a separate seat in Ottawa.

Early in February Aurora reported "A" League Hockey was being led by Saints—followed by Huskies and Braves.

In "B" League it was Huskies, Indians and Juniors. Also under

Cover for our second paper, pictured the Carol Ladies Curling Team, Provincial Champs. We later reported our local team—representing this Province in the Canada finals held in St. John's—compiled a 4 win-5 loss record. Defeating Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P.E.I.

Several meetings were held in connection with Winter Carnival.

An excellent Boxing Match between "Irish" Pat Murphy and Terry Hayward was witnessed by a capacity crowd—the New Yorker took a 10-round decision.

A branch of the Retarded Children's Association was formed during this month.

Sports was the big news in our last February Issue. Pee Wee Hockey Team participating in Quebec City International Tournament. Pictures of local Smokey Mountain Ski Club teams were carried in two issues. This youthful team turned in a tremendous performance at the Canada Winter Games. Labrador City-Wabush area became the new Curling capital of Newfoundland during the month.

As noted above, Sue Ann Bartlett, Anne Bright, Frances Hiscock and Mavis Pike won Ladies. In Men's, Jim Ward's team lost the Championship 10-9 on last stone. And, making a terrific comeback, Provincial Mixed was won by Horst & Hilde Illing—Jack and Sue Ann Bartlett of Carol Curling Club.

MARCH

Of course, the big local news during March was the annual Winter Carnival. Honourable R. L. Stanfield, Leader of the Federal Progressive Conservative Party visited the area during this event and attended several functions.

Following requests from a number of readers Aurora printed a questionnaire regarding Daylight Saving Time. Later in the month we forwarded nearly 300 signatures...in favor...to the Minister of Provincial Affairs in St. John's.

The Carol Players presented "The Land God Gave to Cain" at the Notre Dame Academy on March 6-7, 13-14.

The Local Chamber of Commerce held their annual meeting at which Mr. John Morency was elected President for the forthcoming year.

Aurora expressed regret in the passing of Hon. W. J. Keough, Minister of Labor.

We carried a four page supplement on Education Week, March 7-13.

"Fuddle Duddle" won first place in the Ice Sculptures during Carnival with "Snoopy and the Baron" placing second followed by "Lady in a Shoe."

First prize in Float Winners was Notre Dame Academy, second—S.P.C.A., third—Kule TOPS of Wabush.

Skiers from Sept Iles, Scheferville and Baie Comeau arrived during Carnival to compete for the "Iron Mug."

Huskies defeated Braves in Senior "A" semi finals four games to three. Huskies and Saints met in the finals with Huskies taking the silverware.

Municipal program for Labrador City was released.

Plans were also announced for a new ball field.

Towards month end we printed editorially, that the fifth and final session of Newfoundland's 34th assembly had opened.

APRIL

Aurora noted Stephenville and Gander were to receive mail home delivery service during the coming summer and suggested local authorities make representation to have this service extended to Labrador City.

School Board's—Teacher's Dispute: We have it on good authority that the local branch of the Newfoundland Teacher's Association, last week, almost unanimously rejected a further offer from the various School Boards, in our area. Understand a meeting to discuss a further course of action by the school teachers, will be held immediately after the Easter break.

Carol Lakers are again Intermediate "A" Provincial

Hockey Champs. They captured their 3rd. straight win with a come-from-behind victory over Clarenville.

Saturday and Sunday 10-11 April—Smokey Mountain Ski Club hosted Eastern Canadian Skiing Championships.

Minor Hockey's "Mom's Club" presented a cheque of \$1,000.00 towards minor hockey activities in the area.

The Carol Curling Club held an Invitational Bonspiel, featuring six attractive "Playmates."

The Polaris Figure Skating Club presented their annual ice show, at the Arena—"Polaris on Parade". The first half of the show was devoted mainly to the children, with a presentation of "Babes in Toyland". 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Editorially Speaking

A SHAMEFUL PROVINCE: As year ends, residents of Newfoundland and Labrador should hang their heads in shame. On October 28, 1971, every vestige of democracy died in this Province. The right for which millions died in World Wars I & II and thousands were casualties earlier this month in India and Pakistan — was denied us. The Government of Smallwood was legally voted out of office by over 55 percent of the electorate — yet the Dictator has refused to resign. He has managed to stay in power by using legal trickery. Who are these people who keep this tyrant in office — “Creatures of the Master.”

1. Returning officers, deputy returning officers, poll clerks, etc. In practically all cases (Labrador West was one exception) these are “ward heelers” of a corrupt administration.

2. Magistrate Strong, chief electoral officer, a known political appointment.

3. Judges of Newfoundland Supreme Court: Puddester, Mifflin and Higgins were personal choices of Smallwood.

4. Lieutenant Governor: Insurance Salesman Harnum has been a close personal friend of “Oppressive Joe” for many years.

Would any of these speak out against their “Creator?” Of course not! They will follow directives of their master.

During recent days I have read editorial comments in Quebec City, Edmonton and Toronto dailies on the current political situation in this Province. All deplore Smallwood's hanging onto power. Two papers compare him to Hitler (A person he admired) and the third speaks of Federal Government support. As one of Canada's leading paper states, the people of Newfoundland & Labrador must be a pretty docile lot. Nowhere else in this “so called free world” would such a condition be permitted. If the people had any intestinal fortitude the man would be tarred and feathered and hung up by his ankles. Yet he goes on his way as if no election had been held. His “lucky” Ministers are announcing projects — spending public funds — making appointments — as before. Defeated Liberal candidates are being given civil service jobs. “Lap-Dog” Fred Rowe is now a Senator.

It is obvious this creature cannot be removed by normal means. An old proverb says: “The pen is mightier than the sword,” but I'm afraid such is not so in this. We have always been against physical violence but the situation now peculiar to Newfoundland & Labrador requires abnormal action — and the sooner the better. Not a very nice thought as year ends but not a very nice dilemma to be in.

The Lieut. Governor of Newfoundland, Hon. E. John A. Harnum visited the area. Prime reason for his visit was to officially open A.P. Low School in Labrador City.

Department of Transport announced approximately \$373,000.00 is to be spent — this year — to upgrade facilities at Wabush Airport.

Local Darts Clubs were in the midst of playoffs to decide a representative for Provincial finals being held here later this month. (Ashuanipi Social Club were winners).

At mid-month Newfoundland & Labrador's R.C. Bishops (including Archbishop P. J. Skinner of St. John's) and members of the R.C. Denominational Advisory Education Board, visited the area and held deliberation at Sir Wilfred Grenfell Hotel.

Local Improvement District of Labrador City decreed May 17th to May 22nd. as “Clean Up Week.”

May was also The Salvation Army Red Shield Month. Approximately \$3,000.00 was collected.

POPULATION UP IN NINE PROVINCES:
Canada's population stood at 21,681,000 (estimated) on June 1, 1971. That's an increase of 1.4 percent over the June, 1970, estimate of 21,377,000. Estimates are based on birth and death registrations and immigration statistics. For the purpose of estimating interprovincial migration, Family Allowance statistics are used. British Columbia, Ontario and Alberta were the fastest growing provinces, while Saskatchewan lost some of its population.

IV—Intermediate FOLLOW THROUGH

As in most sports, the follow-through is an important part of your technique. Many skiers initiate a turn with a good movement and then ruin it by a poor follow-through. As the skis come around in a rotary motion, you must keep the weight on the downhill ski and drive the knees forward and into the turn. At the same time, follow through with the outside arm and project it in the direction of the new turn.

As the arm follows through, it will end up in a position slightly ahead of the hips and ready for the next pole plant and the new turn. The important thing is that you go right from the follow-through to the new pole plant. This will link your turns together smoothly. Be careful not to let your uphill hand fall behind the hips as you come forward with the downhill hand. This could lead to over-rotation.

Adoption program continues set records

December has again been declared "Adoption Month" by Social Services and Rehabilitation Minister Steve Neary.

The 1971 Children's Crusade for Adoptions posters along with suggested material for Adoptions Month sermons have been mailed to clergy throughout the province. Additional copies of the posters have been sent to hotels, restaurants, and business firms throughout the province to draw

further attention to the program.

"As we enter our third annual Children's Crusade," says Mr. Neary, "we do so under most auspicious circumstances."

"The end of November shows the number of provincial wards available and suitable for adoption to have dropped to 310 from well over double that figure when we first initiated the program two years ago.

"It is really thrilling to think

that we have not only been able to place the children who have been becoming provincial wards each month, but have been able to find mothers, fathers, and homes of their own for over three hundred children in that 'backlog' of six hundred which had developed prior to the first Adoptions Sunday held in 1969."

The 23 adoptions finalized in November, 1971, brought to 315 the total since April of this year. Of the 310 little children now available for adoption 194 are boys and 106 are girls.

By denominations 166 are listed as Roman Catholic, 54 Anglican, 47 United Church, 11 Salvation Army, 18 Pentecostal and 4 "other".

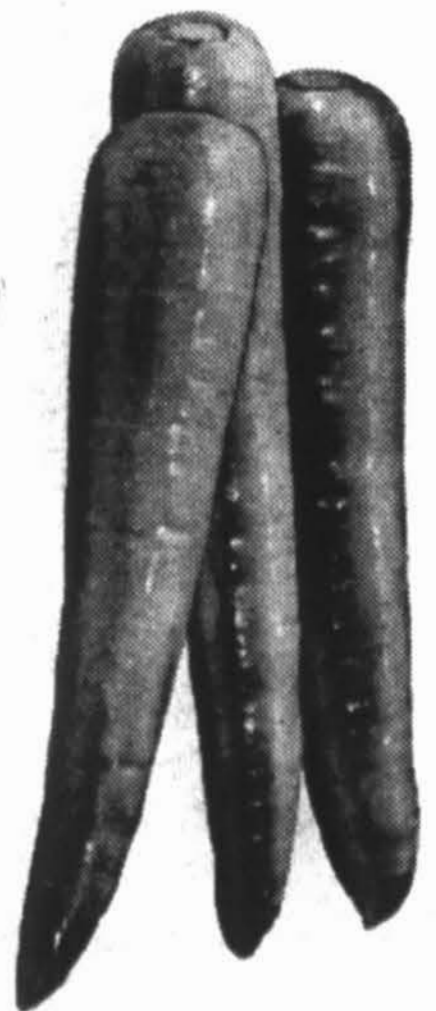

With respect to Item 6 of the Terms of Reference of the Commission "Growth of Road Networks, Etc."

It is hereby submitted that the following road developments are considered to be of great importance to the well being of the present residents of Labrador, and to the future growth and development of the region:

1. Upgrading and year round maintenance of the recently constructed road from the Goose Bay-Happy Valley area to Churchill Falls. This road has been constructed for access purposes to the power developments on the Churchill River, but also completes the final link in a year round, surface route from the Lake Melville settlements to the railhead at Esker. This route is very important to these settlements, as the only other surface route to them is by water, and this is icebound for up to 5 months each year.

2. Construction of approximately 60 miles of road from Esker to the Wabush-Labrador City area. There are several very good routes for this road, and construction costs should not be high. Construction of this road will complete a route linking all the principal settlements of Northern and Western Labrador, and will also tie them to the main Canadian Highway System via the Quebec System, which should be extended to the Labrador Boundary close to Labrador City in the near future.

3. Eventual completion of a road link from the Goose Bay-Happy Valley area to the Labrador Coast near Forteau. This would link up the communities of Northern and Western Labrador with the Southern coastal settlements. It would also tie these settlements, via their presently developing local road system, to the Canadian Highway System, in conjunction with 1 & 2 above. This step would also complete the Eastern Highway link in the Conceptual mid-Canada Corridor road system, by providing a Northern route to and from the Island of Newfoundland via Ferry, Tunnel, or Causeway across the Strait of Belle Isle.

It is further submitted that a large degree of Federal Government participation will be necessary to construct and maintain this road system in the near future.

In spite of this, in view of the importance of the development of Canada's Northland, and in consideration of the great contribution which the people of the Labrador Region make to the Provincial and National Economy, it is imperative that both levels of Government take all necessary steps to furnish these people with the minimum level of public service and convenience that a highway system provides.

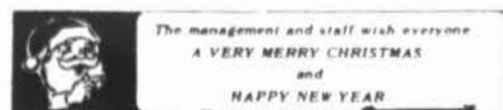
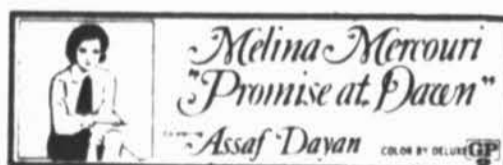
