Those were the days when a man could make a better than average living because of the abundance of overtime. However this does not apply today, with the gradually decreasing overtime. A man finds that he must now live on a paycheck of 40 hours a week. After the government has taken it's share, a more than generous share, rent is paid, groceries, clothing and the other necessities of life are purchased, we find very little, if any, to put away for a rainy day.

The merchants, instead of making thier prices suitable to our incomes, are raising prices away beyond any reasonable reach. In fact, they have soared from the ridiculous to the sublime.

Many good people, the kind this town needs to survive, may find in thier minds that it is now time to move to greener pastures. The same wage can be made in many parts of Canada where the cost of living may be as much as 50% less. Many ask: " Why should I stay here?"

The answer to this, my friends, is that given a chance, Labrador City can be one of the better places to live, especially when we consider all we have here. Fine schools, with well educated teachers for our children, every mentionable form of recreation, fine homes, paved streets, all which go to make up a fine modern town, with a very bright future.

This all leads back to the Carol Consumers Assoc. We, the members of the Assoc. will endeavor with every means possible to reduce the cost of living in our towns. To make it a decent place to live for people to raise thier families, and to insure a better Labrador for the future.

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#### Wabush Activies as reported by Red Cross Water Safety Chairman Bill Rough

Adult swimming classes being completed about April 10th --150 men and wemen in 4 beginner, 2 junior, 2 intermediate, and 2 senior classes. Instructors Bob Hollett, Mike Timmons, Wayne May, Dave Conway, Ron Brophy, Claris Rudkowski, Karl Rauchberger, Bill Ebbs, and Bill Rough.

Our second Y.M.C.A. Skin Diving and Scuba class was examined on March 8th by Milton D'Ganigian of the Montreal Downtown Y.M.C.A. The results are eagerly awaited by the 16 people who took the exams, but it will be a few weeks before the results can be announced. In the meantime, each person who does not have one must qualify for a Royal Life Bronze medallion. This course too is now in full swing for 13 people of the Scuba course so that they may qualify for their Scuba certificate. Instructors for the Scuba course were Donna Wortelboer, and Ron Brophy, assisted by Mike Timmons, Norm Genge, Dr. Colin Moseley and Garland Jennings. The instructors for the bronze are Ron Brophy and Donna Wortelboer and others will assist as needed.

Children's Classes continue from 9 A.M. to 4 P.M. every school day and on Saturday mornings. About 220 students and children participate weekly. Instructors are Dave Conway, France Belanger and Bob Hollett.

A Bronze medallion course was completed in Febuary. Results are not announced yet. The following took their Bronze exam.- Ken Bazilsky, Bob Martin, Edgar Hunt, Frank Sullivan, Jessie Hollett, Jim Young, Kevin Barry, Lucie Gregoire, Terry McGregor, and Bruce Adam. Another Y.M.C.A. Scubacourse starts March 22nd and the Red Cross Water Safety Instructors Course is planned as soon as the present Bronze course is completed, about the end of April.

A Scuba Club has been formed and formally named " The Sub Aqua Club ". President is Mike Timmons, Vice-President is Fintan March, Secretary Donna Wortelboer, Treasurer Bill Rough, and Dive Master Norm Genge. Membership is limited to those holding a nationally reconized Scuba Diver's Certificate.

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#### FIRST AID TO SNOWMOBILERS IS BOOMING BUSINESS

People have driven snowmobiles off 50-foot cliffs, into open water, into trees, and other snowmobiles. They have done damage to themselves and other people that ranged from minor sprains to fatal injury.

To find out what kind of injuries are occurring and why, a study has been made of 3 years of snowmobile accidents as they show on Peterborough Ont. hospital records. They have shown a marked increase, from 8, four years ago to 105 last year. Dr. L.J. Calvert of Peterborough, provincial surgeon for the St. John Ambulance, requested the report. St. John is providing courses in first aid for snowmobilers and is increasing the number of snowmobiles for its own people in the snow belt.

DR. Calvert says: " There were probably about twice as many people treated by independant doctors as by hospitals. It looks as though, in addition to car and motercycle accidents, there will be these."

There were 18 head injuries, mostly caused by people falling or being catapulted over the top of the machine. There were eye injuries caused by branches, fence wire or broken glasses.

" This would indicate safety glasses should be mandatory. We think 20 percent of the injuries would have been prevented if people had been wearing hard hats and safety glasses."

The accidents took assorted forms. People fell off, turned sharply and tipped the machine or collided with things. Some of them ran into diving boards while cruising on ice.

" Two people drove out into space at high speed- one off a 50-foot cliff. One went up a ramp and fell into a burned-out barn.

" We know of 28 deaths in Ontario in association with snowmobiles. Six of them were by drowning; one died of exporure because he was too far from help.

" Three- quaters of the group were men, usually older men. The snowmobile is not a child's toy, though people are treating them like outboard motors, letting kids run around in them."

A snowmobiler himself, Dr. Calvert says the machines are not dangerous unless they are used dangerously. He says most of the accidents in the report were unnecessary, the result of over-confidence or thoughtlessness.

There were 42 soft-tissue injuries, eight ankle sprains, five knee injuries, two cases of bursitis, and 25 fractures, some of them severe.

" People dangle a foot going around a curve. One girl's foot got caught in the snowmobiles track and twisted right around backwards. She had to lie face downwards in the snow until someone freed her.

" It behooves somebody to know how to take one of these things apart.

" Night time accidents and injuries accounted for 30 percent of the total accidents in our report.

" One way to prevent accidents is to know the trail you are going on. You don't go full trottle down a trail you don't know. You might hit a pothole just filled with snow....

" You should have snowshoes, or travel in pairs. If you get into trouble far from help, you should have an axe, cut down a tree, start a fire and relax, get mentally cooled off. You can't walk through deep snow, and the numbing factor of cold impairs your good judgement, even if it is normally good.

" You should, of course, wear suitable clothing, including proper mitts and footwear.

" You should know how to run the machine properly. People think it's a toy, it is not.

" And they are not as easily handled if they are pulling something. One man towing a toboggan cracked the whip and threw two kids under a car."
