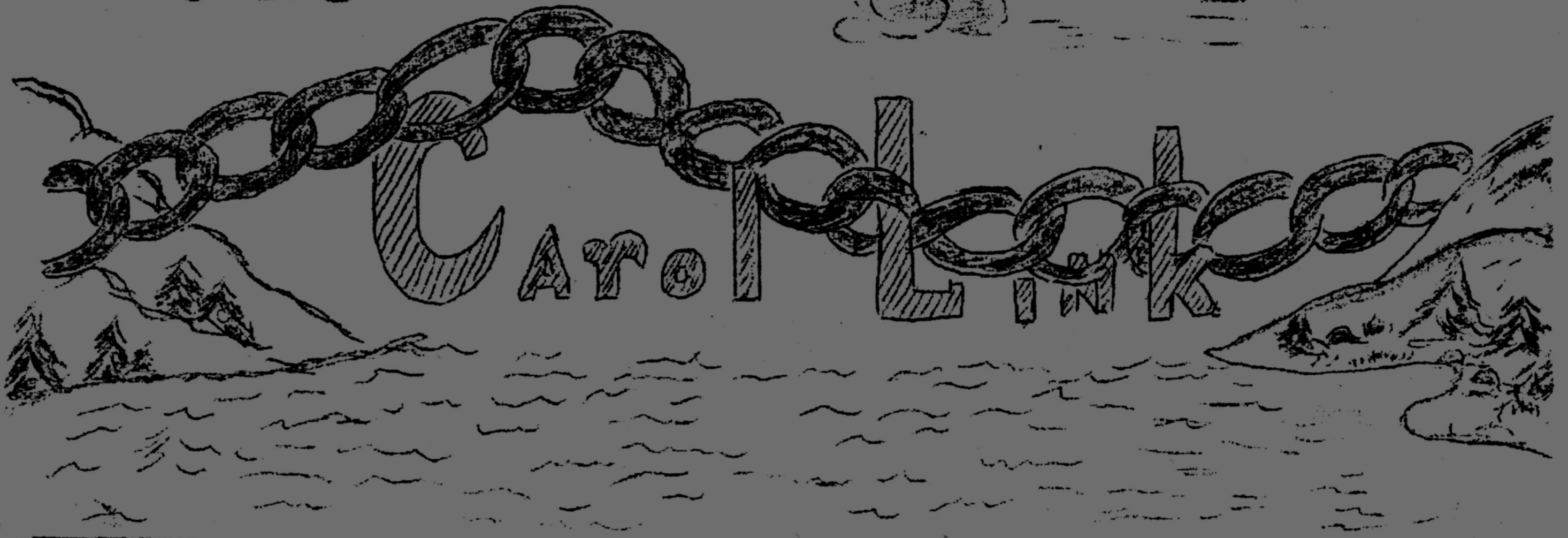

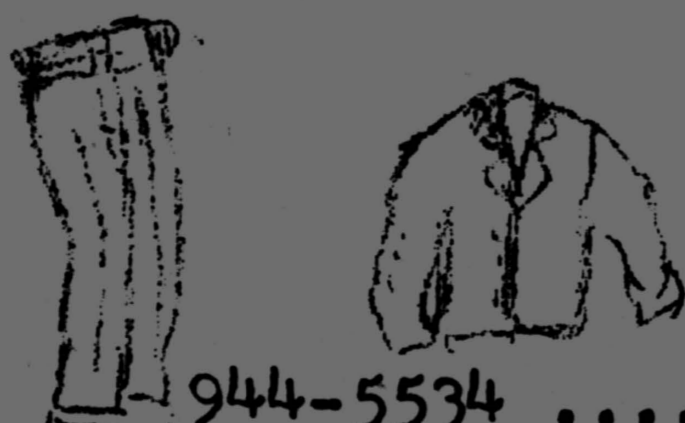

This week's food prices showed a definite improvement at Bowrings. A 10 oz. jar of Nescafe was a good special, as were tomatoes at 29¢ per lb. And most of their basic foods regular prices were lower than at Dominion. At the same time we observed that several luxury items e.g. frozen cakes & pastries etc., canned cream, klix and other canned meats & vegetables were cheaper at Dominion. In both stores the fresh produce was FRESH. This, once more underlines the advantages of comparing prices before buying. There is still a large differential between Labrador City and Wabush prices and those prevailing in our neighbouring town of Sept. Iles, which cannot be explained away by transportation costs.

The best buys in children's clothing were to be found in Woolworths. (Too bad this store doesn't do something about it's air conditioning). The summer weight pants for boys were a good buy at two pairs for \$5.00. Grb Along swin trunks were an excellent quality and a bargain at \$2.98 a pair. The price of a cup of tea and a cup of coffee was increased by 33 1/3 % in the Ungava Restaurant. Have the staff received a corresponding salary increase??

If i felt as this person does I'd simply release my name to the public as well as my opinion and the cost of a gift could be saved because she wouldn't be invited anyway.

Since I've been attending showers, I've never seen any extravagant gifts - only those who are very special friends of the guest of honour usually give a little extra. But as I said about not having to attend, this too is up to the person herself. I don't feel ashamed of my gifts that range from \$1.00 to \$2.00.

I'm afraid showers are the same as in the good old days, because I certainly see many gifts of hair pins, safety pins, and the like. Our inflation fighter must go to some rare showers if it costs up to \$40.00 a month to attend. Or is the prestige so important?

Now, the subject of food is very interesting - salads, meats, sweets, etc., I believe our friend said. Here again, this is up to the hostess. I'm sure she'll find the most convenient form of serving and cutting costs as she thinks best. If I feel like putting myself out a little, I'll prepare the food and make it easier on my guests since they won't have to bother preparing food to bring along with them. If I feel I don't want to bother with this arrangement, I simply ask the girls I know to bring along a tray.

It should not bother anybody what the next arrangement is. Each person has her own ideas about a successful shower.

My opinion is, if you don't like showers, don't go. If the gifts are too expensive, again don't go. It's not healthy to feel such worry over something that will never die out. If I considered a party as a "begging party" as I feel very few do, I'd simply ignore them.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR:::

Dear Sir:

I am replying to a letter from Mr. P.B. Rostgaard, which appeared in your paper recently, regarding our service from Labrador City.

I would like to assure the people of your area that when we take a contract to handle their household goods that, contrary to Mr. Rostgaard's statement, we do care. Indeed, we care very much, for if we didn't, we would not be in business for the length of time we have been

We admit that the service to and from your area leaves a lot to be desired, not only from a customers viewpoint, but also ours. We find that operating to and from your area is the most troublesome area we service, mainly because the only means of getting our equipment into Labrador City and Wabush is by rail and we are faced with delay problems in getting a flatcar on both ends. We have spent as long as 7 to 8 days in Seven Islands and 4 to 5 days at Labrador City, waiting for the railway to transport our equipment. This, as you can realize, is costly for us, due to loss of use of our equipment and we still have to pay our driver. Also, we find that repairs are more costly and labour much higher than in other areas.

Mr. Rostgaard states that our representative promised and specified delivery date. This I doubt, for we have instructed our men not to promise a definite date and I feel the problems I have mentioned should give a just reason for this action.

With regard to the message Mr. Rostgaard received from this office giving a reason for late delivery due to insufficient weight of 4000 lbs., which made up his shipment, as you can probably realize 4000 lbs. is less than half load for one of our trucks and to send a unit to Labrador City empty for this amount of weight, would be unreasonable. If we were to do this for every small shipment, you would soon find that we would be unable to offer this service at all. The only profitable way we can operate is with large loads in and out.

I sincerely hope that my comments will help the people of your area to understand the problems which could occur in moving from your area and help them to be prepared for such a problem. I would like to assure them that we will do all possible and that we have had more satisfied customers from your area than unsatisfied.

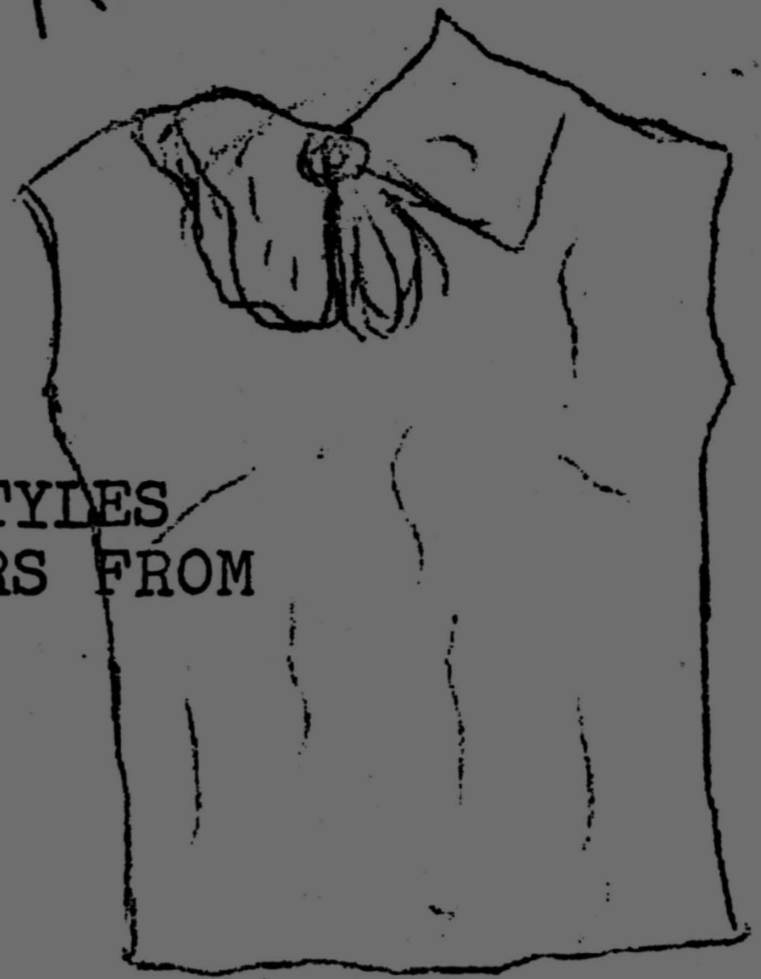

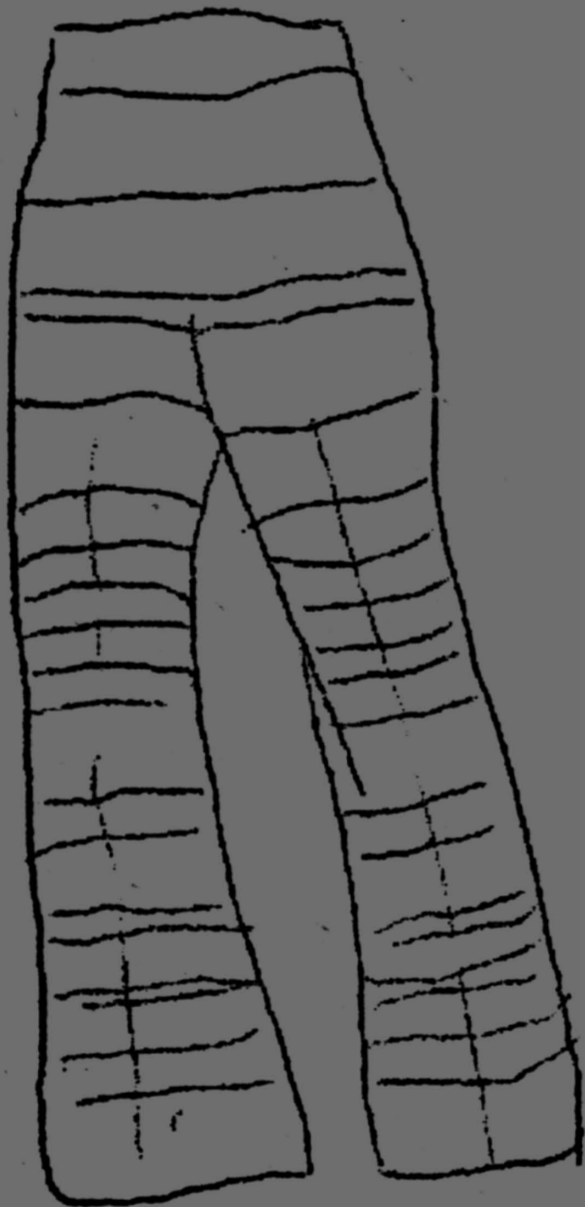

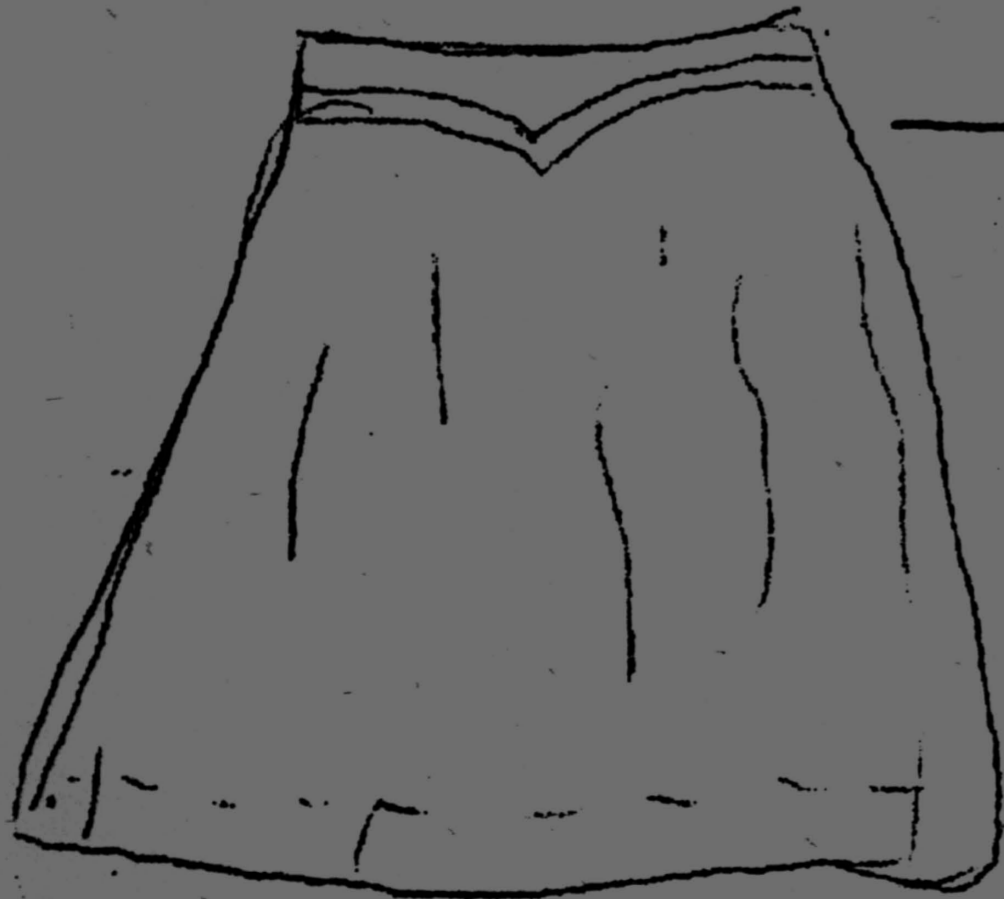
