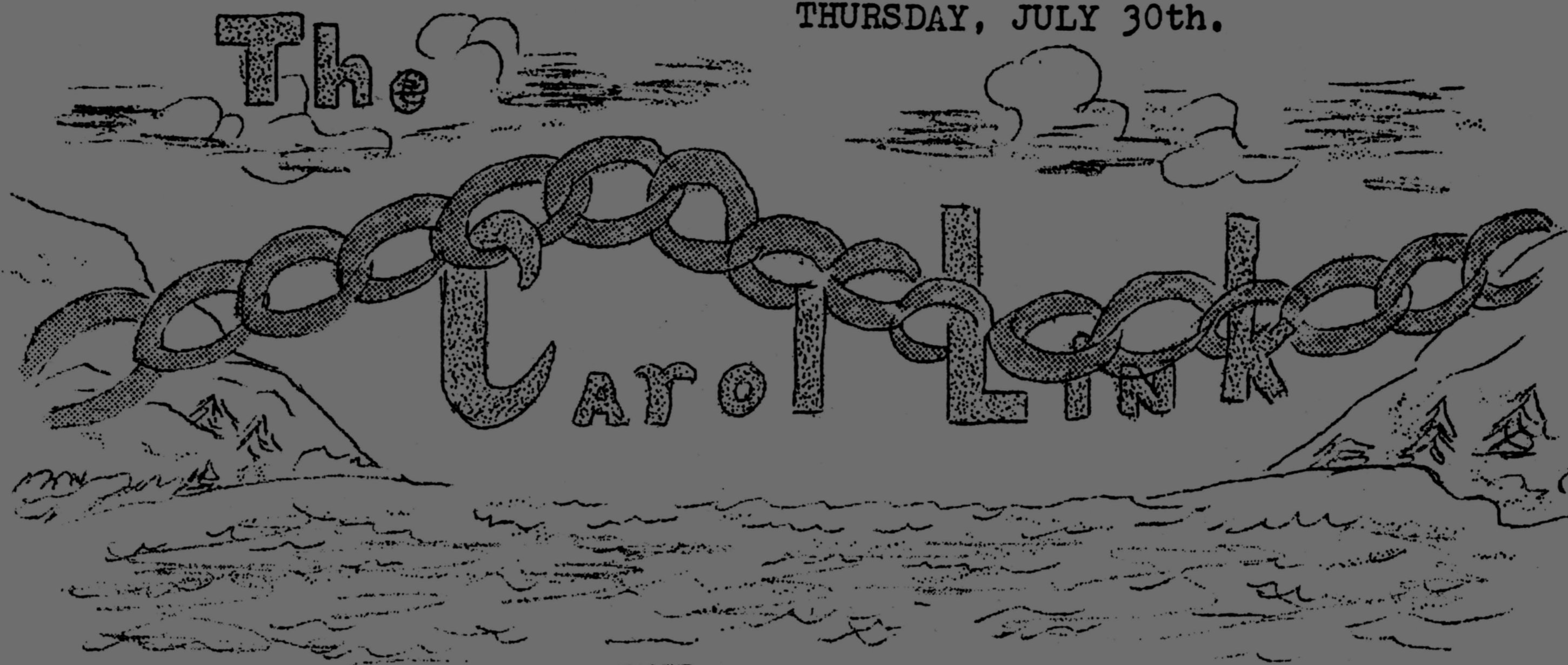

ANYONE WHO HAS TRAVELLED FROM LABRADOR CITY TO WABUSH THIS SUMMER MUST HAVE WONDERED WHAT THE GOVERNMENT DOES WITH THE TAX WHICH IT COLLECTS FROM THE RESIDENTS OF THIS AREA. MAYBE IT IS TIME WE FOUND OUT. SOMEONE HAS SUGGESTED THAT THE GOVERNMENT FILL UP SOME OF THE HOLES WITH PENNIES AND GIVE MR. SMALLWOOD THE FLOOR.

#### NEWS RELEASE.

United Steelworkers of America, Local 6204, has notified the Honourable W.J. Keough, Minister of Labour, that a dispute exists between that Union and Crawley and McCracken Company Limited, of Labrador City. To assist in resolving the dispute the services of a conciliation officer were requested.

The Minister notified the parties today that he has appointed Mr. A.L. Andrews to the Department of Labour as conciliation officer to deal with the dispute. It is expected he will be arranging meetings with the parties within a few days.

In commenting today on the Annual Vacations with Pay Act, which came into effect in Nfld. & Lab. on June 1, 1970, The Hon. W.J. Keough said that the principle is clear that all employees are entitled to a vacation pay based on regular time worked, regardless of whether they qualify for an annual vacation.

The vacation pay equals 4 per cent of the Total Wage for the period of employment. However, wages arising out of overtime is not subject to the 4 per cent calculation. The cash value of board or lodging or both received by an employee is to be included in the total wage.

If employment is terminated before completion of 12 continuous months of employment, vac. pay must be paid within one week after employment ceases.

#### SUCCESS OF THE ROSE VENTURE DEPENDS ON MARKETS, SAYS NEARY.

"Despite the numerous disappointments over the years since the 1966 final phase-out of the Dosco Mine - enough to make everyone very skeptical for the future - I am mildly optimistic and certainly enthusiastic about the permission which the Minister of Mines, Hon. W.R. Callahan, has given Rose Enterprises to reactivate limited industrial activity and mining operation on Bell Island.

Mr. Neary was particularly enthusiastic about the acceptance of the Minister of Mines and Mr. Rose of his suggestion that a specific of profits from the new operations be turned over to a community fund administered by a board of Trustees to be nominated by the Provincial Gov., Wabana Town Council, and the Bell Island Assoc.

One of the great weaknesses in past proposals for reactivating the Mines, pointed out Mr. Neary, has been the failure to find markets for the ore on the island. Apparently Mr. Rose either has managed to develop markets already or, at least, has a pretty good idea where he can develop them. The success of the whole venture, naturally depends on this facet and no one should become unduly optimistic until the first shipment has been made.

Again thanks to Dave Hardy who made three visits to camp to instruct and supervise the swimming.

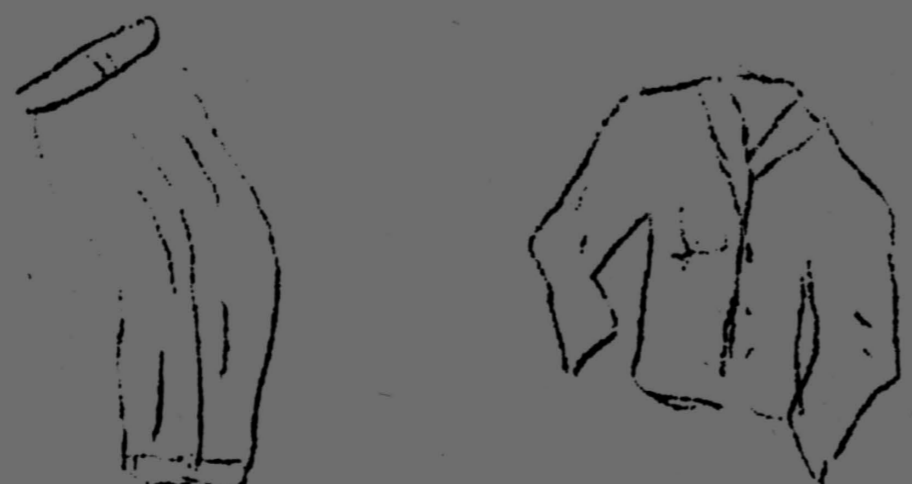
Well, that's it for the camp, for this year. Soon it will be Apple Day.

what they suppose doesn't exist.

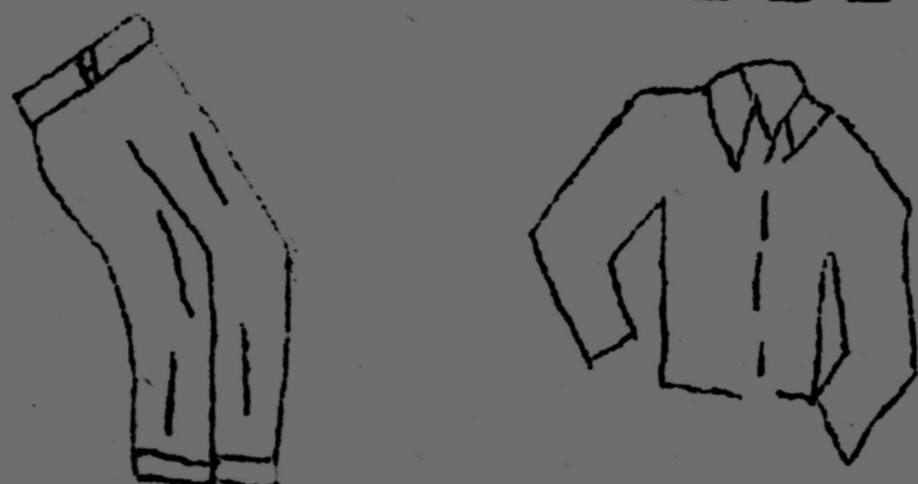
However, for the benefit of those who would allow their
