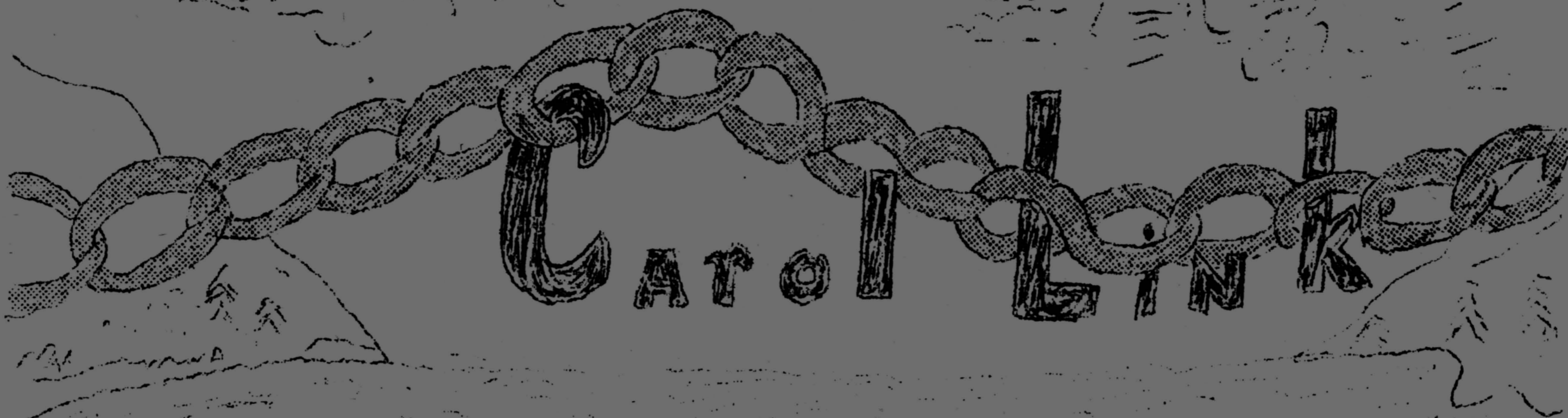

CO - OP ORGANIZATION MEETING

On Wednesday Sept. 9th., a Public Meeting was held in the Rec.. Centre in Wabush, for the purpose of forming a Co-Operative Store in the Area. Approximately 500 People attended and the meeting was presided over by Mr. Tom Burgess, M.H. A. Labrador West, who introduced Mr. W. Benedict, Managing Director for Provincial Co-Operative Associations, and Mr. Halloway, Area Manager. Mr. Benedict spoke on the impact which a Co. Op. Store has on the cost of living, it has been found that in all Areas in which a Co-Op. Store opens, there is a considerable drop in prices in the other Stores.

He also went on to explain the two different types of Co-Op. Stores. #1 A Direct Selling Co-Operative: This type of Store sells to Members only at Wholesale Prices plus Handling charges. #2 A Conventional Co-Operative, which sells to everyone, but pays dividends to ShareHolders only. Mr. Benedict and Mr. Halloway then answered questions from the Public. Nominations for the formation of the Committes were taken and the following People were elected. Mr. William Barrett, President, Mr. Len Leyte, Vice President, Mr. Edward Ward, Treasurer. Mrs. Elizabeth O'Neill, Recording Secretary. Mr. Norman Abel, Mrs. Ruth Gay, Mr. Micheal King, Mr. Alex Young, Mr. Albert March, Mr. Jerry Merritt, Mr. Frank Kurth, Mr. William Burgess and Mr. Max Rolls. After the Committee purchased their Shares, approximately 90 Members from the audience joined and the Co-Op. was under way with \$12,000.

On Saturday, Sept. 12th., another Meeting was held in the R. C. Church Basement in Labrador City. About 45 People were present and approximately another \$2,000 was handed in (since then and up to the time of going to Press, we understand another \$1,500 has been collected).

1st. YEAR UNIVERSITY
(GRADE 12)

Monday Sept. 14th., saw First Year University opened in the Labrador City Collegiate. Approximately 35 Students Registered. The Parents of these Students appreciate the difference this makes financially in being able to send our Students to the Local School instead of to Memorial University in St. John's. For instance, the cost of sending a first year Student out is \$700 Residence, \$500 Tuition Fees, \$150 (approx.) Text Books, and supplies and \$336 Air Fares, a total (minimum) of \$1,686, without extra pocket Money or Clothing!

The cost of sending a Student to our Local School is \$250 Tuition Fees and approx. \$100, Text Books and Supplies, a very considerable saving and due solely to the Iron Ore Company of Canada, and I feel they are to be highly commended.

I.O.C.C. ANNOUNCEMENT

COMMUNIQUE DE LA COMPAGNIE IRON
ORE DU CANADA

W.J. Bennett, president of the Iron Ore Company of Canada, confirmed today the announcements made by Premier Bourrassa and Premier Smallwood with reference to investments in new and expanded facilities in Quebec-Labrador. He stated that the decision to proceed with the investment was due to assurances received from the two Provinces with respect to taxation following the proposed modification of the White Paper affecting mining. The estimated cost of the expansion program will be \$290,000,000. Construction will begin at once and will be completed late in 1972. Three thousand persons will be employed at the peak of construction.

A beneficiating and pelletizing complex will be built at Sept-Iles. This plant will have a capacity of 6,000,000 tons of high-grade pellets per annum and will draw its feed from the Company's mining operation in the Schefferville area. Iron Ore Company of Canada has been shipping crude ore from the Schefferville area since 1954. Because of the great abundance of higher grade ores in many parts of the world and because of the development of techniques for treating low-grade ores, also found in great abundance throughout the world, the saleable reserve of crude ore in the Schefferville area would have been exhausted by 1978, making it necessary to close the operations there. The decision to build the beneficiating and pelletizing complex at Sept-Iles will have the effect of extending greatly the life of the ore reserve and operation at Schefferville.

The Company's mining and concentrating facilities at its Carol operation in Labrador will be expanded. The capacity of the concentrator will be increased to 23,000,000 tons per annum, which is double the present capacity. The concentrator will then be the largest of its kind in the world.

At the completion of these projects the Company will have an annual capacity to produce 16,000,000 tons of pellets, 12,000,000 tons of concentrate, and up to 5,000,000 tons of direct shipping ore. To support this major expansion, the Iron Ore Company of Canada has concluded long-term contracts running up to 25 years with leading steel companies located in the U.S., U.K., Japan, West Germany, France, The Netherlands and Italy, covering the 16,000,000 tons of pellets and 12,000,000 tons of concentrates per annum. The estimated value of these contracts is in excess of \$7,000,000,000.

Le Président de la Compagnie Iron Ore du Canada, M. W.J. Bennett, a confirmé aujourd'hui les déclarations faites par le Premier Ministre du Québec, M. Bourrassa, et le Premier Ministre de Terre-Neuve, M. Smallwood, concernant des investissements pour la construction de nouvelles installations et l'agrandissement des installations déjà existantes au Québec-Labrador. Il a déclaré que si la Compagnie avait décidé d'entreprendre ces travaux c'était parce qu'elle avait reçue l'assurance de l'appui des deux provinces à la suite de la proposition du gouvernement fédéral de modifier le Livre Blanc sur la fiscalité pour ce qui a trait à l'industrie minière. Le programme d'expansion coûtera environ \$290,000,000. La construction doit commencer incessamment et tous les travaux seront terminés vers la fin de 1972. 3,000 personnes seront employés lorsque la construction sera dans sa phase la plus active.

Une usine d'épuration et de bouletage sera érigée à Sept-Iles. Cette usine aura une capacité annuelle de 6,000,000 de tonnes de boulettes de qualité supérieure. Ces boulettes proviendront du minerai extrait des mines de la Compagnie dans la région de Schefferville. La Compagnie Iron Ore expédie le minerai brut de la région de Schefferville depuis 1954. Vu l'abondance de minerai de haute teneur dans plusieurs parties du monde et vu le développement et l'amélioration des techniques de traitement du minerai de qualité inférieure qu'on trouve aussi en grande quantité à travers le monde, la réserve de minerai brut de la région de Schefferville aurait été épuisée en 1978 et les aménagements de la Compagnie dans cette région auraient dû être fermés. La décision prise par la Compagnie de construire une usine d'épuration et de bouletage à Sept-Iles aura donc pour effet de prolonger considérablement l'existence des réserves de minerai de Schefferville ainsi que nos opérations dans cette région.

Le concentrateur de la Compagnie à Carol au Labrador ainsi que ses installations minières au même endroit seront agrandis. La capacité du concentrateur sera augmentée à 23,000,000 de tonnes par année, soit le double de la capacité présente. Le concentrateur sera alors le plus considérable au monde.

A new loading dock was constructed at Sept-Iles in 1969 at a cost of \$14,000,000. This dock is capable of serving vessels up to 250,000 tons. The Company is now in a position to move its ores, concentrates and pellets into all of the world's major markets. Included in the expansion program are further expenditures on transportation and handling facilities which make it possible for the Company to ship at an annual rate in excess of 30,000,000 tons.

With the completion of the new facilities, the Company and its subsidiaries will have invested close to \$1,000,000,000 in the Quebec-Labrador region. In the period from 1954 when operations began through the end of 1969, a total of 179,000,000 tons of crude ore, concentrates and pellets have been shipped for a total value of approximately \$1,800,000,000. Ninety-five percent of this tonnage was sold in export markets. Over that same period, the Company and its subsidiaries have paid \$205,000,000 in federal, provincial and municipal taxes and approximately \$500,000,000 in salaries & wages. Purchases of equipment and supplies in Canada, now running at the rate of \$75,000,000 per annum, will increase substantially when the new facilities are in full operation.

Le programme d'expansion comprend aussi certains déboursés pour l'aménagement de facilités de transport et de manutention qui permettront à la Compagnie d'expédier plus de 30,000,000 de tonnes de minerai annuellement.

Lorsque la construction des nouvelles installations sera terminée, la Compagnie et ses sociétés subsidiaires auront investi environ \$1,000,000,000 dans la région du Québec-Labrador. Depuis le début des opérations en 1954 jusqu'à la fin de 1969, 179,000,000 de tonnes de minerai brut, de concentré et de boulettes ont été expédiées, le tout ayant une valeur approximative de \$1,800,000,000. 95% du nombre de tonnes expédiées a été vendu sur les marchés d'exploitation. Au cours de la même période, la Compagnie et ses sociétés subsidiaires ont déboursé \$205,000,000 en impôts fédéraux, provinciaux et municipaux et environ \$500,000,000 en traitements et salaires. L'achat d'approvisionnement et de matériel se chiffre présentement à environ \$75,000,000 par année. Ce montant augmentera sensiblement lorsque les nouvelles installations seront en pleine exploitation.

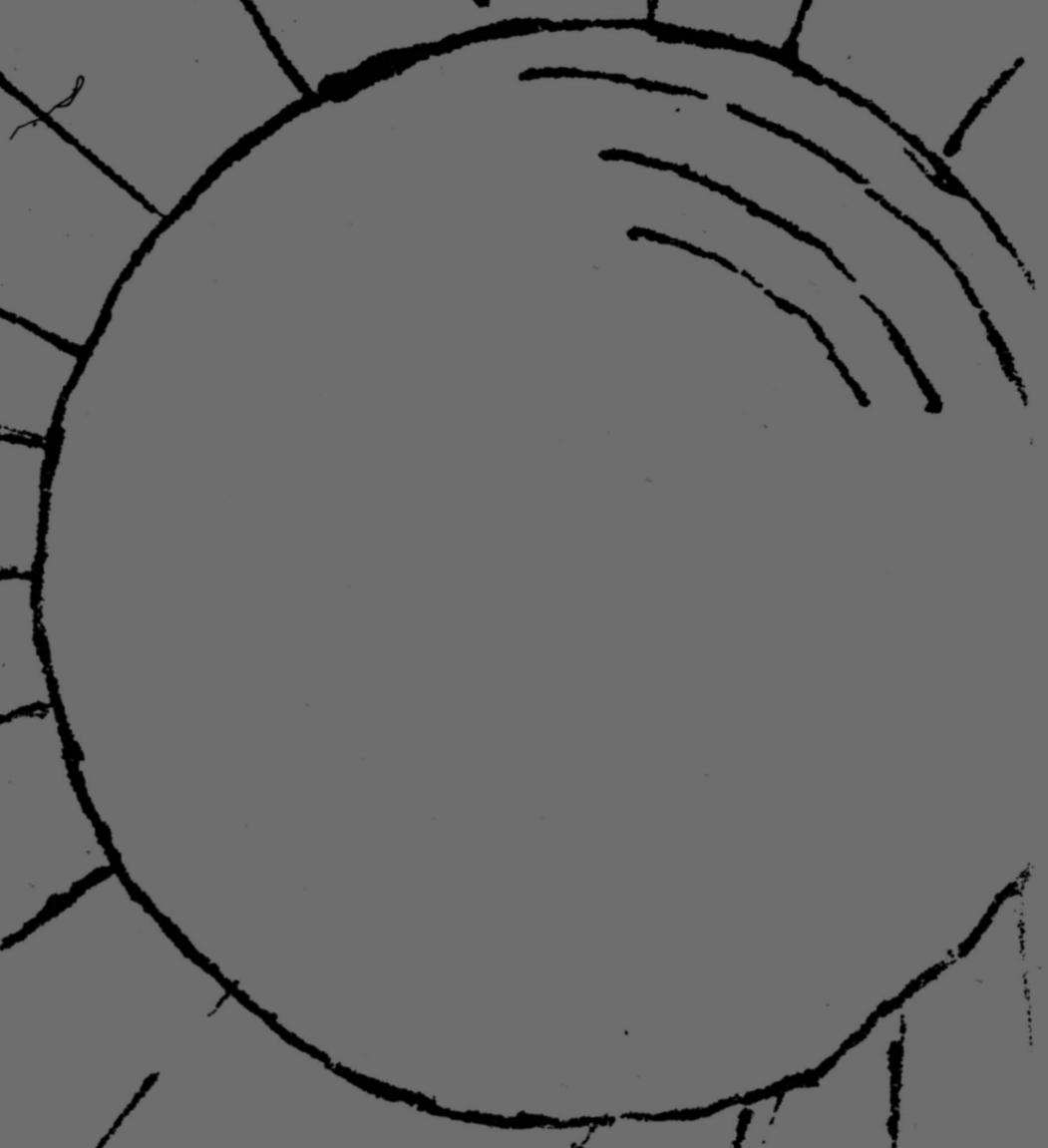
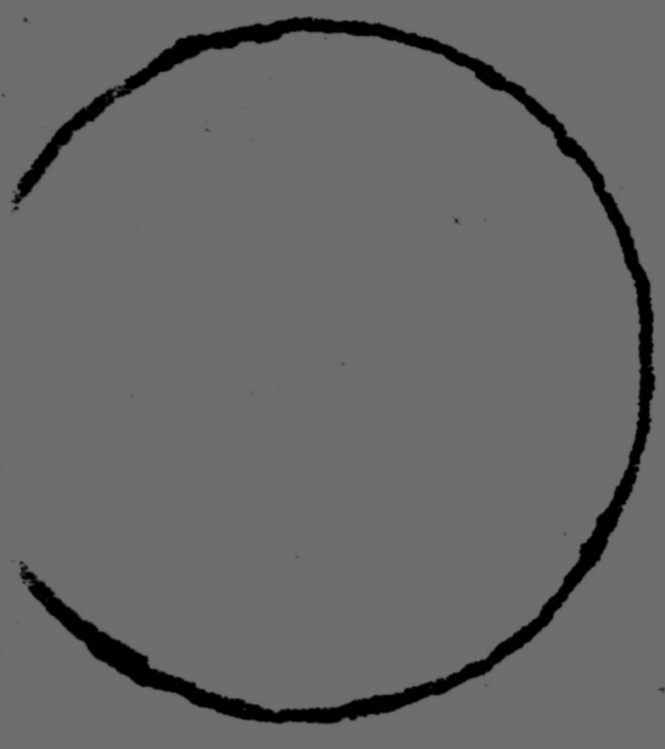
