TIME FOR A CHANGE ?????

For twenty-one years Joe Smallwood has tried to govern Nfld.; for twenty-one years he has continually pulled rabbits out of his hat and emphasized what he has done for 'my beloved Newfoundland', while the economic condition of the province has gradually deteriorated. Meanwhile, behind the scenes, Joe has been highly amused and has obtained much pleasure while Newfoundlanders have blindly catered to the whims of his fancy. The momentous question that most Newfoundlanders would like answered now is, how many more rabbits has Joey left, whether or not his hat will last through another election or if he will be dislodged by his ferocious opponents.

If you crave for real action, fist-pounding, ego-weakening name-calling mixed with egotistic boasting and long classical monologues from the bench of the great father of Newfoundland, then visit the ninth floor of the Confederation Building. It is unbelievable that the supposedly top men in Newfoundland, those to whom we have entrusted the task of governing our province, can gather in the House and spend an entire session arguing whether or not the Honourable so-and-so is a jackass, whether the premier's greatest opponent is sick or, whether or not the great father should be permitted to interrupt another's speech to call him an ignoramus.

No great amount of intelligence is needed to understand Newfoundland's economic condition. It's merely a case of deducting several hundred million dollars from nothing. Whom must we thank, or rather criticize for this undeplorable situation? Smallwood asserts that we cannot point our fingers at him, because the people of Newfoundland put him where he is. True, we must admit, but why did the people put him there? Is it because he is the only man capable of governing Newfoundland as he has recently stated? Indeed not! Rather it is because Smallwood has taken advantage of ability to bluff the people of Newfoundland with broken promises. Everyone knows of at least one promise that Smallwood has made prior to an election to remain just that - a promise that has failed to materialize. A good example is his announcement to aid university students with free tuition and allowances. This was scrapped after one year except for certain extreme cases. Incidents like this would take many pages to write. Is it any wonder then why we have lost confidence in the Government?

It is evident that most Newfoundlanders have become wise to the idea. They have become sick of unkept promises which is probably why Smallwood is fishing around for a new approach to the expected election soon to take place. Recently we have seen him fly off to Paris and London with his party of faithful followers in a pointing attempt to secure the confidence of the people by signing the Come By Chance deal. For him, the outcome doesn't appear promising.

The irony of the situation is that Joey publically states he is seriously against gambling. He wouldn't hear of legalizing it in Newfoundland, but in the same breath contends that Newfoundland's only hope is to take chances - to GAMBLE. He wouldn't gamble himself, it's too risky, but he ignorantly allows the economy of Newfoundland to depend on chance - a mere gamble. Unfortunately, his gambling in this respect has not paid off because as Joey himself would say; we are not three hundred million, not four hundred million, not five hundred million but and listen to this, SIX hundred million dollars in the hole.

It's no top classified secret that a great majority of Newfoundlanders desire a change; if not in government, then most certainly in leadership. We should allow the new to replace the old. This change will never occur as long as we allow ourselves to be hypnotized by the false hopes of the unkept promises of the great father. If we neglect to take advantage of this opportunity, it could be disastrous. On the other hand, to use the words of the late Sir Winston Churchill, "this could be 'our finest hour'."

Some staunch Smallwood supporters may be critical and attempt to support this criticism by stating 'all Joey has done for Newfoundland.' Granted, Smallwood with the help of his government has done some good, but the mistakes are beginning to exceed the good and as a result, his column of support is beginning to shorten.

Is it possible to forget the past and make this new decade a time of change? It may not be easy to forget the past, as the facts will remain with us for many years but, we can definitely make it a day of change. It depends on us. Surely God must have created more than one man who is capable of governing Newfoundland (it's not that complicated). Let's put him where he belongs and try to reverse the economic tide of disaster as it persists in Nfld. today.

To put it briefly; what we need on the ninth floor of the Confederation Building in St. John's is not a group of name-calling, egotistic, gabbling, gossipers,, but rather a business minded government interested in the affairs of the province and willing to do their utmost to better the financial, industrial, educational and social condition of the province. Unless and until we, the voters of Newfoundland do just that, we can never expect any great change in government policy. For the sake of ourselves and the province, let's hope we will act now and hope that this indeed will be our finest hour.

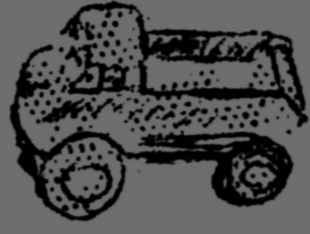
