'EVERY DAY IS SURVIVAL DAY.'

Although the activities of Survival Day, Wednesday, Oct. 14th., were somewhat overshadowed by the events connected with the terrorist activities in Quebec, it did serve, nevertheless to point out some of the hazards of our technological age. Students demonstrated their interest in the cause against pollution by cleaning up litter and garbage.

The opinion of many respected scientists is that man will eventually create an environment that will be responsible for destroying all of life. Indeed, they contend that that day is not as far in the future as some would have us believe unless the present trend of pollution is altered. However, many are optimistic and express their opinion that there is yet time to stop the present rate of pollution and then begin a systematic program to clean and de-pollute our water and air to its natural state.

Those who are pessimistic, however, have every reason to be so inclined. They, without fail, continue to draw attention to the mounting pile of garbage and litter created as a result of the non-returnable bottles and other containers, especially the bottles and cans which appear to be eternal since they do not decay and as a result, are not easily destroyed. They also stress the pollution caused by the automobile, the threat that our modern means of transporting oil presents; the poisons spewed into the atmosphere by industry and the ever increasing intensity of noise which is believed to affect our hearing, sight and nervous system.

Those who are optimistic contend that by placing a ban on those chemicals which pollute our environment and by imposing fines on industrial polluters, the tide of pollution can be turned back. However, large industry creates only a small percentage of our pollution. Much is the result of the habits of the individual. It does appear that the fight against pollution must begin at home, begin with the individual. Unfortunately, the accomplishments of October 14th., are not sufficient. If in the future, we are to continue to live, not merely to exist, as many scientists seem to predict, then we must make each day a 'Survival Day'. Only if we double the campaign, which began on April 22nd., as 'Earth Day' and repeated October 14th., as Survival Day, on a daily basis instead of a once-a-year affair, will we be able to combat the dreaded threat of pollution.

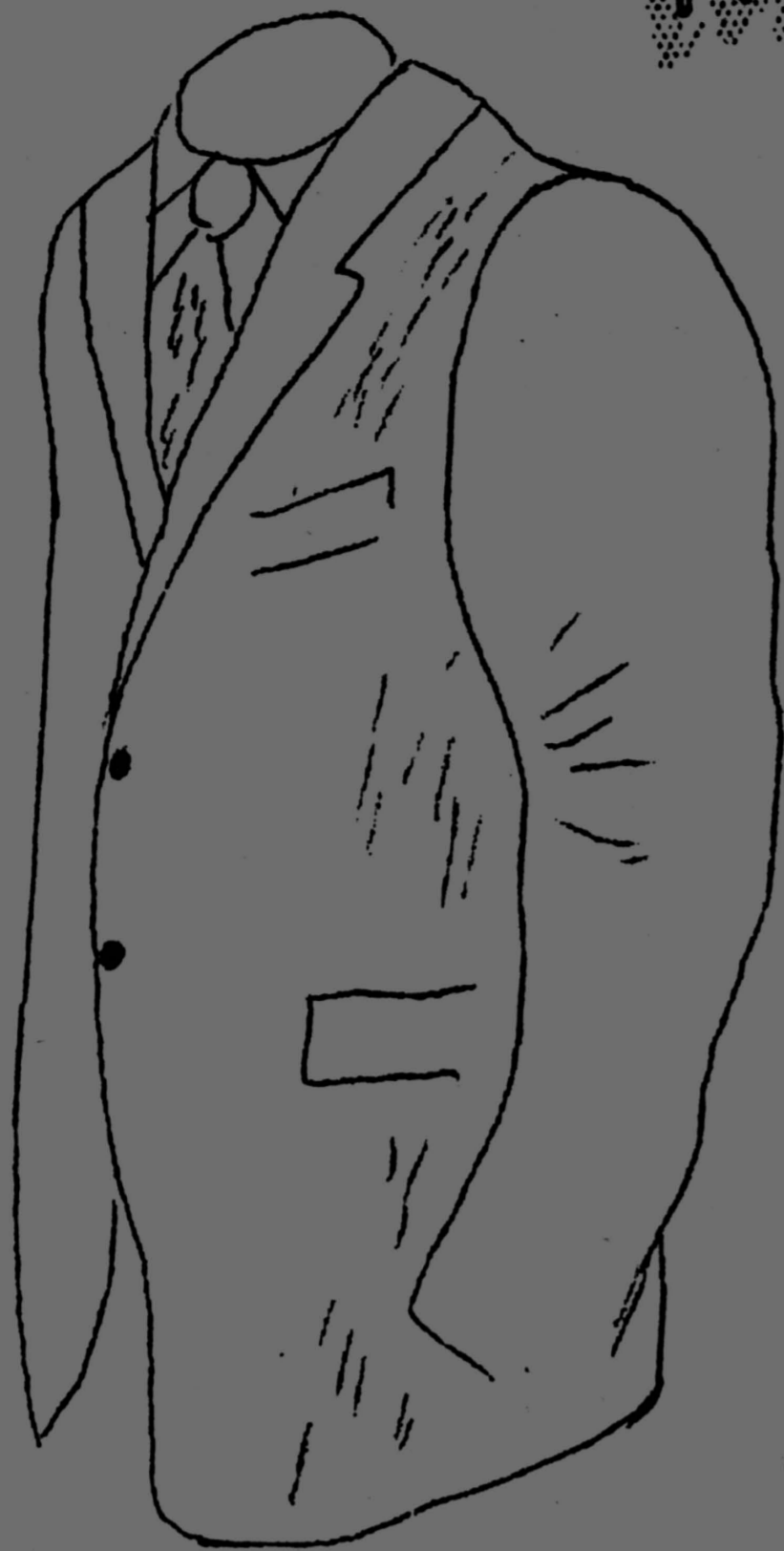

"BALDNESS AND HAIR RESTORING CLAIMS"

The Better Business Bureau notes that the promoters of treatment for hair-loss still continue to advertise in local media, in spite of continued BBB publicity that the advertised claims cannot be factual for 85 to 95 percent of all readers.

Basically, the position of the Better Business Bureau is that medical authorities in Newfoundland and Labrador, in the rest of Canada, and in the U.S.A., - have continued to state that 85 to 95 percent of all male baldness is of the hereditary "male-pattern-baldness" type, and can neither be cured nor arrested by any known treatment. According to the American Dermatology Association, only a qualified dermatologist can determine whether or not a particular hair loss problem is due to something other than hereditary patterns over which there is said to be no control at the present time.

Some success has been claimed for the transplant process, which is a process where hair-bearing skin is grafted to the scalp. As with any skin-graft, this method involves considerable time and expense. The BBB questions why those who can afford the time and money would go through this method, if any other process offered any possibility of success.

The BBB repeats its previously stated warning, "THERE IS NO KNOWN DRUG, PREPARATION, DEVICE, OR METHOD OF TREATMENT RECOGNIZED AS A CURE, REMEDY, OR COMPETENT TREATMENT FOR BALDNESS; NOR AS CAPABLE OF GROWING OR AIDING IN THE PROMOTION OF THE GROWTH OF HAIR, PREVENTING BALDNESS, OR FEEDING OR NOURISHING THE HAIR OR SCALP. HAIR DOES NOT HAVE ROOTS LIKE A PLANT AND CANNOT BE "FED" BY ANY EXTERNAL APPLICATION."

## SCHOOL TIME

### TEEN COFFEE HOUSE

The teen coffee house was opened officially the second week of August, under the leadership of the Executive which consisted of Derek Stone, Alana Preziosi, Clyde Little, Diane Hardy, Harry Follett, and Sharon Bryons. The first week of operation was spent in painting and decorating the interior of the building. The building was given to the Ministerial Association of Labrador City for the use of the youth. The Executive of the Teen Coffee House was elected by a group of teenagers which met with adults who were interested in the idea of a Coffee House.

During the first week of operation many teenagers came down to participate in painting. After the paint job was finished the building was ready for use. The Labrador City United Church donated some tables and chairs for use in the Coffee House. Handy Andy had donated the paint used in the interior. Many of the stores and other churches all contributed something so that when the coffee house opened there were sufficient refreshments on hand to be sold in the canteen. After the Coffee House had been opened a few weeks, table tennis tables were donated along with a dart board, this added a little more excitement and an increase in attendance.

The Coffee House held a dance in the United Church basement and the proceeds from the door were used to pay the band the Iron Drum, which provided the entertainment for the evening. The dance was a success and plans were made to have more in the future for the benefit of the teenagers.

In September the Executive dwindled because many of the members had to return to University or start working. Therefore few new members were elected. These were Bill Short, Jeanne Snell and Bill Sobering. The steering Committee of the Coffee House which consists of a group of Adults from Labrador City provided the new executive with some ideas on how to get the teenagers who attended more interested in the welfare of the building. The Coffee House is run by the executive, but advised by the Steering Committee. A general meeting was held at the Coffee House during the first week of October for all those interested in improving on the Coffee House and for anyone with ideas on new activities to be held there. A dance was planned for October 10th and many people offered to organize and prepare for it, but because of lack of co-operation and the fact that the band had no means of transporting their equipment to the Coffee House, the dance fell through.

The Coffee House has been open week nights from 7 to 10 pm and Friday and Saturday nights 7 to 12 pm. The attendance has decreased considerably since school started and there is a general lack of interest among the teenagers, so the Coffee House at the moment seems to be heading nowhere. Many teenagers in Labrador City constantly complain that there is nothing to do but when a few people do get something started for young people it is the complainers who are the least willing to help and support the workers. Unless the teenagers begin to work for what they want and not expect everything to be handed to them, there will never be a successful Coffee House, Teen Club, or Youth Association.

For the information of those concerned there is no alcoholic beverages permitted on the premises of the Coffee House or at any of the Teen Dances held in this area.

Dr. J. C. Hammer, first speaker for the Humanities Association of Canada in Labrador West, has had a distinguished teaching career. A native of Dover, England, he was educated in England and Germany. His Doctorate at the University of Hamburg, Germany, consisted of a dissertation on the influence in England of the German romantic poet Friedrich Holderlin. His thesis was published in 1966. Dr. Hammer has lectured for the British Council in Germany, taught in England as well as Switzerland before coming to Canada. Presently, he is teaching German at Memorial University and working on a book concerning the contemporary German dramatist, Peter Weiss.

Members of the public may join before the first public meeting or at the meeting. Fees per member for the eight lectures will be five dollars for the year. It is planned to have speakers rotate such that during the year, there will be two speakers on each available week day night. So, two speakers will be scheduled to speak on Monday nights, two on Tuesday nights, etc., so that all interested parties will have an opportunity to attend a majority of the talks.
