SOCIETY FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO ANIMALS

In cases where lost animals are not reported, members and friends are, and have been in the past, caring for these animals in their own homes. Every effort has been made to sustain these animals for a period of at least one week until the description has been broadcast verbally, and by radio network in this area. After this period, our organization endeavours to find a new home for the unfortunate animal, usually with a considerable degree of success. However, this does not always have happy endings. There has been the odd occasion when the original owner has turned up after the animal has been replaced, and invariably, becomes attached to the new owner. A situation like this creates unhappiness in two instances, irrespective of society, unhappiness on the part of the original owner and unhappiness on the part of the new owners who have become attached to the animal, and needless to say some embarrassment to the S.P.C.A.

What is the real answer to a question of this nature?

If an animal (domestic) is left out even one night or two at the most in sub zero conditions such as we experience in this area during the winter, it inevitably suffers from severe, irreparable and painful damage due to frostbite. In such cases, euthanasia is probably the kindest way out for the animal in which case neither the original or the new owner would experience the comfort which a pet brings.

Alternatively, the animal could be picked up by the local animal catcher and placed in the local pound where it would be kept for a period of 48 to 72 hours and if unclaimed, "EUTHANASIA AGAIN". On the other hand if claimed by the owner, the animal can be returned to its home after payment of a service charge imposed by town management.

We consider our approach to this problem to be the most humane one under the circumstances. This problem will of course be eliminated as soon as our animal shelter is in operation. In the meantime, owners are advised that a definite identification tag affixed to the animals collar would be most helpful. Also, if you wish to have your animal placed on our register, a brief note containing full particulars of the animal should be mailed to

An analysis of the society's experience over the previous two winters regarding the increase in the number of animals roaming the streets would indicate the following;

- a) During the winter months most animals are confined in the house to a much greater degree than would be the case under more congenial climatic conditions. This would be irksome to any active animal, more especially dogs. Subsequently, it only requires an open door to encourage the animal to take off. Can we, in allhonesty, stop the paper boy from calling, keep the children in the house or tell visitors to stay away. We really do not think so.
- b) Many people welcome an animal who will stay outside the confines of the home. Again, during winter months with few exceptions, this is not possible for the simple reason that the neighbours will talk or the S.P.C.A. will call. So, what could be more simple than taking a drive up Smokey Mountain road, or any other convenient locality and turning the animal loose. Alternatively, why be inconvenienced by driving anywhere, turn it loose, but don't let it come inside the house. It can take care of itself. It is common knowledge that any animal born and reared in the wild state automatically learns to survive under the conditions of its habitat. Can the same animal reared under domestic conditions do likewise? The answer is NO.
- c) Under winter conditions many people see an animal outside and realise the situation. They do something about it by taking the animal into their home and calling the S.P.C.A. and invariably feed and keep the animal until its future is decided. We are fortunate in that we have a large number of such people in this area. However, if the same number of animals were seen roaming the streets during the summer months how much notice would be taken of them? This is understandable. The aggravation of climatic conditions is non-existent. Thus, most domestic animals can survive outside at that particular time of the year without anyone noticing.

The foregoing, is one explanation of why the number of animals left to roam the streets is more noticeable in the town during the winter period. The subject of unwanted and replaced animals will be discussed further in our next issue.
