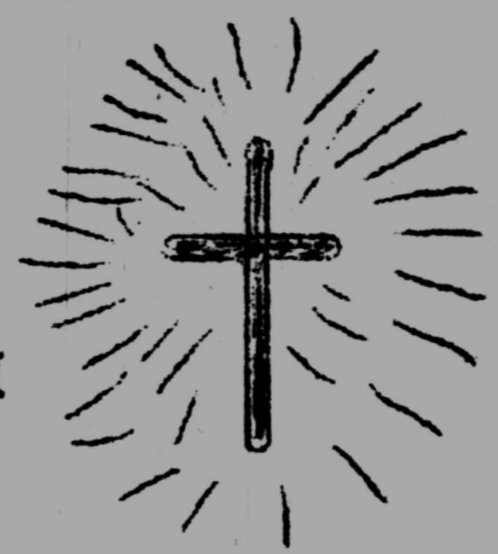

DAILY LIGHT

Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. Hebrews 11:1.

Do you have a problem? Are you facing some special test at the present time, perhaps a physical test, or a financial problem, or trouble of some other kind? Then it's a good time to remember the words of Jesus, found in Mark 11:22 "Have Faith in God."

If you say, "That's just the problem, my faith is weak," you can take courage in the fact that this verse actually emphasizes the faithfulness of the Lord rather than men's faith in Him. Students of the Greek Language tell us the literal meaning of these words in Mark 11:22 is, "Hold God's faithfulness." In other words, count on His faithfulness. Depend upon Him to help you.

You can be calm and confident in the face of every difficulty or danger if you "Hold God's faithfulness." There are numerous other Scripture verses to support this significant interpretation of Christ words. In Romans 3:3, for example, "The faith of God" clearly means God's faithfulness.

And "Hold" is so rendered in Mathew 21:26, which says, "All hold John as prophet." In some parallel passage (Mark 11:32) it is rendered "Counted". In another (Luke 20:6) a different word is used and it reads, "They be persuaded that John was a prophet."

How beautifully these three words emphasize the blessed truth of our Heavenly Father's faithfulness toward His children. In daily life we should count upon it. At all times and under all circumstances we should be fully persuaded of the fact.

Faith is a basic requirement in human life. Faith gives strength, poise, and zest for every enterprise. We are often told that faith is a quality we should develop, but it is not always clear what the basis of our faith should be. Is it faith in man? Faith in luck? Faith in faith itself? Or is it faith in God?

Faith is no better than its object. Though it may stimulate a person temporarily, faith will eventually lead to disillusionment, discouragement, and defeat if its grounds are unreliable. Here, however is a basis for a lasting faith. No one who puts His trust in God's faithfulness will ever be dissappointed.

Hebrews chapter 11; is known as the faith chapter of the Bible. It tells us of many who, holding God's steadfastness, had faith and by it "subdued kingdoms, wrought righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong, waxed valiant in fight, turned to flight the armies of the aliens." Hebrews 11:33,34

The apostles held God's faithfulness and in the strength of this faith were not daunted by the hostility of the heathen nor the persecution they encountered.

All God's spiritual giants have been men who won great battles because they reckoned His faithfulness to see them through to victory. He will not let you down. Count on His help. Have faith in His faithfulness. "Have faith in God."

LETTER TO THE EDITOR:::::

Dear Sir;

On reading the letter by "Curious" in the April 15th issue of the Carol Link, I must admit that many of us are dissatisfied with things at times but, fail to raise a voice or write our thoughts. Here are a few thoughts of mine on certain aspects of present town planning, with the hope they might provoke others to speak too.

Do you know the area in town, bordered by Caribou, Richards, Curtis Cresents and Hudson Drive? We who live there have always thought this part of town a very pleasant one, good neighbours-no troubles and a very central location. But-this area now seems to be singled out by town officials, as a special place for animals, birds, poultry, etc.

There is one building housing pigeons, amongst other things. Have you ever lived around pigeons?

While the cooing of doves(or pigeons) might be romantic, their droppings are not, nor is their habit of picking out carefully planted seeds. On the farm, pigeons are a nuisance and as such, are shot, are they less of a nuisance in a residential area! How long will it be before the immediate area around this building smells like a barnyard and is dotted with those dirty grey-white blotches!

To add insult to injury, we now learn that a certain inspection shack has been granted to the S.P.C.A. for an animal shelter, with no consideration of the immediate neighbours at all. This shack is situated on an area demoted as "park" on a 1966 map, and was supposedly only a temporary building, erected for the first years of the town planning.

Besides the friendly or foe like talk between animals left there (or will they be completely dumb) presumably, there will have to be toilet facilities. Will these animals be trained to use the flush system or have the authorities devised a way of instantly deodorizing the necessary results of any animal's normal habits? Can you imagine a public animal latrine at the bottom of your garden with gentle breezes wafting in your direction at times? It is plain to see that no town official or organization member's house is in this "select" area.

How is permission given for these special projects? One person was refused a permit for chickens because of the health hazard, and yet we have one building devoted to pigeons, poultry, etc.; a proposed animal shelter - both in a purely residential area - and even a duck and geese farm by a lake. Discrimination or not?

All these things just appear without any prior public notice being given. We are all citizens and should have equal rights - regardless of position in the locality.

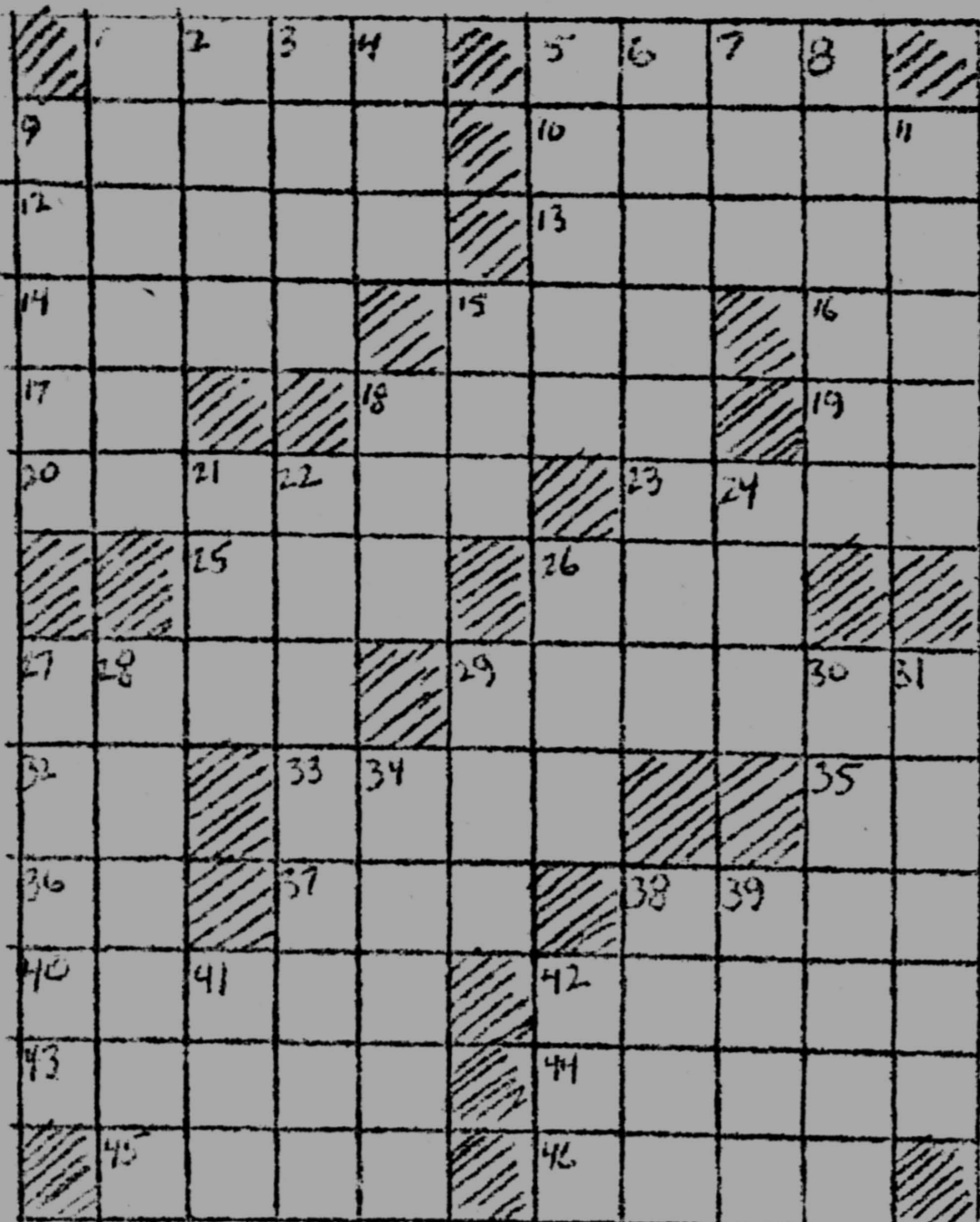
