## THE TIME HAS COME .....

MR. TOM BURGESS, LEADER OF THE NEW LABRADOR PARTY AND PARTY CANDIDATE FOR LABRADOR WEST, HAS RELEASED THE DETAILS OF HIS CAMPAIGN STRUCTURE FOR THE ELECTION.

DAILY LIGHT

"Consider your ways."

Haggai 1:7.

The Four Message of Haggai were addressed to the people after their long captivity, and he commanded them to consider their ways. They were reminded that God could not bless them while their Temple lay in ruins. The people argued that the time was not right for reconstruction, and in their appeals they proved their selfishness. When they stopped to consider and change their ways, God visited them and said, "From this day will I bless you." (Haggai 2:19). Even their fruit and grain increased manifold because of His hand upon them for good.

The message to "consider your ways" should impress our hearts during our quiet times of devotion with the Lord. How much time is spent for ourselves in relation to the time we give to the Lord? Is the ratio sadly out of balance? "Consider your ways." Does complaining come from our lips more than praise? Is it possible that meditation gives way to murmuring? "Consider your ways." Do petty irritations have their way of rubbing into our lives, in turn inflicting scars on others? "Consider your ways" The writer of Proverbs said, "In all thy ways acknowledged him, and he shall direct thy paths." (Proverbs 3:6.) And He will!

In considering our ways, as in the time of Haggai, true repentance in the riches of His grace and peace. His power and presence will be overwhelming. We will grasp a new urgency to be strong and work, and strength for the task will be available. How long has it been since we set a goal for God? Possibly a long-neglected friend needs encouragement, or a neighbour needs to know the Lord. Have we in faith accepted the challenge as an opportunity for His glory? It is said that people who are going places have to be willing to take risks to get there. Going with God is not a risk, for He will "keep thee in all places whither thou goest." (Genesis 28:15.)

The president of a corporation said, "Part of the talent or genius of the goal-setter is the ability to distinguish between the possible and the impossible-plus the willingness to get very close to the latter." Our God said, "The things which are impossible with men are possible with God." (Luke 18:27.) "Consider your ways."

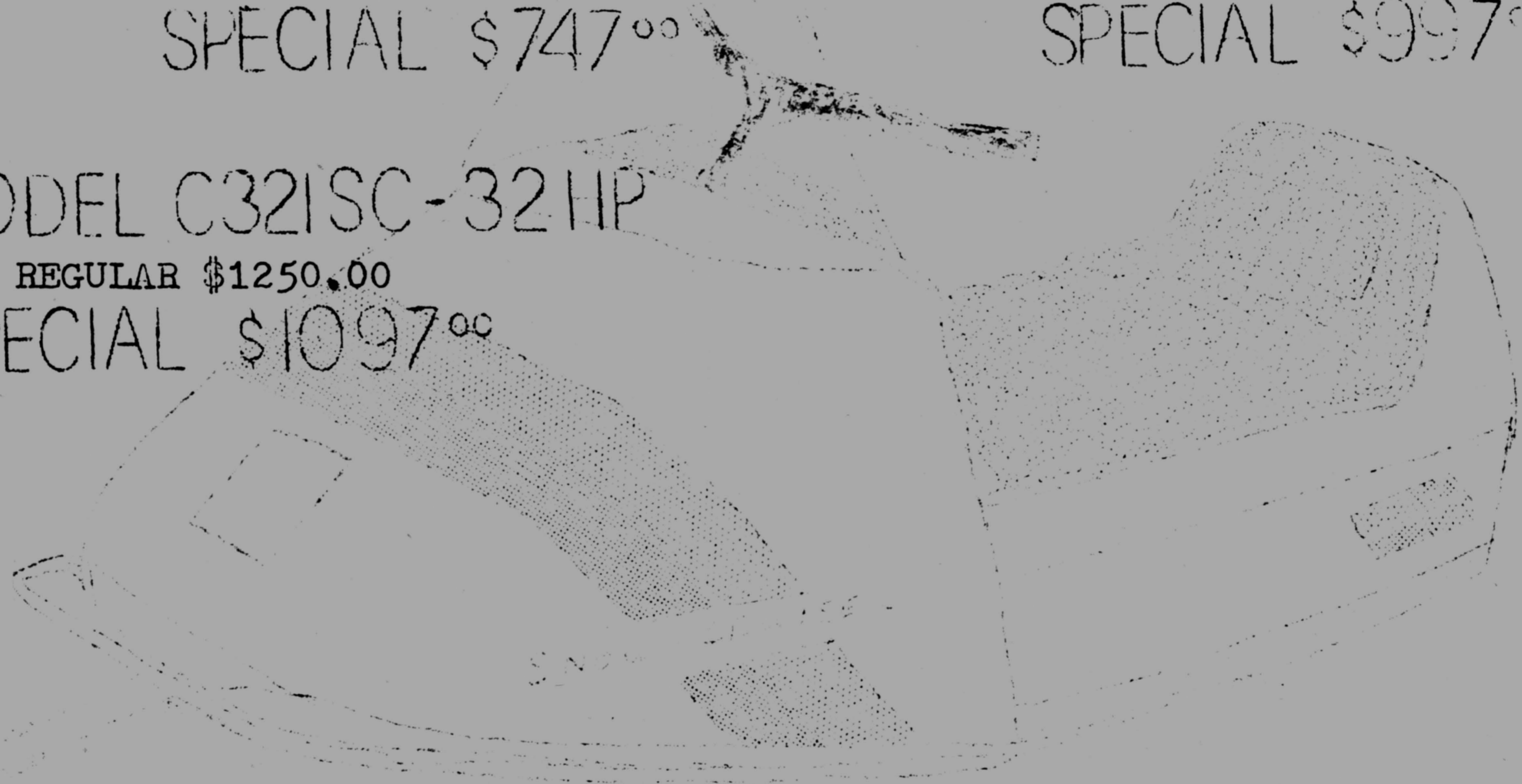

#### NEW BRUNSWICK INFORMATION

Over 100 delegates are expected to attend the Atlantic Seminar on Sheltered Workshops, scheduled for October 13, 14 and 15 in Memramcook, New Brunswick.

The conference will bring together for the first time directors of government and voluntary agencies involved in workshops for the handicapped in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland.

The seminar will center on discussion groups in which the many factors involved in the organization of workshops in the four provinces can be compared and discussed. Included topics will be standards of administration, training of personnel, the relation of the handicapped to the community and to the labor force, and the goals of the workshops in the Atlantic region as a whole.

The keynote speaker, who will address the conference on Thursday morning, October 14th, will be Hy Day, an Associate Professor of Psychology at York University who has a long investment in the organization of workshops.

Other speakers will include Mr. W.C. Stewart, Director of Manpower for the Atlantic region, and Mrs. Brenda Robertson, New Brunswick Minister of Welfare.

The three-day seminar will conclude with the presentation of reports and recommendations under the conference theme, "Where we are-- Where we are going."

At a special meeting of the Carol-Wabush Co-op on Sunday, October 10th, it was explained to the 150 to 200 members present, that \$100,000. more capital is required urgently, as the contractor has a lean on the building, and might sue the Co-op.

The consensus of opinions expressed by members in attendance was that they, the members, must not let the store down; because if this happened, prices would soar to the same level as they were before the Co-op movement got into full swing.

The organization is to canvass the present members to purchase more shares, and is going on a membership drive to get more members.

It is hoped to raise this amount within ten days.

After the meeting, approximately \$1500.00 was pledged by some of the members, and volunteers came forward to lend their support in the fund raising campaign.

### UNIONS AND CO-OPS

Co-operatives and labour unions should and often do work closely together. They are both comprised of a group of ordinary people trying to better their standard of living, and protect themselves against the ravages of the business world. Some people scoff at both their union local and their Co-op. These people are laughing only at themselves more than anyone else.

A great deal more support is needed by these two local organizations before either of them can perform the function for which they were intended. With negotiations nearing and another "Summer of '69" looming on the horizon, a prosperous Co-op could be a big asset in time of need. Remember a co-op is owned by it's members, not shareholders in a far distant city, who I am sure, are not concerned about our welfare here in Labrador.

For your local Co-op to be prosperous it needs your patronage. If you are not already a member, become one today. It is for your benefit. Your local Co-op is a retail outlet, designed to make a profit, and thereby constitute a savings to it's members.

Some customers have complained of the high prices, lack of variety and poor quality, conditions which existed in this area for years. The first and second of these conditions were mainly due to lack of purchasing capital, and the third is mainly due to the shippers and transportation agencies. The Co-op is not magic. These things take time to iron out, and the people who shop there regularly, I'm sure, have seen a big improvement since opening day. Box 1149, Labrador City; or use the Suggestion and Compliant Box installed in the store, and you as members can make it flourish if you so desire.

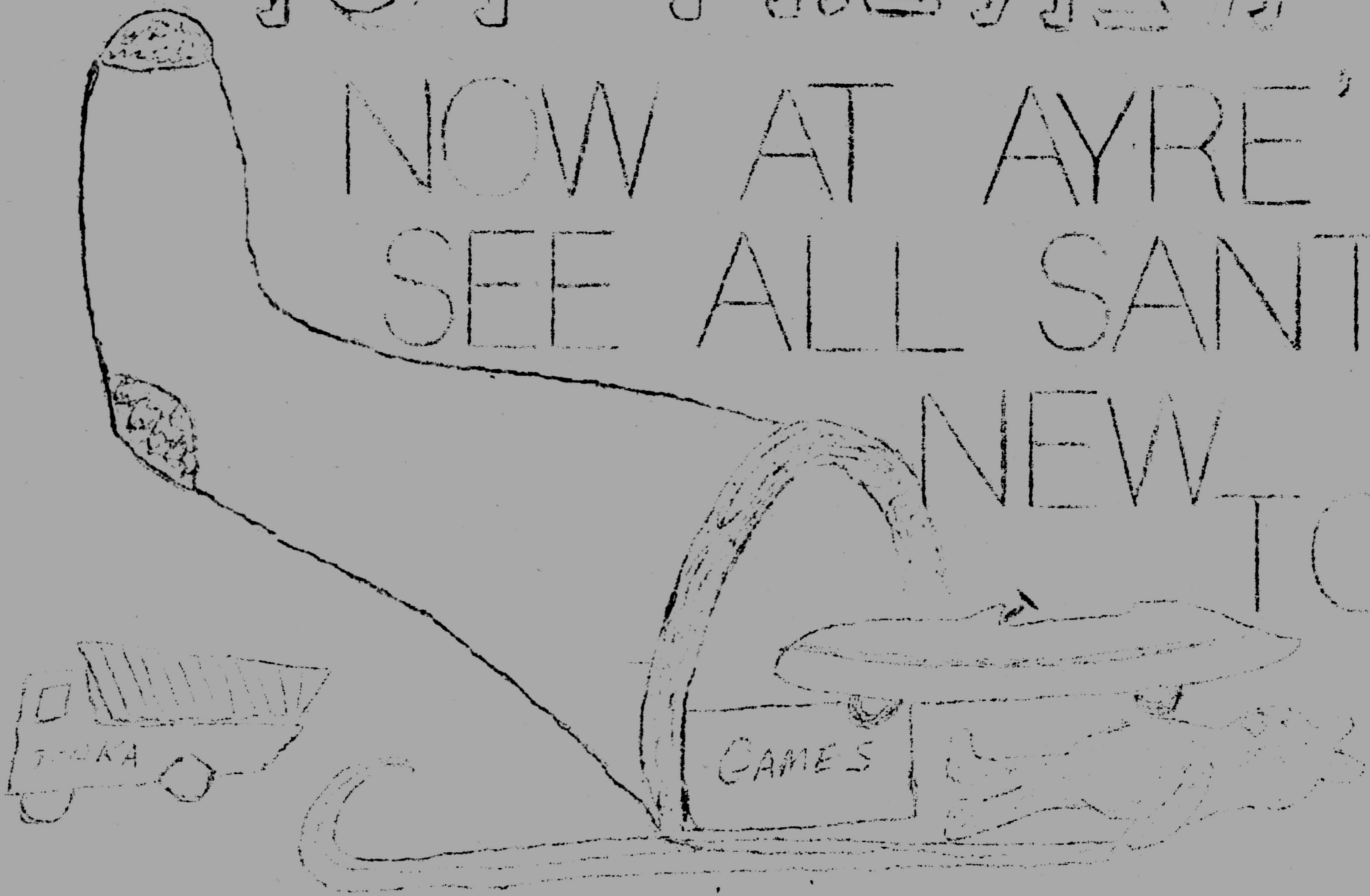

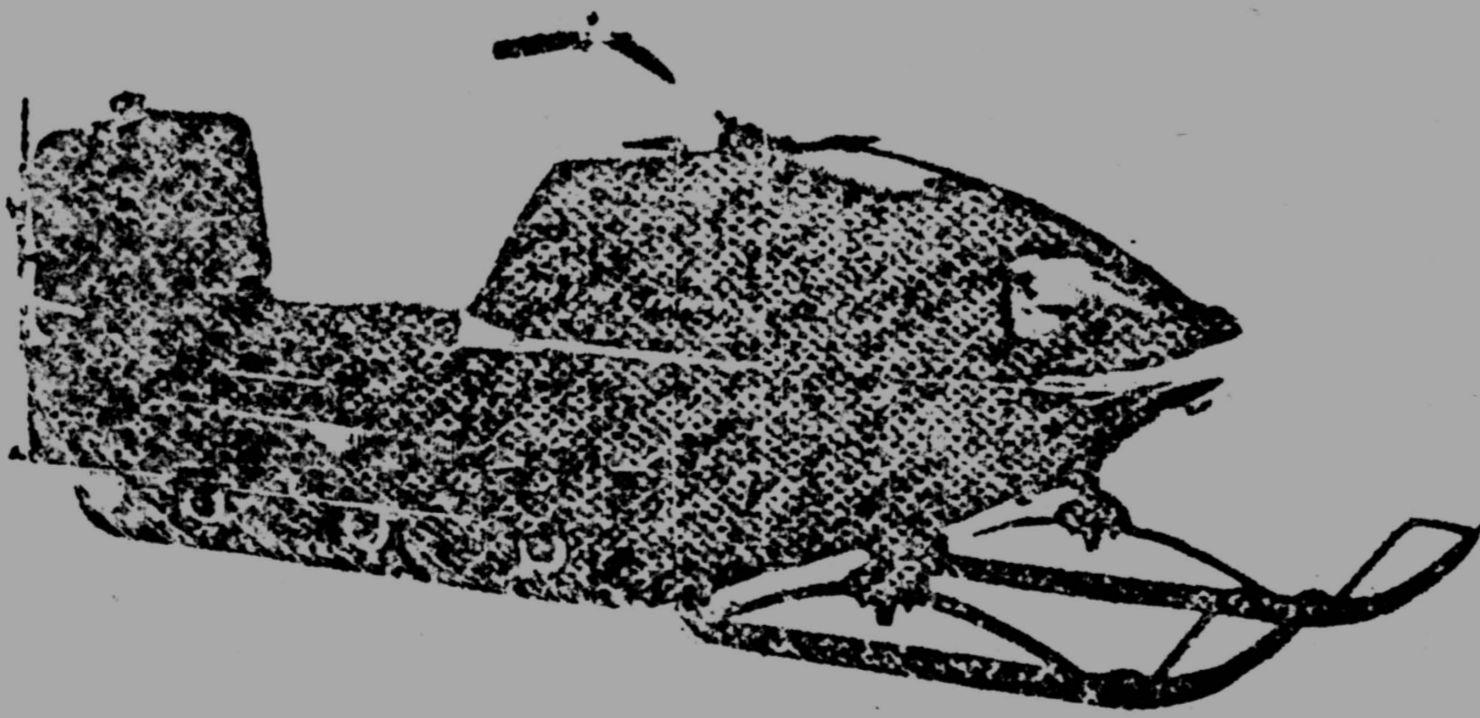

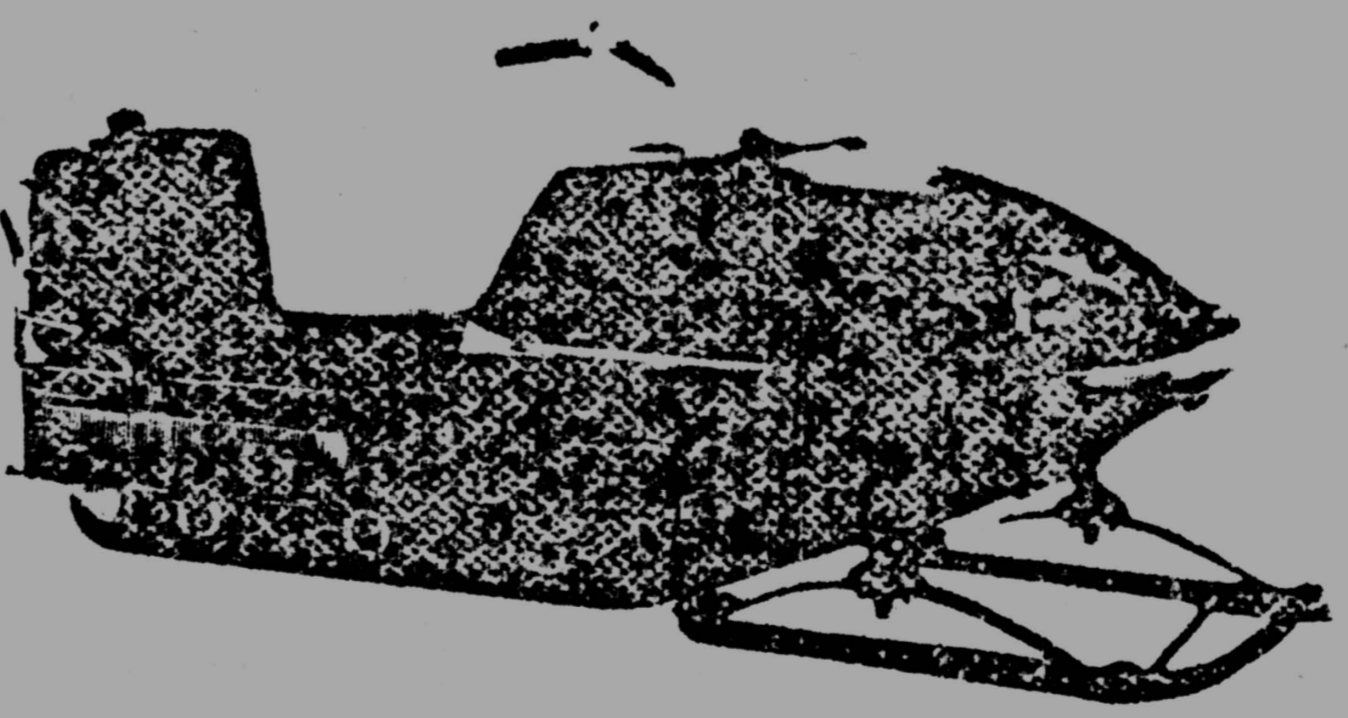
