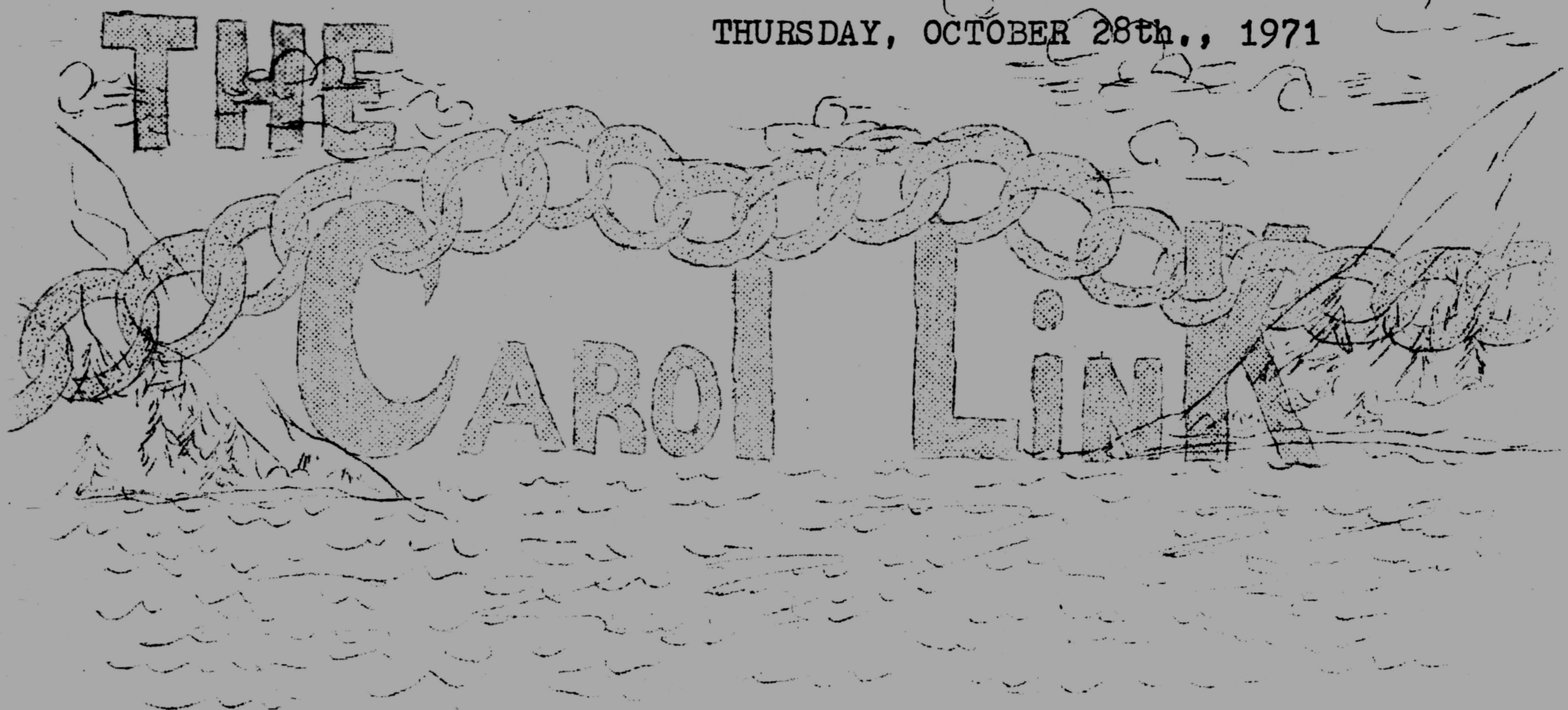

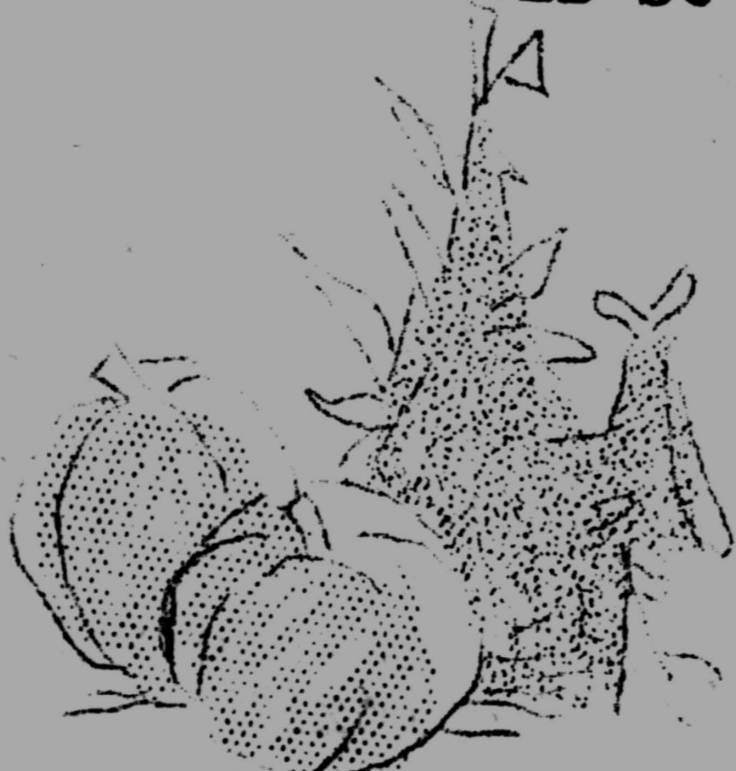

DAILY LIGHT

O Lord, I know that the way of man is not in himself: it is not in man that walketh to direct his steps.

Jeremiah 10:23.

Who ever heard of taking a trip without first making provision for one's needs along the way? How carefully plans must be made for supplies and emergency supplies. In stories of our early pioneers who travelled west, it is interesting to note how thoroughly they made preparation for the long journey ahead. Except for rare occasions, there were no stores nor stations dotting the route. Everything needed for sustaining life was carried on the wagons. Even food and water supplies had to be carried rather than depending on infrequent water holes and game along the route.

Christians travel a pioneer path on the journey of life. It is essential that their steps be guided and kept on the right road. Constantly there are choices between two ways, only one of which can be right. A false step might cause a fall. The wrong road is beset with dangers. Each step must be carefully considered. Our provision for every day cannot come from within ourselves. It must come from a higher source. How well this is pointed out in Jeremiah. "It is not in man that walketh to direct his steps." Solomon said that he recognized he was but a child when it came to directing his life. This is true of men throughout the human history. Think of the wanderings of the children of Israel; their kings and leaders tried, but failed. Consider the blunders and errors of the centuries. "The world by wisdom knew not God." (1 Corinthians 1:21). Too often we seek to follow the way of conscience, but the eye of reason has become dimmed so that the right path is not always discerned.

In bewilderment there is concern. Where shall I turn? If I cannot guide myself, who can? If one can, where may I find him? I can turn to the word of God. "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path." (Psalm 119: 105.) The bible speaks of one who has said, "I will instruct thee and teach thee in the way which thou shalt go: I will guide thee with Mine eye." (Psalm 32:8)

Christ is the only sure guide. "Follow me," He invites. He will order our steps and lead safely, surely through the perplexities of life, through the valleys and over the mountain.

NEW LABRADOR PARTY

The policy of the New Labrador Party is one that is very encompassing and one that will be pursued and presented with the interest of Newfoundland and Labrador in mind.

Although the New Labrador Party is active only in Labrador itself, and is seeking election to the three seats in Labrador, this does not mean that it has only the interest of Labrador in mind. The New Labrador Party is deeply concerned with the whole of Newfoundland and Labrador and while it may appear to be pro-Labrador, we do believe that this is essential in order to raise Labrador up to a relative equality with the rest of Newfoundland and Canada. Government policy up to the present has been a strictly extractive one for Labrador and the New Labrador Party sincerely believes that it is high time that it was stopped.

Therefore, the gist of what the policy of the New Labrador Party is, can be expressed by stating that we intend to obtain for Labrador a national equality that will come from having full employment, services and facilities and a overall sense of well being as a result of good government.

When the New Labrador Party is elected to the three seats in Labrador on October 28, we will immediately begin efforts to obtain and implement the following:

(1) Adequate doctors, nurses, hospitals and medical facilities for all of Labrador.

(2) An equal standard of education for all of Labrador, with incentives provided so that qualified and experienced teachers will be attracted to Labrador. Also, that schools be constructed to accommodate school children up to high school age and that these children attend school in or as close as possible to their own home towns until they graduate.

(3) A program of full employment for all of Labrador by establishing sawmills; a shipyard for building long liners; a plant to make the barrels necessary for shipping fish in; the establishment of a fish and produce base between coastal Labrador and Labrador West; the building of fish plants on the Labrador Coast; the establishment of Goose Bay as an air distribution centre and the training of Labradorians in the techniques necessary to obtain jobs in the industrialized parts of Labrador.

(4) The establishment of a 200 mile fishing limit for Labrador and foreign ships caught breaking this limit will be confiscated, fines levied and a minimum jail term of one year be given to the captains of these ships. With this limit in force and the waters of Labrador patrolled by the authorities, controlled harvesting and management of the Labrador fishery can be done.

(5) The establishment of adequate telegraph and telephone communications for all of Labrador (especially on the Labrador coast where these services are lacking terribly); obtaining electrical power for the whole of the Labrador coast and the providing of an adequate ferry service across the Strait of Belle Isle.

(6) The extension of the road in Labrador South, northward so as to eventually connect with Goose Bay and the proposed Trans-Labrador Highway. Also that a start be made on a road link from Labrador West to the North shore of the St. Lawrence.

(7) The establishment of television transmitters so that Labrador may obtain "live" television and the provision of adequate radio service for Labrador.

(8) Better railway service for Labrador West through the provision of sleeping cars and the implementation of a rail-car ferry service from Labrador West to Seven Islands. On the Labrador Coast, the New Labrador Party will advocate improved boat services.

(9) Mail carrier service for Labrador West and the building of a new post office so that residents may obtain the service and facilities that they so justly deserve.

(10) The building of provincial parks in Labrador.

(11) The cancellation of gasoline tax in Labrador until roads are realized.

(12) The provision of an adequate and efficient air service for Labrador combined with reasonable passenger and freight rates.

(13) The establishment of a Northern Newfoundland and Labrador Savings Bond, this bond to be made available to residents of Northern Newfoundland and Labrador only, with special tax concessions and high interest rates given on these bonds..

(14) That Labrador's clean air and water be preserved and that pollution now evident in Labrador be cleaned up and stricter anti-pollution laws set down.

In being elected to the House of Assembly, the three New Labrador Party members will do their utmost to carry out this policy that will mark the beginning of a new and prosperous era for Newfoundland and Labrador and in doing so, will lay the cornerstone for a better Newfoundland and Labrador for generations to come.

In 1755 the French drew up a map of the Maritime region, including Newfoundland and the south half of Labrador. Over what is now the district of Labrador West they inscribed "dent l'Interieur est enterement Inconnu" ("about which the interior is entirely unknown"). That map might as easily have been produced by the Smallwood government last week.

Labrador West remains "entirely unknown" to the government, if it thinks that the people here can be swayed by the hurry-up promise of three doctors to put a bandage on a wound that's been bleeding months before the election was called. Heaven help anyone who is postponing treatment until the arrival of these three men.

Labrador West remains "entirely unknown" if the government believes that it can buy votes with a provincial building (that may yet be converted to a much needed outdoor swimming pool), where there are many families who have no building, trailer or shelter of any kind that they can call their own.

Labrador West remains "entirely unknown" if Mr. Smallwood believes that the people here are overwhelmed with the possibility of having a cabinet member as their representative, when it is the Cabinetmaker and not the cabinet that calls the shots, and cuts and carves where he will.

Labrador West remains "entirely unknown" if the government looks for gratitude and great rejoicing when it announces that in a few years, perhaps, we will have a road that will enable us to cross nearly 300 miles of wilderness/to shop in Goose Bay and Happy Valley, communities that have been as forgotten and neglected as our own.

Labrador West remains "entirely unknown" if they think that the people of Labrador West will choose more of the same and return the Liberal candidate as a matter of course! We will not be treated like sheep! We will not be patronized The New Labrador Party is the only Party that can see that Labrador West, and all of Labrador, remains unknown no longer!

The New Labrador Party is the only party for Labrador right now. If the Liberals ever do be re-elected we would only receive more of the same treatment as we are receiving now. If the P.C. were to be elected, they would concentrate all efforts towards the Island trying to obtain the rest of the seats. However in electing the New Labrador Party the people of Labrador can be assured that they will have three members in the House of Assembly who are well versed in Labrador affairs, because they live and think in Labrador, and are dedicated to Labrador and it's people.

In reading the policy of the New Labrador Party, one becomes aware that it has been arrived at by people who live in Labrador and who are aware of the problems Labrador has and who want a united voice in the Newfoundland House of Assembly.



- (2) a polling station at Stephenville in the Electoral District
of Port au Port for each of the Electoral Districts

named in Our said Proclamation with the exception of the Electoral District of Port au Port,

- (iii) a polling station at Gander in the Electoral District of Gander for each of the Electoral Districts named in Our said Proclamation with the exception of the Electoral District of Gander,
- (iv) a polling station at Corner Brook, in the Electoral District of Humber West for each of the Electoral Districts named in Our said Proclamation with the exception of the Electoral Districts of Humber West and Humber East,
- (v) a polling station at Churchill Falls in the Electoral District of Labrador West for each of the Electoral Districts named in Our said Proclamation with the exception of the Electoral District of Labrador West,
- (vi) a polling station at Happy Valley in the Electoral District of Labrador North for each of the Electoral Districts named in Our said Proclamation with the exception of the Electoral District of Labrador North, and
