Following is a synopsis of Carmen, which will be our next concert in Labrador City . . .

C A R M E N by Georges Bizet

ACT I

In a square in Seville, the young Spanish corporal, Don Jose, and his captain Zuniga, are talking together. A gypsy girl, Carmen, comes along and fascinates both men by her singing of a Habanera before proceeding to a near-by cigarette factory, where she works. A few moments later, Micaela appears, looking for Don Jose (her fiancée) She begs him to return with her to his home town to see his mother, who is ill. He agrees. But Carmen meantime, has stabbed a co-worker, is arrested and placed under Jose's guard. She persuades him to let her escape- whereupon he, himself, is taken off to prison.

ACT II

Carmen and her friends, Frasquita and Mercedes, are in Lillas Pastia's Tavern, singing and dancing, when the great Torero, Escamillo, stops by for a whirl-wind visit and is immediately enamored of Carmen. Although she enjoys his attentions, she is impatient for the arrival of Don Jose, who has been released from prison. Soon after Escamillo leaves there is a joyous re-union between Carmen and Jose, but there is foreboding in her lack of understanding for his duties as a soldier. When Zuniga unexpectedly comes to the Tavern to see Carmen, Jose's jealousy precipitates a fight. Two smugglers, Dancairo and Remendado, soon break it up, but Don Jose is left with little alternative but to join Carmen's band of smugglers.

ACT III

At the smugglers' mountain camp, it is soon apparent that Carmen is about to discard Don Jose for Escamillo. When the latter appears, Jose's jealousy again leads to a fight. Carmen and the smugglers intervene. Micaela finds her way to the camp with word that Jose's mother is dying. He leaves with Micaela, but warns Carmen that they will meet again.

ACT IV

Before the bull fight, Carmen wishes her new love, Escamillo, good luck. Frasquita and Mercedes warn Carmen that Jose is looking for her, but she insists upon facing him - alone. When he begs for her love, she laughs, scornfully says that all is over between them, and tries to pass him to enter the arena. But Don Jose, insane with jealousy and despair, stabs her.

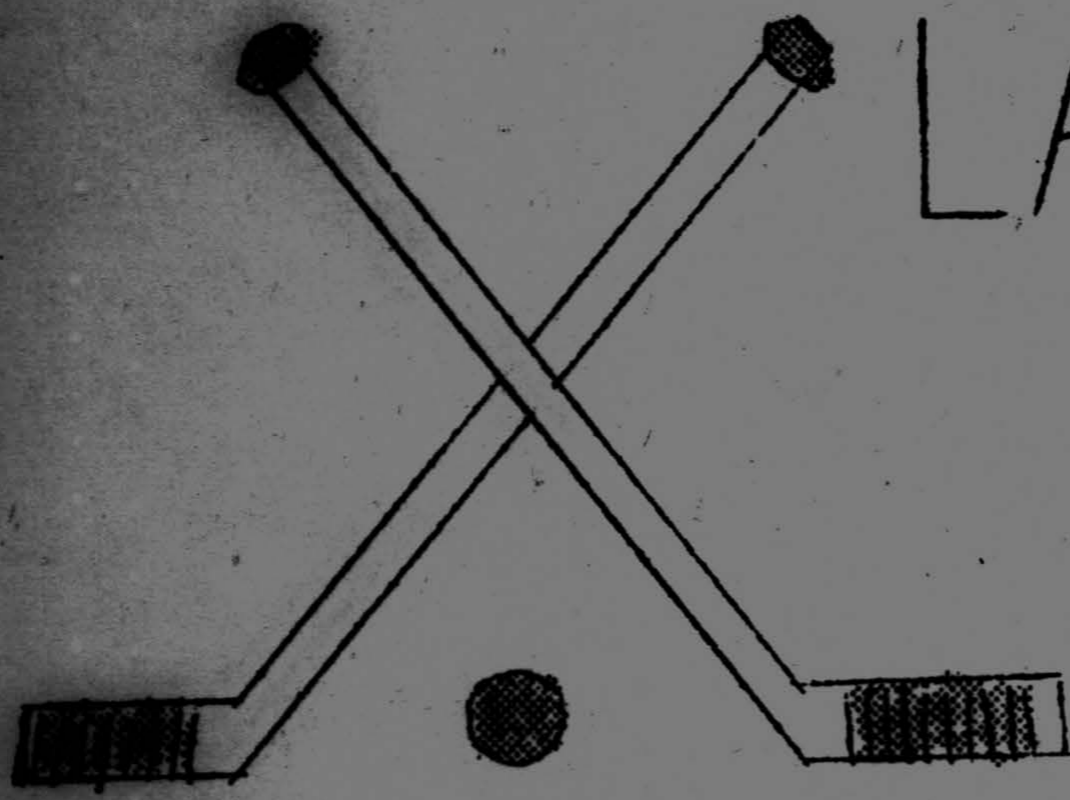
