Things were very quiet over Christmas and New Years in Court Circles.

One resident of Wa bush was charged with false pretenses and also theft from Ayres Ltd. In each case, he was placed under suspended sentence for two years and ordered to sign a Bond for \$500.00 to be on good behavior during that period, and also to report to the Probationary Officer as often as required.

Two residents of Labrador City were charged with theft of an automobile - a Pick-Up from Hussey Engineering Ltd., The vehicle became stuck in a snow bank on the Airport Road and \$500.00 damage was caused. One of the two, was convicted of the offence and fined \$100.00 or 30 days in the Penitentiary, and was ordered to pay compensation to Hussey Engineering for damage. The charge against the 2nd. man was dismissed as he had no knowledge the vehicle he was riding in was stolen.

Another resident of Labrador City was charged with creating disturbance in the Cafeteria. The charge was dismissed as evidence showed that it was more of the Christmas Spirit than actual disturbance.

A resident of Labrador City was charged with Impaired Driving and as medical evidence is yet to be called, the case is not completed.

A case involving a former resident of Labrador City for causing a disturbance in the Home Bakery Snack Bar was heard and he was fined \$100.00 or 30 days in the Penitentiary.

A number of traffic cases were heard, and the usual fines imposed.

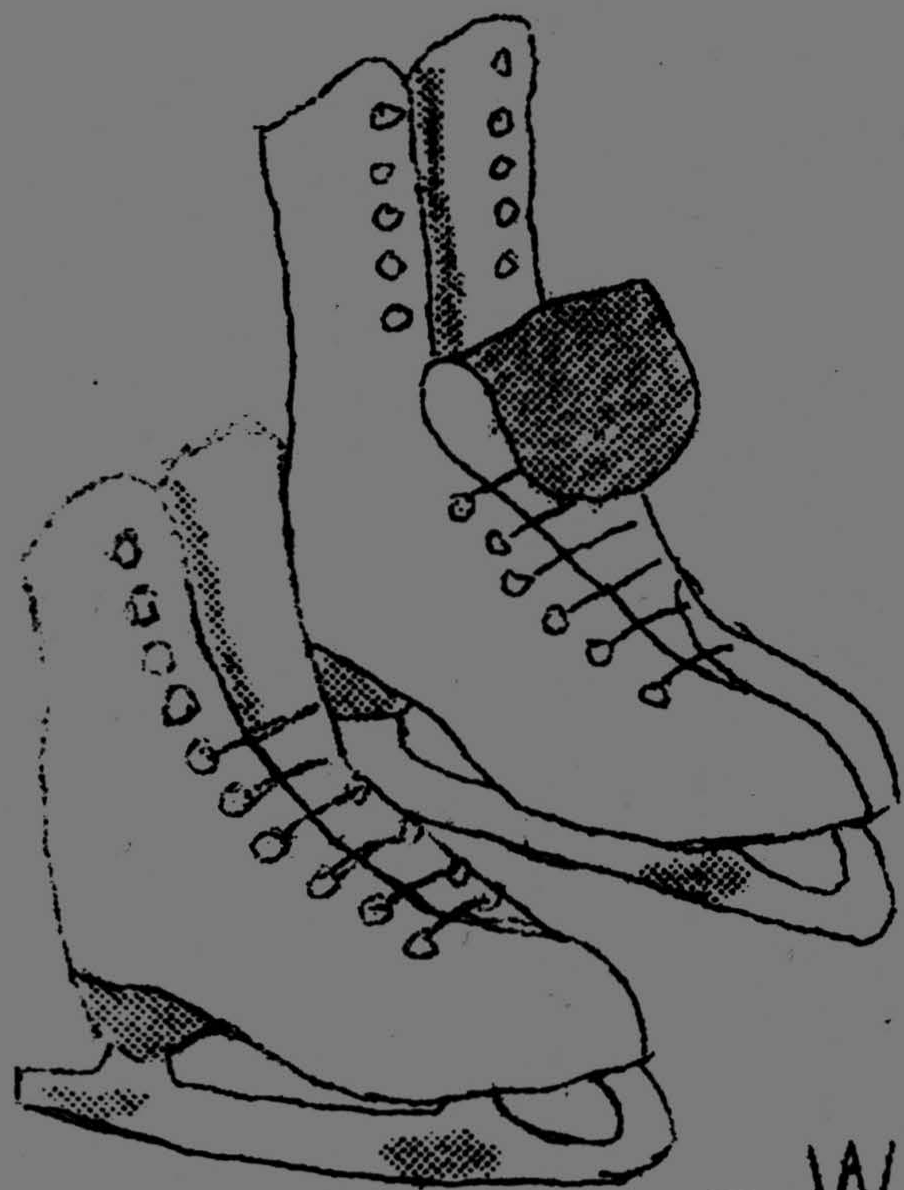
