REPORT FROM THE PROVINCIAL CAPITAL
CONFEDERATION BUILDING, 23 FEB. '66

Newfoundland & Labrador may be going too deeply and rapidly into debt says Charles Devine (Ind.-Labrador West) who today called for a thorough review of the province's financial structure. Speaking in the budget debate, Mr. Devine wondered if the provincial economy could absorb the loans raised by the government each year in the form of bond issues.

This year the government has a deficit of \$28 million which amounts to five per cent of the estimated \$560 million gross provincial product or the total amount of goods and services produced in the Province, he said.

"A generally recognized financial guideline today states that government deficits of up to two per cent of the gross national product should not present too great a burden on the state" the Labrador West member continued. If the U.S. went in debt this year at the same rate Newfoundland & Labrador has, its deficit would be \$30 billion compared with the actual figure of \$1.8 billion. If Canada had a five per cent deficit like this Province it would amount to \$2.5 billion instead of the actual small fraction of this amount. Quebec which is projecting its highest expenditure in history is estimating a deficit of less than 2% of gross Provincial Product. "With the completing of many new hospitals, schools and many miles of highways I felt that this year we would be close to a balanced budget" he continued. "But instead, we have the largest deficit in our history, almost the same amount as the total expenditure in the first year of Confederation." Mr. Devine felt the time has come for a group of independent financial consultants to see "if we are getting too deeply and too rapidly in debt."

He also quoted figures to show that the unemployed in this Province are already better educated than those of New Brunswick and Quebec, stating that, according to Dominion Bureau of Statistics figures, of the unemployed in the Province of Quebec, 77% have Grade 8 or less, in the Province of New Brunswick its 73% and this Province 72%, are we putting too much emphasis on education and not enough on jobs, inquired the Labrador West Member.

"Enormous expenditures on education and highways are of little benefit to the residents of the 230 communities of less than 30 people that exist in Newfoundland & Labrador today" he said. He called for acceleration of the centralization program since Newfoundland "will continue to be very backward as long as we have 15 per cent of our population in isolation".

Speaking of minimum wages he mentioned that Prince Edward Island is raising its minimum to \$1.15 an hour, noting that this Province has a standard of living nearly as low as that in Newfoundland where the minimum wage is .75 cents

Mr. Devine presented an idea to the House, based on recent Saskatchewan legislation, entitled the Direct Sellers act. He pointed out that a four day "cooling off" period was contained in the act, which gave the customer of a door-to-door salesman time to return the goods they bought and obtain a refund if found unsatisfactory.

The Independent Member spoke of the danger that government officials may come to regard permits and licenses they grant, as a privilege they are passing on to the public. "All citizens are free beings and are entitled to engage in any act consistent with existing laws which restrict their actions for the common good. All licensing is a further restriction and should be considered and administered as such. To infer that the official is granting the privilege to do what for centuries has been a free man's right, is a most frightening concept" he continued and suggested the post of "ombudsman" as a buffer between people and government.

Charles Devine (Ind.-Labrador West) has asked that a copy of the annual report of Hydro Quebec be obtained and studied by members of the House of Assembly. He said in the budget speech, the government agency's report announced that five major rivers on the north shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence have been studied as sources of hydro power. Since two of these rivers have their headwaters in western Labrador, Newfoundland MHA's should study this interesting report.

Mr. Devine said the interest caused in his district by the government's announced intention to create a department of Labrador Affairs, is rather surprising.

However he assured the House that "IF THIS DEPARTMENT IF BEING ESTABLISHED AS A SOFT TOUCH HIDDEN AWAY IN SOME CORNER OF THE CONFEDERATION BUILDING, THEN HER MAJESTY'S PRESENT ADMINISTRATION WILL RUE THE DAY THE ANNOUNCEMENT WAS MADE."

He described as "farsighted" plans to build a tunnel under the Strait of Bell Isle, but urged that in the intervening years a ferry service be set up between Corner Brook and Seven Islands.

Speaking of the recent fire at Wabush, Mr. Devine said replacement of buildings and machinery plus loss of wages and production, will amount to about \$25 million. Expansion plans, which were being considered by Wabush Mines have been shelved for this year. No improvement in the housing situation is expected in the foreseeable future.

Fortunately the situation in Labrador City is much brighter since Pellet Plant expansion is continuing throughout the winter, contracts are soon to be awarded for the construction of a large number of housing units and he predicted that by the end of 1967, Labrador City, could be the largest, after St. John's and Corner Brook, incorporated community in the Province

PROVINCIAL REPORT - CONTINUED

In conclusion Mr. Devine said "when I made my first Speech in this Legislature, I represented the 40th or 41st District in this Province, population wise. In the short space of three years, we have grown to nearly 10,000 souls, who this year should have the highest total income of any District in this Province. In that this will probably be my last Formal speech in this 33rd Assembly, I should like to close by thanking the people of Labrador West for granting me the honour of representing them in their House for these four sessions, and trust that the future will hold progress, prosperity and happiness, not only for the residents of Labrador West, but all the people of Newfoundland and Labrador."

C O U R T N E W S

A transient was charged with being drunk in a public place, and fined \$20.00 or 30 days.

A resident was charged with imprudent driving. He was convicted and fined \$50.00 or 4 weeks imprisonment. The same man was convicted of obstruction of a Police Officer and fined \$50. and costs or an additional 30 days.

A number of Wabush residents were convicted of offences under the Dog Act, and each fined \$5.00 or 1 day imprisonment

A former resident of Labrador City who had been charged with 7 offences of False Pretenses - that of writing worthless cheques, and who left the area before being brought to trial. He was brought back, this week under warrant of arrest. He was convicted of the 7 charges. His only defence being that he had heard it was easy to get things up here, by writing worthless cheques. The day he was leaving, he had closed out his bank account and proceeded to write the cheques. He was sentenced to 3 months imprisonment on each charge, to run concurrently, and ordered to pay compensation in all cases.

Several business firms were involved in this incident. The Court pointed out, that Business People in this area, should tighten up their policy on accepting cheques from persons who cannot produce proper credentials.

A transient worker was convicted of possession of stolen goods. Evidence showed that he had a criminal record dating back to 1958, with offences ranging from damage to property, to robbery while armed.

It is announced that the taking of a Voter's List, has been started and Enumerators have been appointed for this area and will be compiling a list of voters during the coming weeks. It is interesting to note that the voting age has been dropped to 19 years. Other qualifications - One has to be a British Subject or a Canadian Citizen with 1 year residency in the province of Newfoundland and Labrador.
