EDITORIAL:

As a result of our Editorial two weeks ago, pertaining to the Safety of our children in Labrador City and Wabush, we have received calls from conscientious citizens who wish to have other hazards dealt with in the hope that future tragedies may be avoided. We are pleased to co-operate with Mr. J. Murphy, of I.O.C. Safety Department in writing about three areas of danger, and we ask that parents, after reading, stress most emphatically to their children the drastic results that could come about, if CARE and CAUTION are not used ALWAYS. Don't be one of those who say 'This couldn't happen to me', instead say 'I won't let it happen!'

Every year there are numerous forest fires. Some are caused by lightning and can hardly be blamed on anyone, but many are the result of someone's carelessness. In 1959 there was a severe fire in our own area, and in 1960 the town of Gagnon had to be evacuated because of fire. This appears to be a warm and dry summer looming ahead and extreme caution is required by all. Smoking in the bush, and picnic fires are AGAINST THE LAW. The actual by-laws are printed elsewhere in this issue - read it carefully and OBEY!

Around our town there is much construction going on. Quite often it is necessary to do blasting in the process. Because of this, it is possible, not probable, but still possible, that an explosive could get into the hands of the wrong people, children in this matter are our main concern. A blasting cap, which is a metal cartridge aprx. $\frac{1}{2}$ inch in diameter and with wires protruding from one end, could be very tempting to a playing child to hit with a rock or a hammer. Tell your children about these, if they ever see any, they should just leave it alone, but quickly report it to an adult. The result of a blasting cap exploding could be disastrous to the child. The same applies to dynamite sticks. These are 8 to 10 inches long, and usually brown paper covered.

We have two Sub stations in the area, housing the Power Transformers. One is near the Ball Park, the other on Bartlett Dr. These are well-fenced with barbed wire around the top of the fence. However, children, being children, sometimes seem to do the impossible. Warn your own youngsters about the danger lurking behind all that fencing. Keep your eyes open for other children playing about these forbidden areas, send them away, and if you are not sure they will stay away, report it to your local R.C.M.P.

The last topic I wish to deal with at present, is the danger of all the broken glass round and about, but especially at Quartzite Lake. A young lad received a very bad cut this week, while wading at the waters edge. This topic will be dealt with in next week's Editorial. The guilty parties who leave all this broken glass around, prepare to have your ears burned BUT GOOD!

FOREST FIRES REGULATIONS 1966

2 - (1) Subject to these regulations, no person shall light a fire outdoors in any part of the province outside a city or municipality between the hours of midnight on the 17th day of June and midnight on the 1st day of September 1966, unless that person lights the fire under authority of a permit issued by or under authority of the Minister of Mines, Agriculture & Resources under the Forest Fires Act.

(2) A person may light an outdoor fire without a permit

(a) in a prepared location in a Prov. Park, and permission to light such fire is given by the attending officer.

(b) on a sand or gravel beach if

1 - the fire is located at a distance of not less than one hundred feet from the nearest woods, brush or other inflammable material.

2 - the fire does not exceed a surface area of four square feet, and

3 - the fire is located at a distance of not more than four feet from a body of water whose surface area exceeds one hundred square feet.

(c) in a garbage disposal unit if

1 - the unit completely contains the fire and is adequately screened to prevent the escape of sparks or other burning material, and

2 - the unit is located on private property and at least fifty ft. from any woods, trees or brush.

THESE ARE NOT PERMITTED IF THE FIRE HAZARD IS HIGH OR EXTREME AND PERMITS CAN BECOME INVALID AT SUCH TIMES.

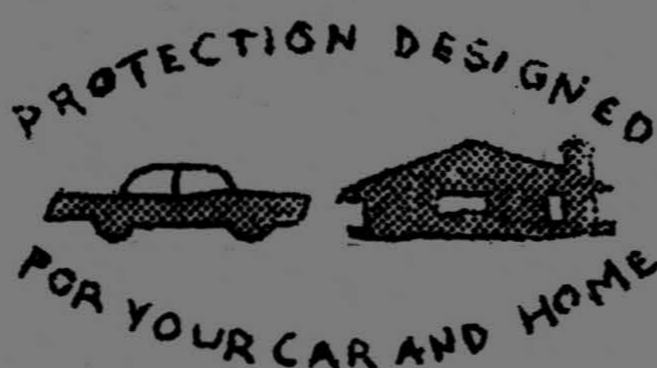

Let's face it. We are on the frontier, and the frontier seems to attract that kind of person. We will be having two new frontier parsons in Labrador City - the Rev. Eric Snider in the United Church, and Captain John Carew of the Salvation Army. I am willing to guarantee that neither of these men are Elmer Gantries. Both these men are dedicated to their work, and both will be a benefit to Labrador City.

INSECT CONTROL PROGRAM - SUMMER 1966

In a short while the annual town fogging operations will begin. This procedure is necessary in order to eliminate as much as possible the black-fly and mosquito problem within the town limits.

A specially designed machine is used for this purpose and in past summers it has been noted that the fog from the machine has provided a great source of attraction for the children of the town. In connection with this a WORD of warning is issued to all parents to keep their children away from the immediate fogging area.

There are a number of reasons why this warning is necessary.

First - the fog from the machine is rather dense in the immediate vicinity of the machine and passing motorists may have difficulty in spotting children.

Secondly - the chemical used in fogging is a 5% solution of DDT and if this is inhaled in large quantities it will cause nausea and an eventual slight loss of weight. For this reason also it is advisable for windows and doors to remain closed during the operation.

Thirdly - by keeping the children away from the fogging area a contribution is made to the greater success of the fogging operation and a more efficient job can be done.
