CONFERENCE ON THE EMOTIONAL PROBLEMS OF CHILDREN

A conference on the Emotional Problems of Children sponsored jointly by the Labrador West Branch of the Newfoundland Teachers' Association and the Canadian Mental Health Association was held at the Labrador City Collegiate auditorium of Friday, October 27, 1967.

Approximately 140 teachers and invited guests registered for the conference on Friday morning. The President of the Labrador West Branch of the Newfoundland Teachers' Association, Mr. P.G. Congdon officially opened the conference at 9:30 am. Following the opening ceremonies, Dr. C. Pottle, one of the two consultants for the conference and Director of Mental Health Services for the province of Newfoundland, spoke on "Identifying the Emotional Problems of Children". This was followed by a coffee break, after which the audience divided into 10 discussion groups which continued until 12 noon. At noon the audience reassembled and a question period was held until 1:00 pm. Each discussion group asked questions to a panel consisting of the two conference consultants and the school nurses of the area. The morning session then recessed for lunch.

The afternoon session began at 2:00 pm. with a talk by Professor H. Stutt, on "Emotional Problems of Children - the role of the teacher". Professor Stutt, a Professor of Education at MacDonald College of McGill University, has had a number of years experience working in the field of special programs and classes for emotionally disturbed children, in and around the Montreal area. The rest of the afternoon followed the morning pattern with discussion groups, coffee break, and question period. The working sessions of the conference ended at approximately 5:00 pm. The conference came to a close with a banquet at the Sir Wilfred Grenfell Hotel at 6:00 pm. Toastmaster for the banquet was Mr. P.G. Congdon. Professor Stutt was guest speaker at the banquet and evaluated the day's proceedings. Mr. T. Furlong, executive Director of the Newfoundland Division of the Canadian Mental Health Association, thanked all those present on behalf of the Canadian Mental Health Association. Mr. C.J. McCormick, who acted as chairman for the day's proceedings, expressed thanks on behalf of the Local Branch of the N.T.A. to all present and encouraged the teachers to continue this work in the future.

From the point of view of many who attended, the conference was a very encouraging success. The Conference committee hopes to compile all the work of the conference and give a summary of the details at a later date.

SPORTS BEAM ^{BY "DON"}

It took Cassius Clay 15 rounds on Monday night before he could beat Max Schmeling by a unanimous decision. "The Pride of Germany" had Clay on the mat for the eight count in round seven and for a while it looked as if history was being repeated as it was with Joe Louis years ago. However, as the experts predicted, Clay took over and punished schmeling for the remainder of the bout.

As it is in all professional sport the old pro's always come through. This also holds true for hockey, as during the past week Gordie Howe caught fire and as a result the Detroit Red Wings are leading the league. It is still a little early for predictions, suffice it to say - The Black Hawks had better start moving.

THE SECOND PART OF MY ARTICLES DEALING WITH BETTER HOCKEY FOR MINOR LEAGERS HAS TO DO WITH - STICK HANDLING. TO BE A GOOD STICK HANDLER YOU NEED TO KNOW HOW:-

- (a) To carry the puck forward on your stick
- (b) To stick handle around a checker.

A left-handed player holds his stick with the end in his right hand, a right hander holds it in his left. The lower hand should be 14 to 16 inches farther down the shaft. The correct lie of your stick (the angle the blade makes with the shaft usually a #4,5 or 6) is the one which keeps the blade flat on the ice when passing and stickhandling in a natural, comfortable body position.

HERE ARE SOME GOOD POINTERS ON STICKHANDLING:-

- (1) Advance the puck with soft, side to side sweeps, which vary in width.
- (2) Nurse the puck midway on the blade.
- (3) 'Toe in' the blade tilting it slightly over the puck to keep control.
- (4) Keep your hands and wrists loose.
- (5) Look up while carrying the puck. When beginning, glance down occasionally to control it. Try to develop 'split vision' or the ability to see the puck on your stick and the opponent ahead of you at the same time.
- (6) To go around a checker, pass the puck wide to your backhand (to the right for a left hand player) as you near his extended stick. The width of this sweep will be increased by releasing your lower hand from the stick. At the same time, break sharply around him to your right, placing your body between the puck and the checker. Don't make this move too soon, or your opponent will be there to meet you. If you wait too long, or course, he will poke the puck from your stick. To know when you go around him, you must notice whether he is backing up, stationary, or moving toward you. See how necessary it becomes for you to have your head up, watching him. Practice this maneuver both ways, keeping your opponent in doubt until the last moment thus preventing him from anticipating your move.

NEXT WEEK WE WILL TAKE A LOOK AT THE PROPER METHODS TO USE WHEN PASSING THE PUCK.

The ice has now been completed at the Curling Club and instructions are being held all this week and Monday, Tuesday of next week. The list has been posted for the first draw which will commence Wednesday November 8th. The list will be removed on Sunday November 5th and a skips meeting held on Monday November 6th at 7:00 pm. The opening Bonspiel will be held on the 17th, 18th and 19th of this month.

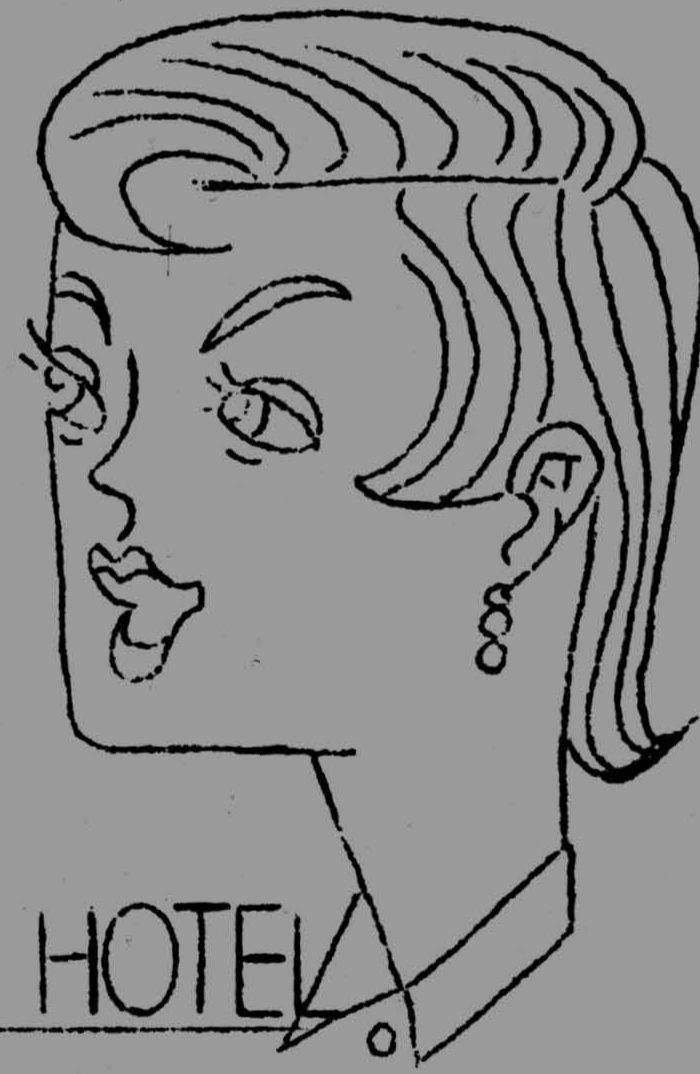

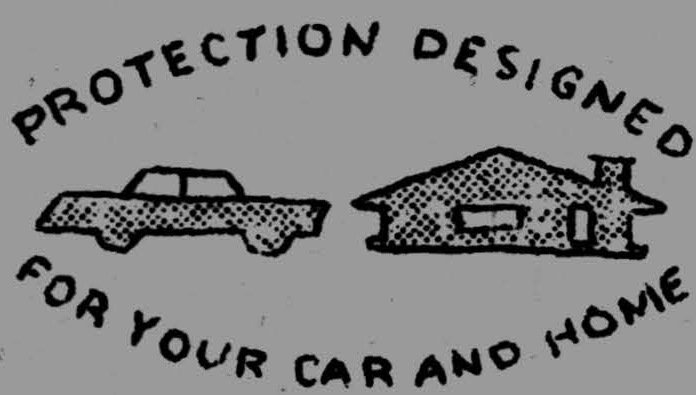

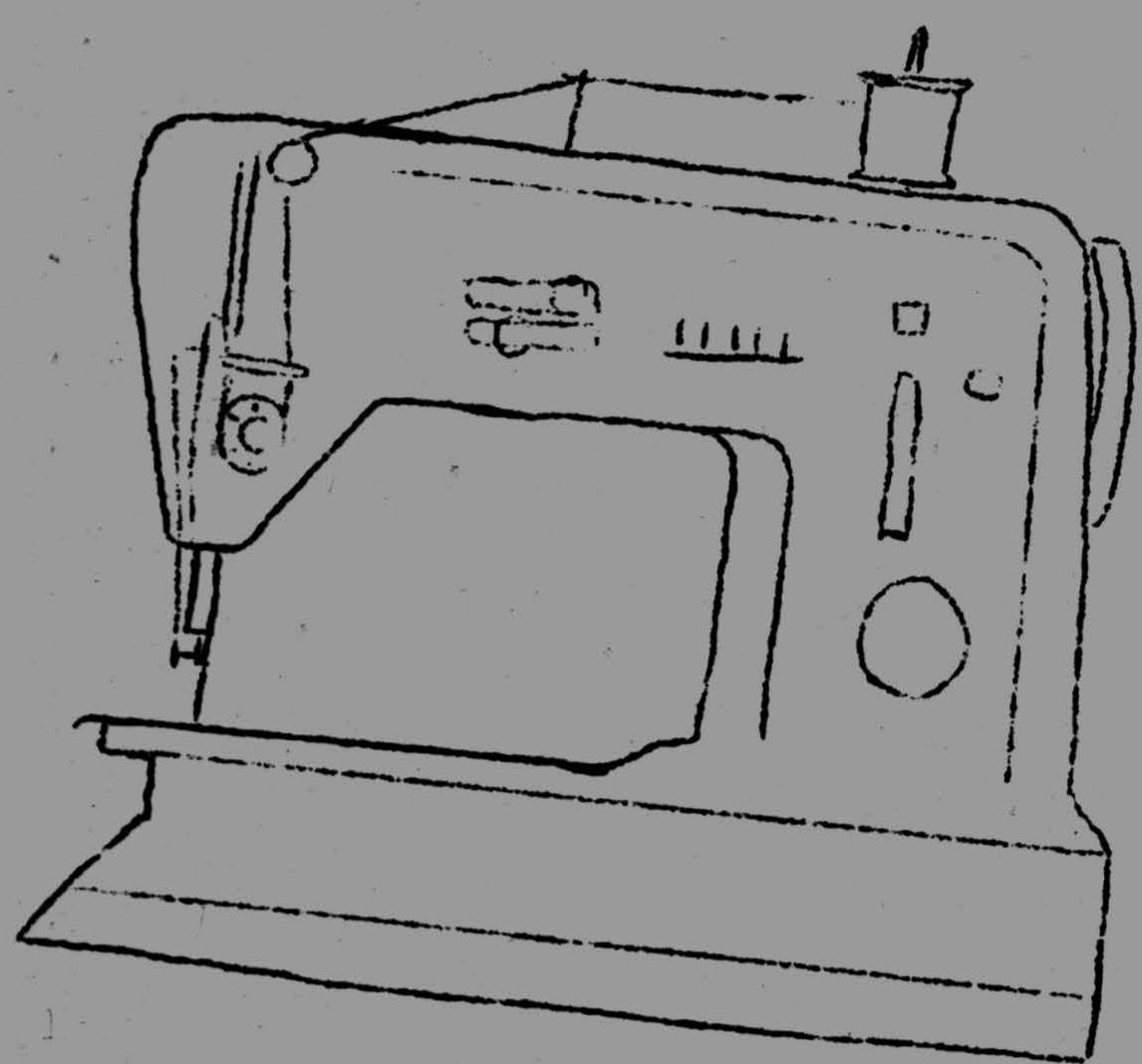

Below is a letter of appreciation from L. Allison Sayers, Supervisor, Eye Service Dept. C.N.I.B:-

The enthusiastic assistance of over 50 community - minded volunteers from Labrador City and Wabush during the month of October is sincerely appreciated. The keen interest shown and the many hours devoted by the volunteers have resulted in the success of the Amblyopia Screening Survey. The CNIB, Nfld. and Labrador Division hopes that this participation has given them much cause for satisfaction and that they have felt the time spent to have been worthwhile. We believe the important work accomplished has made a substantial contribution to better eye health, not only in Labrador City and Wabush, but to the Province as a whole.

Our sincere thanks to the management of the IOC of Canada and Scully Mines for their generous contribution of staff and facilities, without which the project would have been much more difficult and perhaps not as successful.

A very much appreciated car provided by City Motors of Labrador City furnished the mobility required, especially during the two week period when the screening was being done in both Labrador City and Wabush simultaneously. The cooperation of all of these people and of many others who were directly or indirectly involved in the survey, has led to the very successful completion of this pilot project in Newfoundland.

During the three weeks of the survey 795 children between 3½ and 7 years were seen. Of these 282 were referred for rechecking and 246 did return for re-checking. 146 were referred for a medical eye examination to the oculist, who joined the survey team on 23 October. An additional 38 children outside the survey age range were referred to the oculist through the school nurses or the survey team. Out of these 185 children seen by the oculist, 37 were found to have amblyopia. 63 had significant refraction errors. An additional 10 had had their refraction errors corrected.

The preliminary organization of the survey was carried out by the Coordinating Committee under the Chairman, Mr. Art Turnbull. Without this initial work of the Committee and their support during the survey the result could not have been as successful.

Everyone, Contestants, spectators and organizers were most enthused and the \$100 question is "WHEN IS THE NEXT ONE?".

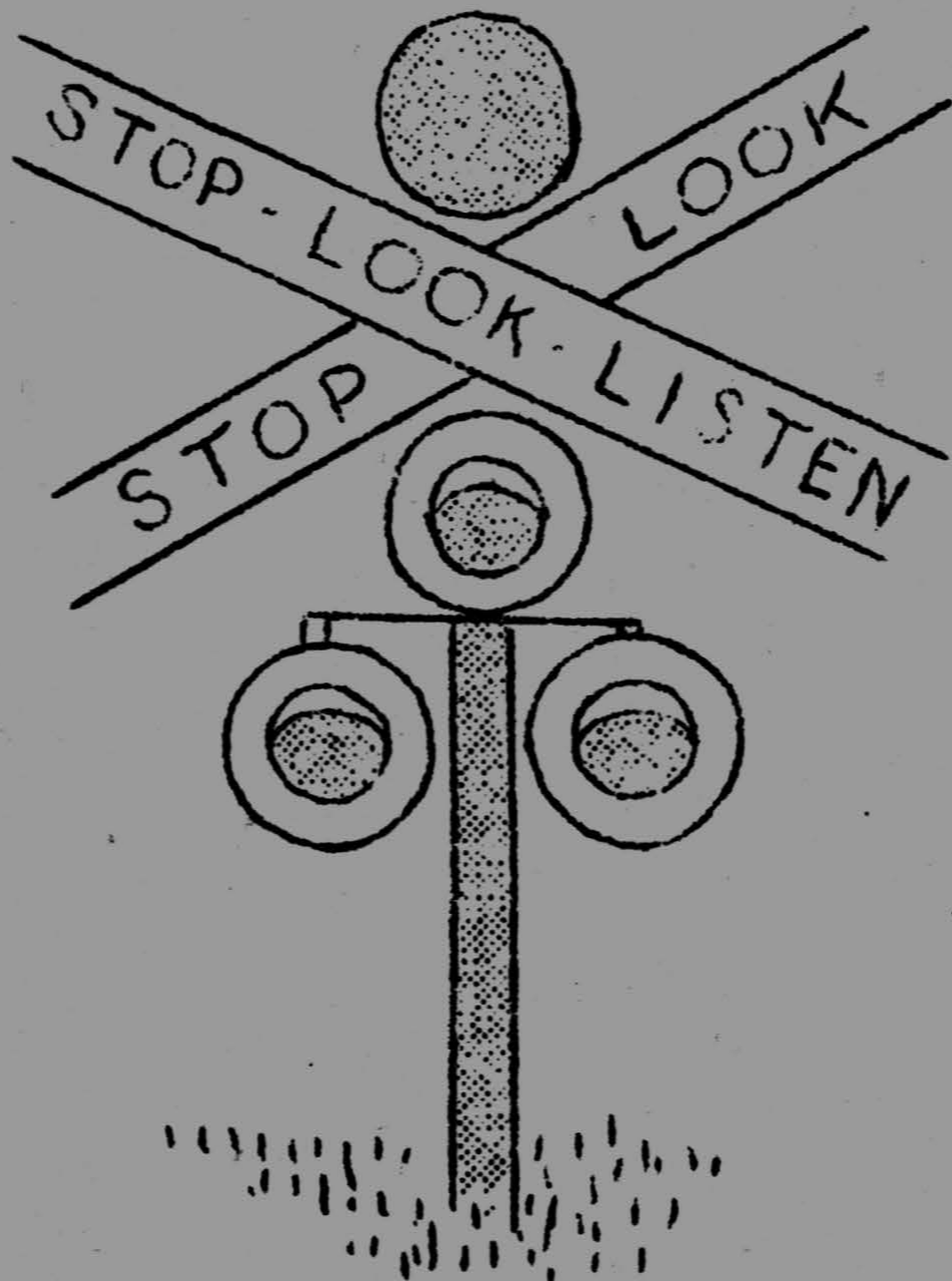

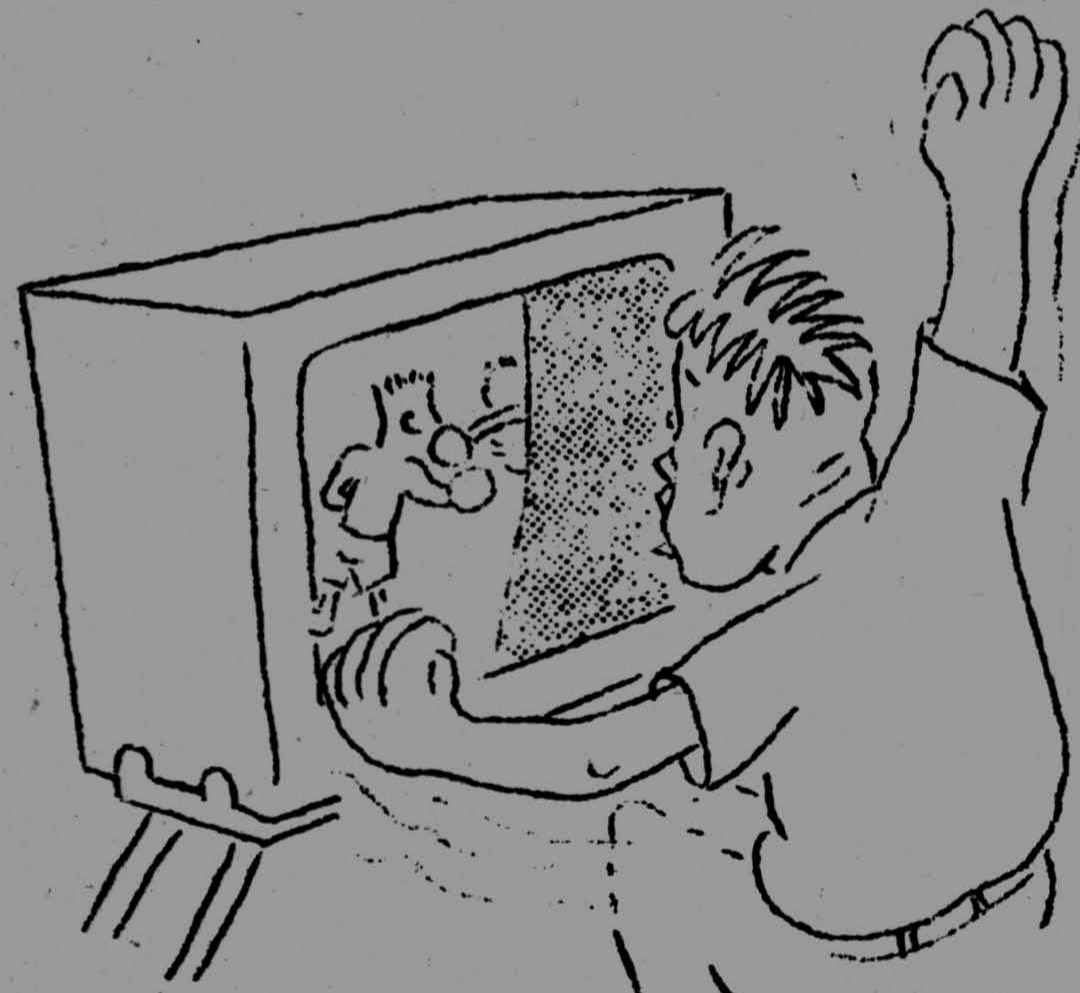
