- EDITORIAL -

Snowmobiles are growing more and more popular here in Labrador City and every year we see more and more of them in operation. These versatile machines have opened up a new world of wintertime enjoyment for so many people especially now that we have our own Snowmobile Club which was started, if I remember rightly, only last year.

Not only are they used for pleasure but many industrial firms are using them to great advantage in the bush for timber inspection and telephone line patrol etc:

Unfortunately, as with any motorized vehicle, careless operation can cause very severe accidents, and in fact there have been, according to the papers a few fatalities especially when children have been allowed to operate them. Other accidents have occurred when sleds and toboggans were being towed behind the vehicle.

Snowmobiles are not made to be operated on highways where the snow has become smooth and icy. They are meant specifically for deeper snow, and in fact it is a punishable offence to operate a Snowmobile on a public highway, sidewalk, parking area or any place to which the public has access for the passage of vehicles.

For the benefit of new owners I will repeat a notice printed in the Carol News last year from the R.C.M.P.

"Highway" means the entire width between the boundary lines of a highway, road, street, avenue, thoroughfare, right-of-way, parkway driveway, lane, alley, square, place, bridge, culvert, viaduct, trestle or causeway, whether it is publicly owned and whether or not it is designed or intended for use by the public, if the whole or any part of it is used by the public for the passage of vehicles and includes a trail on a frozen lake, river or other body of water or watercourse when that trail is maintained or kept open at the expense of the province or a municipality. The minimum penalty for operating an unlicensed motor vehicle on a highway is \$50.00, and either the operator or the owner may be charged.

So please, don't let carelessness spoil your enjoyment.

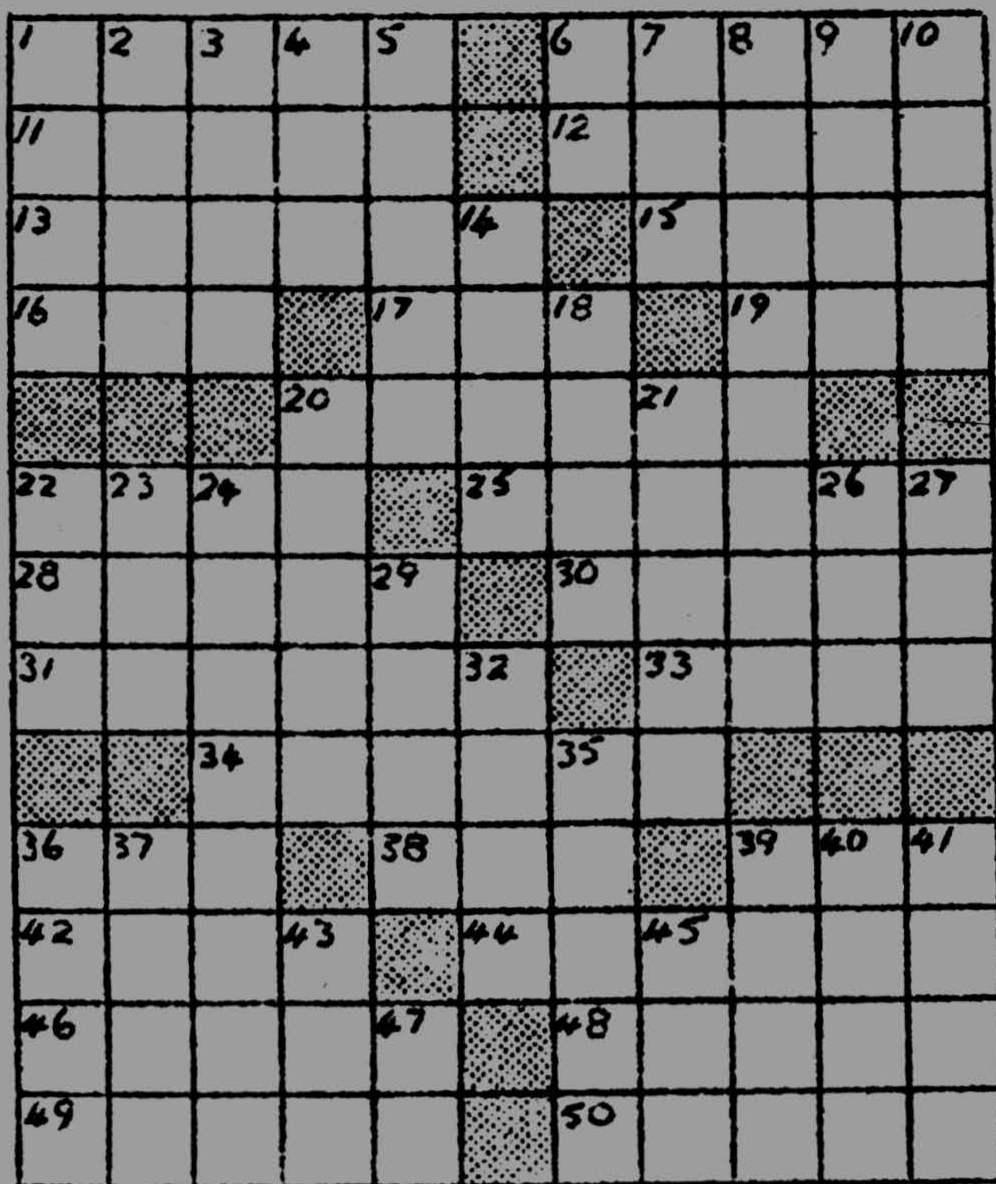

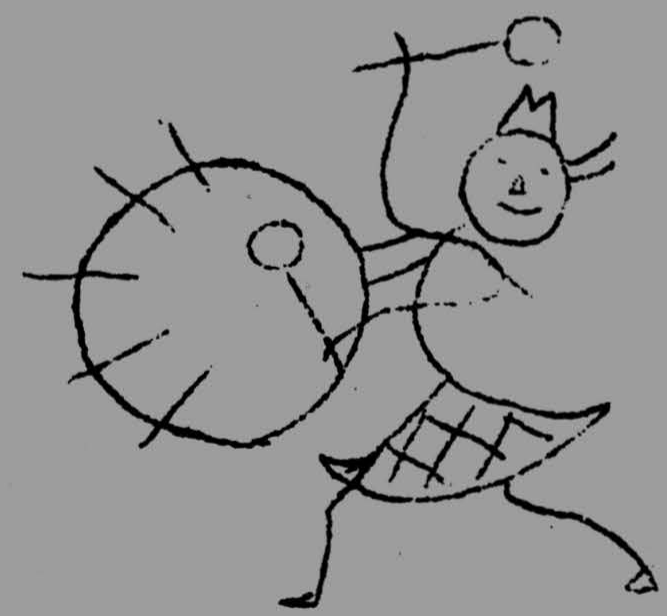

"Here we are again", following as the song we sing, with another edition of the Carol Scout Newsletter, after a lapse of two months.

We are sorry to tell you we have lost our Reporter Mr. Frazer Day, who left Labrador City to take a new Job. We wish him the Best of Luck and Good Fortune. During the period of his stay here he wrote the weekly Newsletter. He also was an experienced Scout Leader and was an Assistant to Mr. Bill Soper of the 2nd. Carol Troop. We will say that our loss is some other Groups gain, for wherever Mr. Day is he surely has found a Scout movement. However, we are going to try and make this Monthly Newsletter as interesting and as informative as possible.

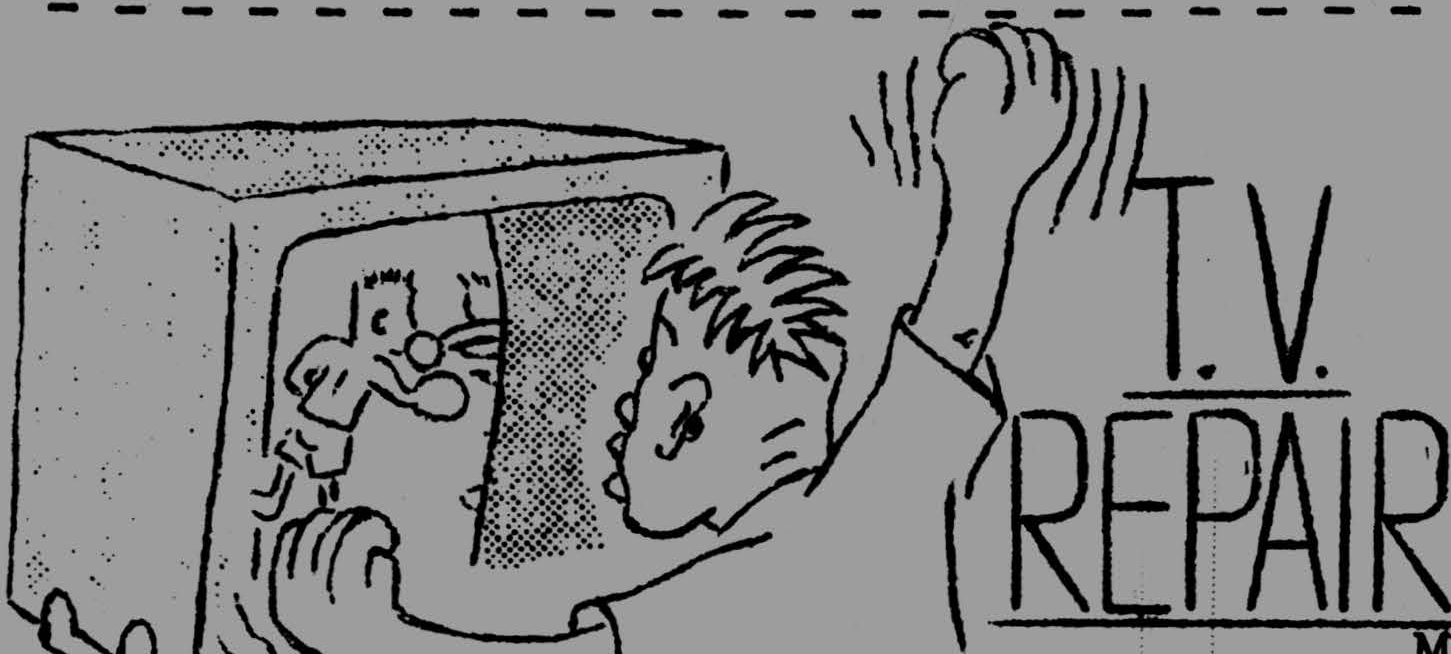
INGREDIENTS.

3-4 oz currants and sultanas
2 oz sugar
 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz yeast
 $\frac{3}{4}$ gill milk and water
1 oz butter or margarine
1 egg
A little melted fat
Sugar glaze.

METHOD

Sieve the flour and salt and
put to warm. Clean the fruit if necessary and mix
it with 2 dsps. sugar. Cream the yeast with 1 tsp.
sugar, mix with the warm liquid, add to one-third
of the flour and set to sponge. Rub the fat into
the rest of the flour, and add remaining sugar.
Gradually beat in the egg, and then the sponged
mixture. Beat thoroughly with the hand and put in
a warm place to rise. When it has doubled its size
knead lightly, roll dough into an oblong, brush with
fat, add fruit and sugar, and roll up. Cut slices 1 inch thick and place close to-
gether in greased straight-sided tin. Prove about 25 minutes. Bake in very hot oven
for 15-20 mins., until well risen and golden. When almost cooked, brush with sugar gla:

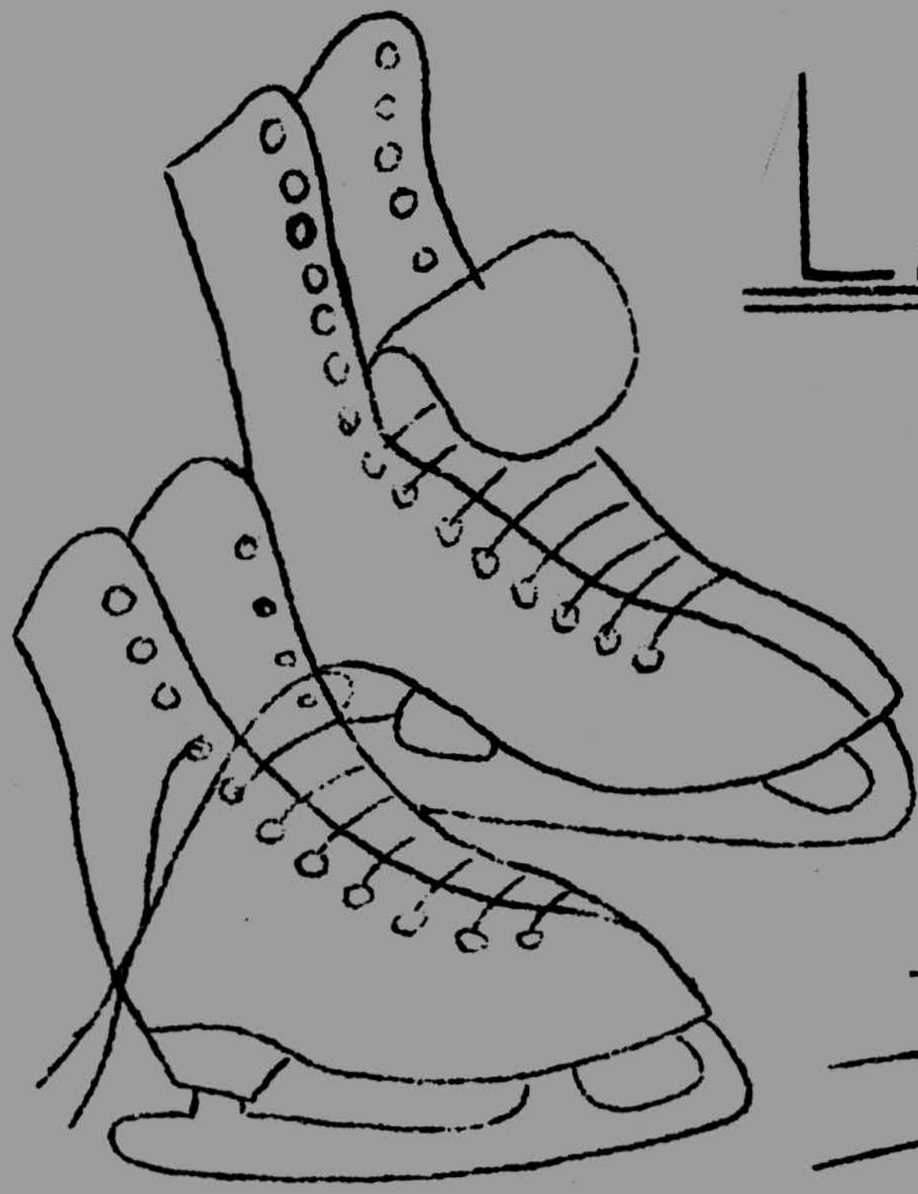

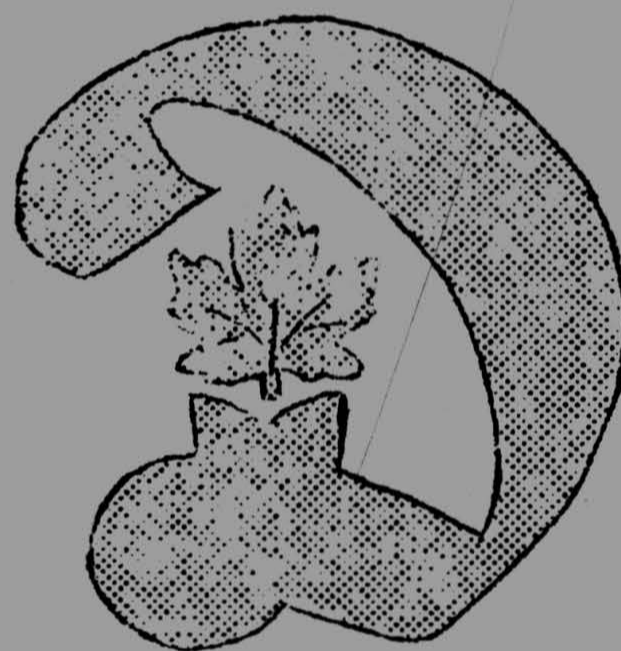
