HAPPY VALLEY ECUMENICAL CONFERENCE

History was made in Labrador last week when thirty-five delegates from five of the church denominations serving this vast area met together for a conference at Happy Valley. Nearly every coastal mission station from Nain to Battle Harbour and along the north shore of the St. Lawrence was represented as well as in the inland towns of Labrador City, Wabush, Schefferville, Churchill Falls, Happy Valley and Northwest River. Churches represented were the Anglican, Moravian, United, Roman Catholic and the Salvation Army. Attending from Wabush and Labrador City were the Revs. O Desmarais, J. Bergeron, E. Snider and L. Whitten.

The Conference was opened with a retreat for delegates led by Bishop Legaré of Schefferville and closed with an ecumenical service of worship open to the public at the Roman Catholic Church in Happy Valley. Preacher for this occasion was the Rev. S.J. Collins of the United Church in Northwest River. Important addresses of "Avenues of Co-operation" and "The Challenge of Labrador" were given by Bishop Seaborn of Newfoundland and Mr. William Rompke, Director of Labrador Affairs at Happy Valley. A panel of church leaders led the delegates in discussion of some of the problems facing the ministry in the twentieth century.

At the conclusion of the two day meeting a joint statement was issued by the representatives of the churches participating in the conference. It was agreed concerning:

1. EDUCATION: That Christian teachers have a vital role to play in our school system and that we have a responsibility to encourage young people in our churches to become teachers.
2. PUBLIC WORSHIP: That the worship of God belongs at the heart of the life of our communities in Labrador and Eastern Quebec and that we desire to work together with community organizations in the scheduling of community events and the times of worship.
3. COMMON ACTION: That action be taken to set up local ecumenical Christian councils consisting of both laymen and clergy to promote joint study and action by the churches in the area of social problems and opportunities.
4. ECUMENICAL WITNESS: That we approach the leaders of the various denominations in Labrador and Eastern Quebec to set aside the Sunday in the Octave of Christian Unity in January each year as Ecumenical Sunday and that we recommend that the evening worship on this Sunday be a joint service with all churches in a community participating together.
5. YOUTH WORK: That we support the Youth program of the International Grenfell Association and call for its extension to the whole of Labrador and Eastern Quebec.

Mr. Bill Rompke was asked to head a committee to look into the possibility of setting up a Youth Camp in Labrador and the Rev. A.B. Legrow, President of Newfoundland Conference of the United Church will initiate a study to see whether an airplane and the services of a pilot could be usefully shared by the various denominations of our region.

It was agreed by all of the delegates attending that the conference had been exceptionally worthwhile in promoting a spirit of fellowship and a desire for common action. An invitation from the Seven Islands delegates to hold a second conference in that community next year was gratefully accepted.

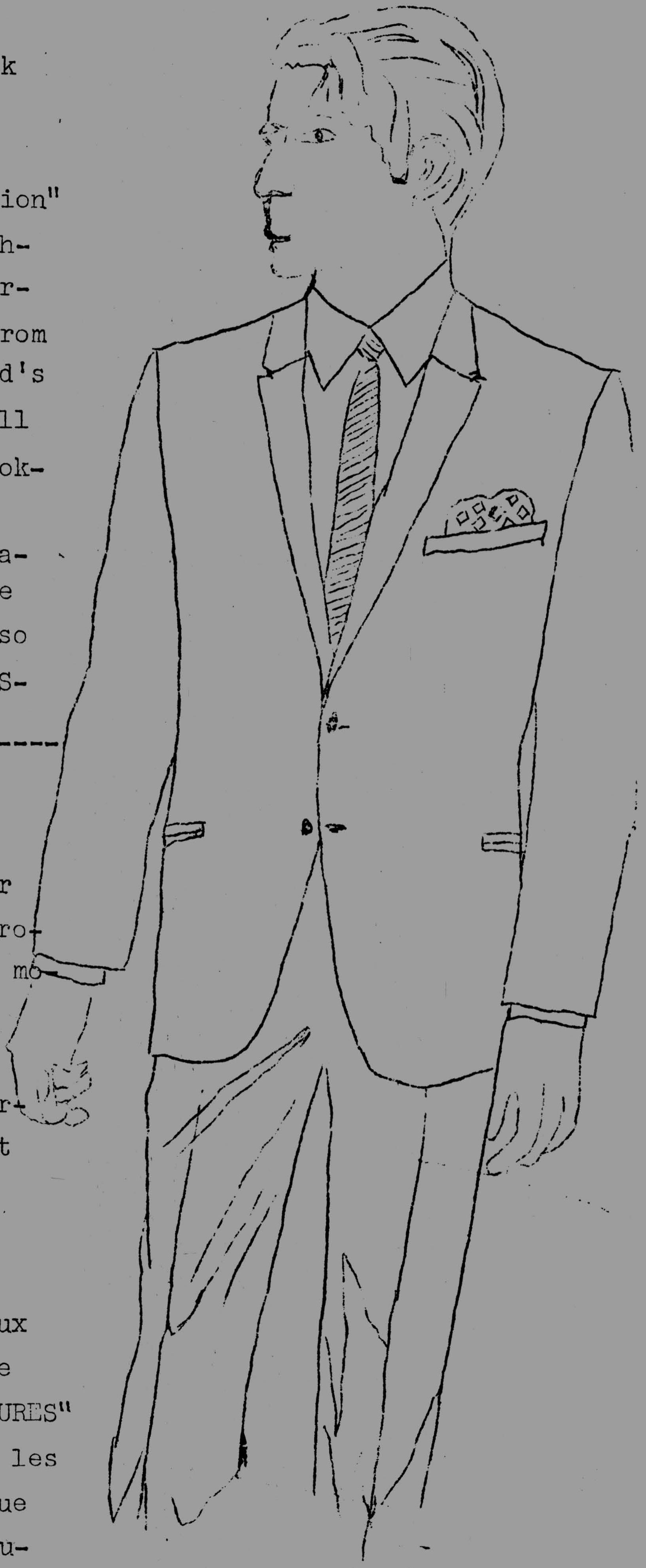

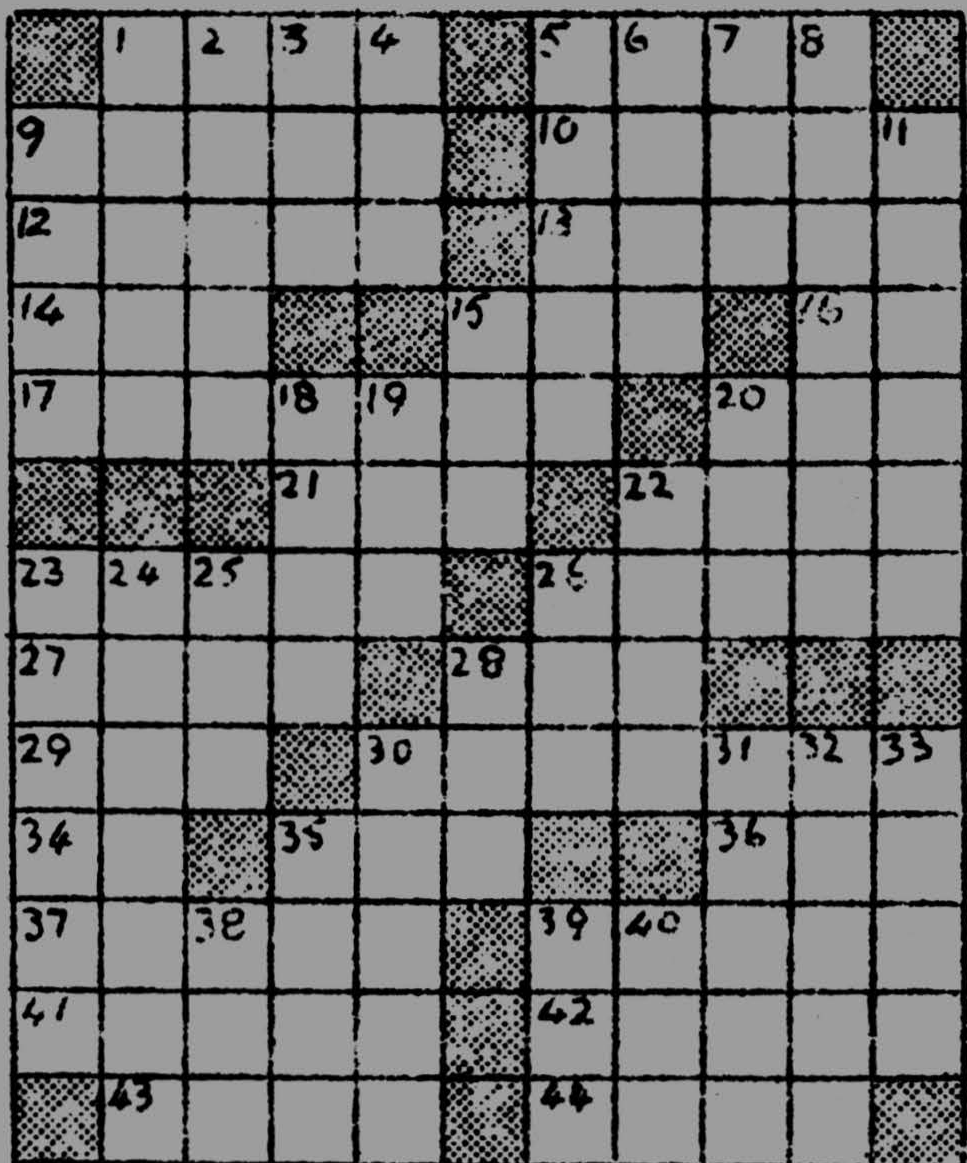

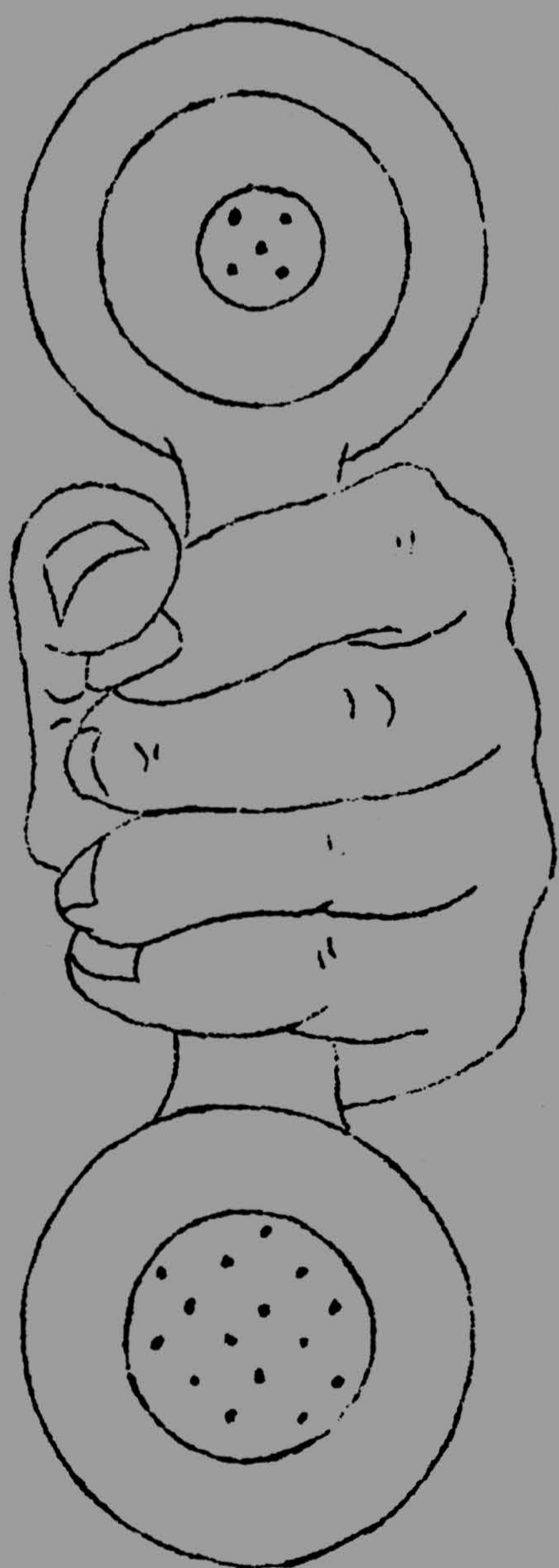

EVENING COURSES FOR CREDIT - PRELIMINARY SURVEY

GENERAL INFORMATION: The M.U.N. Alumni Association, Labrador City/Wabush Branch in conjunction with Memorial University of Nfld; plans to establish a programme of evening courses for credit towards a degree beginning Sept. 1968.

These courses will be given in the conventional manner (that is: using a local lecturer) but final examinations will be set by the University.

Classes will be held Tuesday and Thursday evening from 7:00- 8:20 pm: and from 8:30 - 9:50 pm: Lab. hours where applicable, will be arranged at a later date.

The fee for each course will be in the vicinity of \$70.00 - \$85.00, payable at the registration in September. To be eligible to register for these courses a candidate must meet the entrance requirement of the University.

As there is a minimum enrollment of 20 students required for each course, it is necessary for the Association to have some indication of local interest before making final arrangements for the various courses to be given. Therefore, if you are interested in taking any of the following courses, please call BEFORE MARCH 16th.

TENTATIVE LIST OF THE COURSES:

- ENGLISH 100: (1) Language- instruction in reading and composition
(2) Literature- an introduction to the reading of English Literature.
(3 hrs per week)
- ENGLISH 200: (prerequisite-English 100 or equivalent)
An intensive study of the chief literary kinds through selected examples, read in conjunction with major critical treatises.
(3 hrs per week)
- ENGLISH 320: (prerequisite-English 100 & 200 or equivalent)
Shakespeare-a study of the man, his works, and his times.
(3 hrs per week)
- FRENCH-100: A revision of fundamentals of grammar, practice in phonetics and spoken French, exercises in translation and elementary literary appreciation.
(3 hrs per week)
- FRENCH-200: (prerequisite-French 100 or equivalent)
Exercises in translation, a further course in spoken French, a study of texts and further steps in literary criticism
(3 hrs per week)
- FRENCH-310: (prerequisite-permission of instructor)
An audio-visual course prepared under the auspices of the French Ministry of Education (3 hrs per week)
- HISTORY 106: An introduction to History. An examination of the nature of history and the historian's approach to the study of his subject.
(3 hrs per week)
- HISTORY 322: History of Canada since 1791 (3 hrs per week)
- MATHEMATICS 101: Algebra, Analytical Geometry, and Trigonometry
(3 hrs per week)
- MATHEMATICS 250: (prerequisite Maths. 101 or equivalent)
Basic statistical methods, Frequency distributions, measures of central tendency and dispersion, time series, index numbers, correlation, curve fitting and measurement of statistical significance. (3 hrs per week)
- CHEMISTRY 100: (1) Lectures: The nature of matter, atoms, molecules, chemical bonding in compounds, weight relations in chemical reactions, changes of state, solutions, chemical equilibrium in simpler types of reactions, chemical changes as related to electrical energy. A brief discussion of the principal metals and non-metals, brief introduction to organic chemistry and other topics.
(2) Laboratory- Qualitative and quantitative experiments illustrating the principles discussed in the lectures. Parts of laboratory periods may be used for discussion of problems.
(3 hrs lectures & 3 hrs Lab per week)
- PHYSICS 101: (prerequisite-Maths. 101 which may be read concurrently)
Elementary treatment of mechanics, heat sound, light, magnetism, electricity and atomic physics. Emphasis is placed on the study of physical principles and their application in the solution of simple problems. (3 hrs. lectures & 3 hrs Lab. per week)
- GEOLOGY 101: A survey of all major topics of geology, with emphasis upon the composition, physical development and geological history of the earth. Practical work will include field trips to areas of geological interest nearby.
(3 hrs lectures & 3 hrs. practical work or seminars per week)
- EDUCATION 125: The New Math. - This course is intended for primary and elementary school teachers but might also be of interest to parents.
(3 hrs per week)

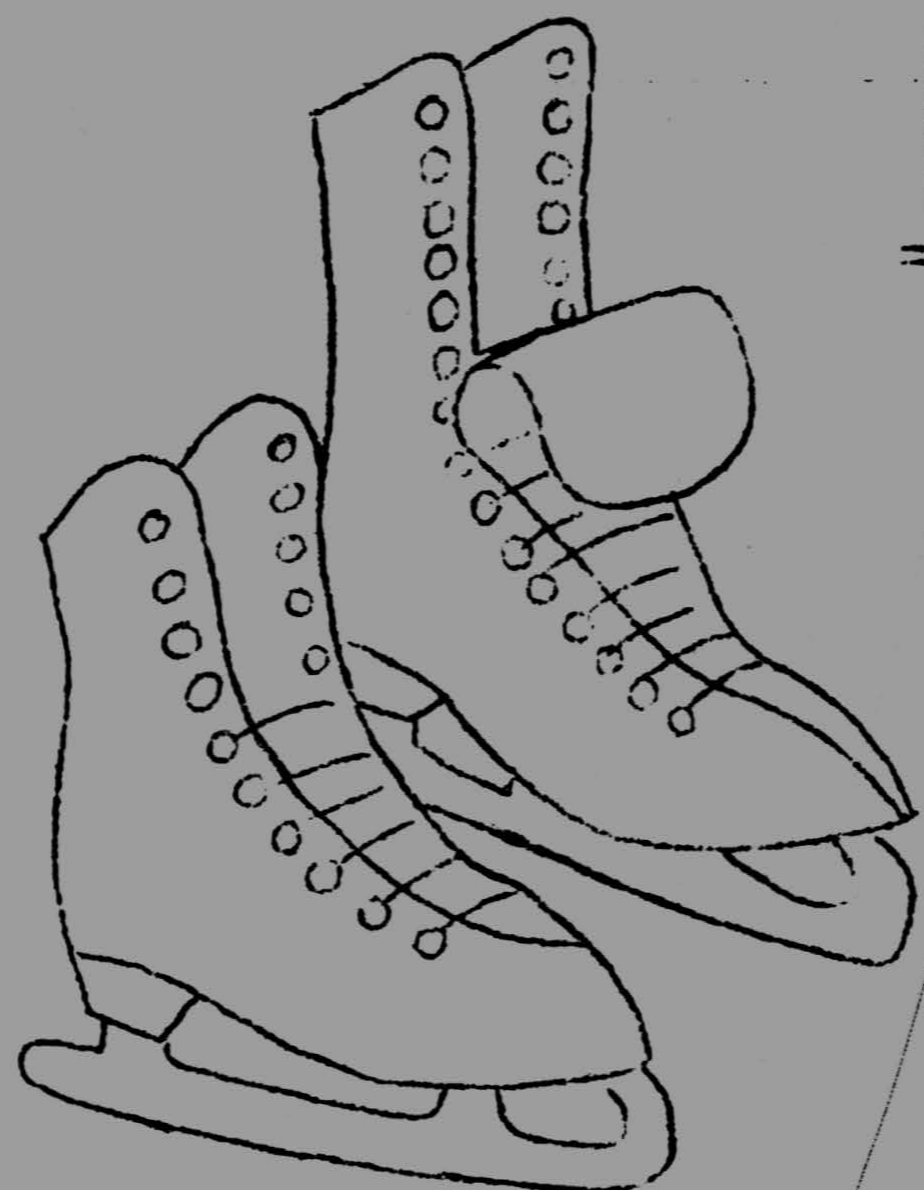

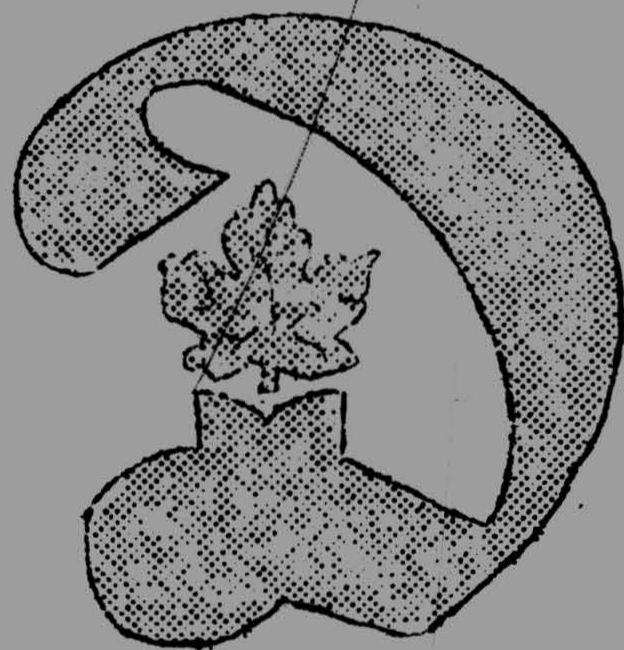

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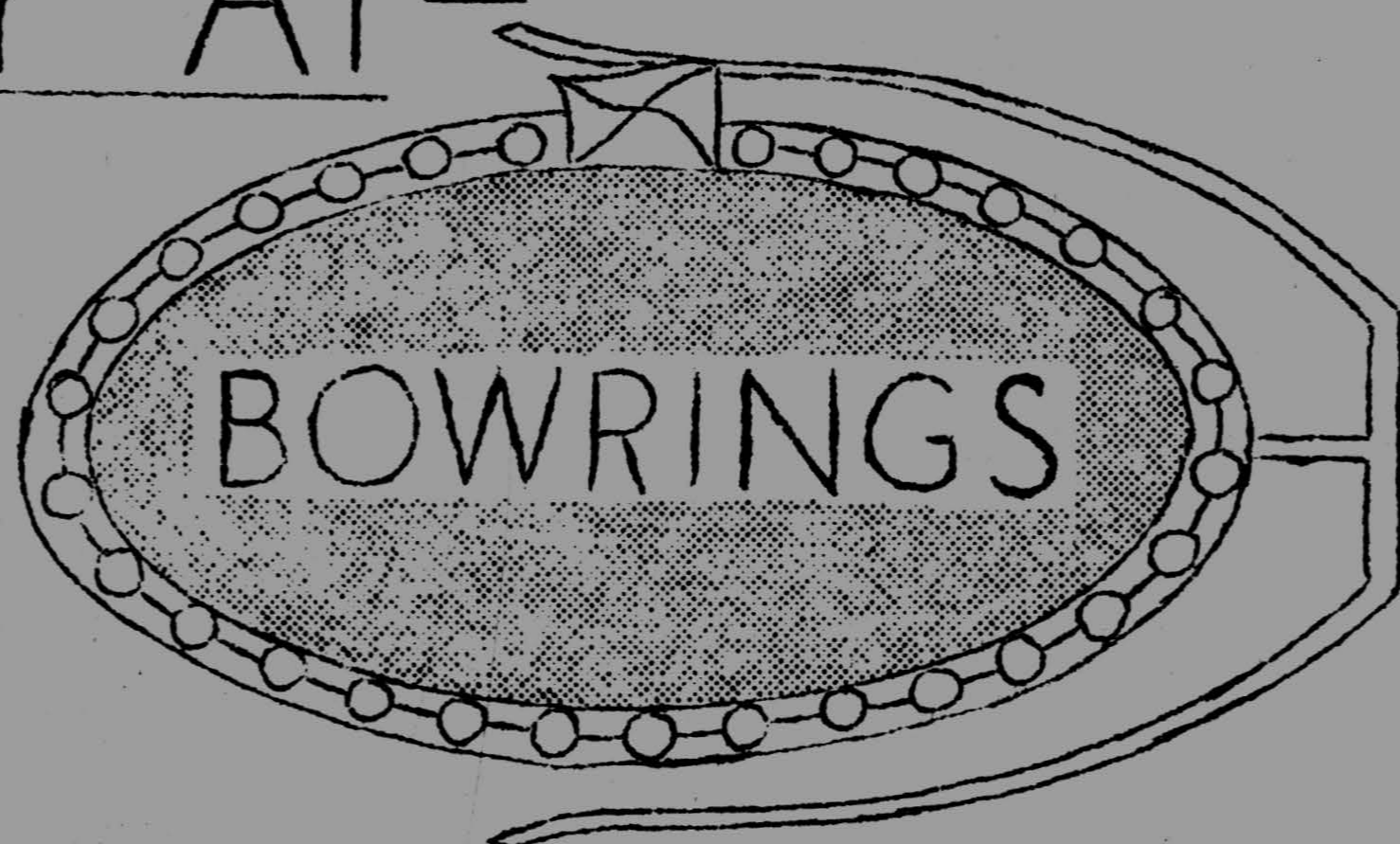
