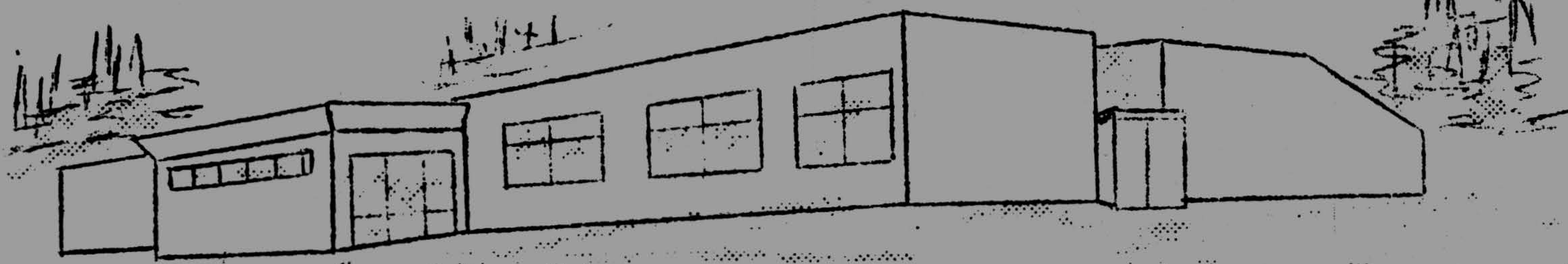

BURNING PERMITS

After April 14th, burning permits will be required by persons lighting outdoor fires, the Honourable C.M. Lane disclosed today.

From April 15th to December 1st., 1968 burning permits are required for any outdoor fires which are lit for such purposes as clearing land or cutting rights-of-way. The only fires allowed without a permit during this period are those used for cooking and obtaining warmth.

Burning permits may be obtained from the Newfoundland Forest Service, Building 951, Pleasantville, St. John's, or from any Forest Ranger Station and also from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.
