EDITORIAL



This coming Friday, March 14th will see our local drama group the Carol Players in their tenth production since the group was formed in the spring of 1963.

The first production - Blithe Spirit by Noel Coward, was staged in the Labrador City Collegiate with Mrs Beverly Cunliffe playing the 'ghostly' part of Elvira. The play was an enormous success and was followed in March, 1965 by Come Blow Your Horn, another hilarious comedy.

In June 1966, a drama workshop sponsored by the Memorial University Alumni Association was held in Labrador City. The Directors were Mrs Jill Snowdon and Terry Mellors of the Memorial University Extension Department, and under their professional tuition - four one-act plays under the title, Faces of Love were presented to appreciative audiences both in Labrador City and Wabush.

Ebb Tide along with She Married Well were the December 1966 productions, followed in the March of '67 by the ever popular Charley's Aunt with Albert Chatwood playing the title roll to perfection. Triangle - as the title suggests was a presentation of three one-act plays, resulting from the second drama workshop under the direction this time of Jill Snowdon and Michael Cook.

Waltz of the Toreadors came out in November 1967 and in May of '68 - three short plays, One Egg, Rough Draft and The Lesson proved quite successful. However, in December 1968 came, in the opinion of many, one of the best productions yet - See How They Run, which had many in the audience aching from laughing and eagerly awaiting the next play.

We are very proud indeed of our Carol Players, who at this very moment are busy perfecting their tenth production The Misunderstanding by Albert Camus; the play they will be taking to the Newfoundland Drama Festival to be held from March 24th to 29th. As a sort of 'peek preview' to the big night, the group will be presenting their festival play in the Labrador City Collegiate on FRIDAY, MARCH 14 and 16 at 8:30 pm. and in the WABUSH RECREATION CENTRE on MARCH 19 at 8:30 pm.

DANCE TEACHER'S REFLECTIONS !

" Wabush? Where's that?" "That's how my colleagues reacted when I mentioned coming up to Wabush to teach some special classes!" said Jacque Foesier, president of the Ontario branch of the Canadian Dance Teachers' Association.

Mr. Foesier was the guest last weekend of Mr & Mrs John Ambler of Wabush; his visit was sponsored by Mrs. Ambler for the purpose of evaluating the progress of her students at the Recreation Centre and also to help make them more aware of dance as an art form that offers a satisfying challenge to children and adults alike.

When asked what benefits can be derived from ballet training Mr. Foesier listed poise and grace of movement and added that progress must be gradual and thorough and is of course in direct proportion to the effort of the student. He was delighted with the keen response of the students in his sessions with them, and left with the hope that this visit may have inspired them to work harder and thus become even more involved and influenced by ballet; he was particularly pleased to note the results achieved in the very short time in which Mrs. Ambler has been working with these students.

BUDGIES

PETS
CORNER

When you are buying a budgie be sure that you are buying a young healthy bird. Here are a few points to note to help you to choose such'a bird.

Look for a bird that still has stripes on the forehead - these are quite obvious in young birds, but as it matures the stripes gradually disappear. Choose a bird that stands erect on the perch, has bright eyes and nostrils that are not wet or swollen. Don't buy a bird that has underdeveloped wing formation - it could have French moult!

It is difficult to distinguish the sex of very young birds because the arc (the growth surrounding the nostrils) is almost always blue in birds under four months of age. As the bird matures the male will develop a dark blue arc, while that of the female will turn brown.

It is advisable for your bird's health, to buy a cage large enough for exercise. This should not be less than twelve inches deep, eighteen inches high and three feet long. Remember - he has to spend his entire life in this cage, so please don't spare the space!

Any of the balanced seed mixtures on the market are adequate for feeding, providing the seed pot is always well filled. Most important of all is FRESH WATER DAILY! Provide grit on the cage floor and a few little toys, mirror, bell and such, without overcrowding him of course.

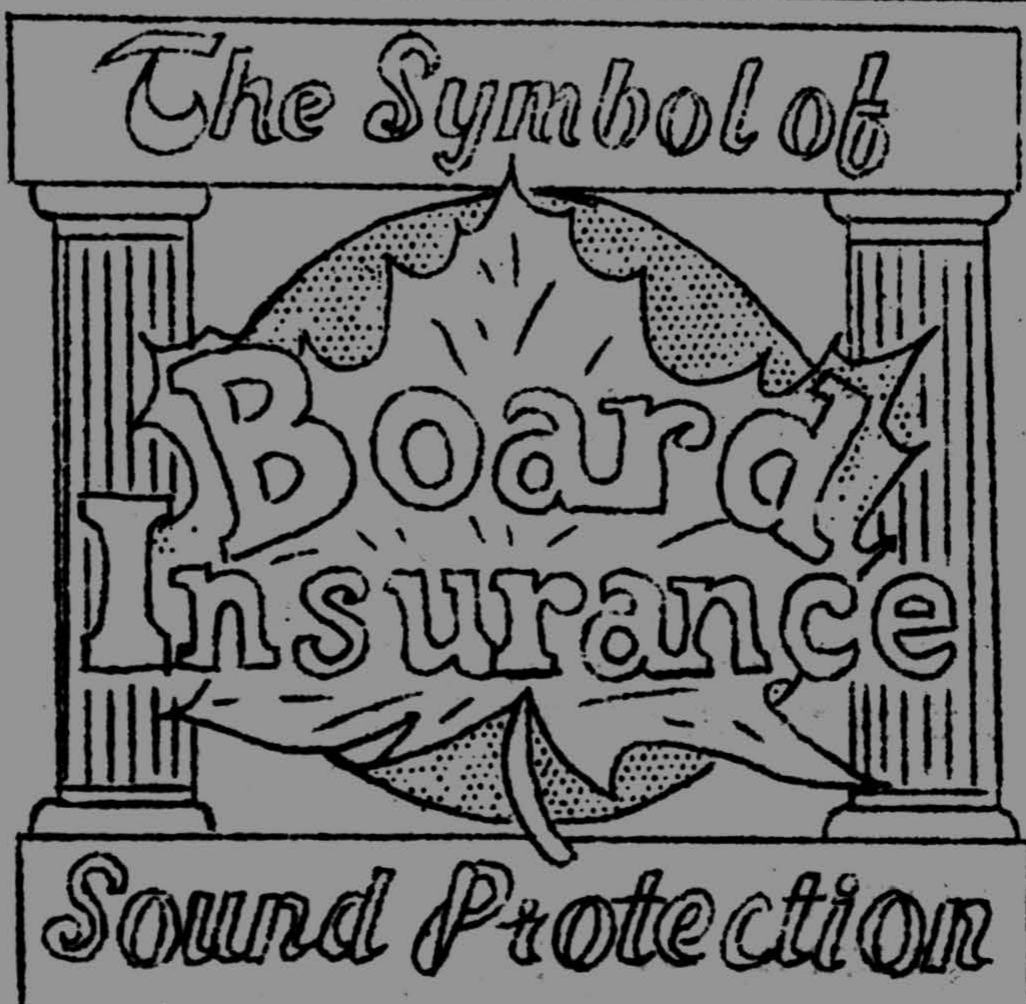
DON JAMIESON TO BECOME RECEIVER-GENERAL

Honourable Don Jamieson, Newfoundland's representative in the federal cabinet, will become the Receiver-General of Canada when legislation introduced in the Commons becomes law. Mr. Jamieson will also be the federal Minister of Supply and Services. Thus replacing his former title Minister of Defence Production. Under the new legislation Mr. Jamieson also assumes responsibility for the Royal Canadian Mint which will become a crown corporation. Other public corporations reporting to the Minister are the Canadian Commercial Corporation which facilitates sales of Canadian goods to foreign governments, Canadian Arsenals Limited which operates plants for the manufacture of small arms and ammunition, Crown Assets Disposal Corporation, the federal government sales agency for surplus property and merchandise, and Canadian Polymer Corporation, one of the world's largest producers of synthetic rubber and related products. Polymer has large plants in Canada and in several foreign countries. It is one of the most profitable publicly owned enterprises.

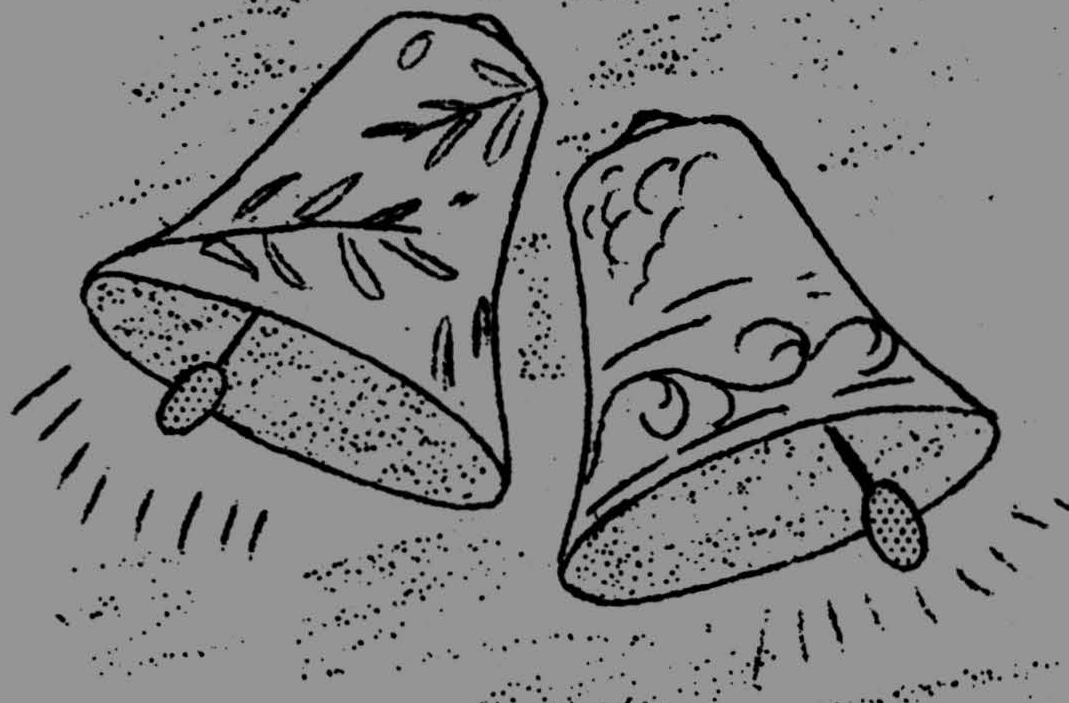
Mr. Jamieson's new Department also becomes responsible for the shipbuilding branch formerly administered by the Department of Transport, and for the Canadian Government Printing Bureau and the Office of the Queen's Printer.

As Receiver-General of Canada and Minister of Supply and Services, Mr. Jamieson is charged with the preparation of the public accounts, the custody of all monies held by the Government of Canada, and the payment of all amounts owed by the Government of Canada. This includes, for example, the issue of all Family Allowance Old Age Pension and federal salary cheques. The Newfoundland Minister is also charged with the provision to all Departments of such services as data processing, management consulting and several designed to improve government efficiency.

Mr. Jamieson's biggest single responsibility is to provide through his new office the sole purchasing agency for all government departments and agencies. (continued)

HONOURABLE DON JAMIESON continued.....

It is estimated that the value of such purchases, including those for defence, will be about a billion and a half dollars annually.

Commenting as the new bill was introduced the Newfoundland Minister said that it will be his aim to employ the best and most efficient business procedures, including the latest methods of data processing to insure that Canadian taxpayers get the best possible value for their money. Mr. Jamieson pointed out that creation of his new department was one of the major recommendations of the Glassco Commission and he agrees with the Commission's belief that many millions of dollars annually can be saved through this new concept of centralization.

- RED CROSS OPERATES UNIQUE SERVICE -

Have you ever heard of "Devon House" and have you wondered what its purpose is? Well, Devon House is what is officially known as the Red Cross Hostel and is a unique service operated by Red Cross in Newfoundland.

It was a "home away from home" for two thousand and seventy-four Newfoundlanders during 1968. These people were awaiting admission to or travelling home from one of the St. John's hospitals. In addition to those who were successful in getting accommodation at the Hostel, over fourteen hundred had to be referred to boarding houses in the city.

The Hostel, which can accommodate thirty-five patients at a time, is one of the twelve programmes of Red Cross in Newfoundland and for which the Society is asking you to give generously during their once a year Campaign.

The women of Newfoundland and Labrador have once again demonstrated their concern for the welfare of others. In 1968, they produced for the Canadian Red Cross Society ten thousand, six hundred and twenty-six thousand swabs and wipes for the Blood Transfusion Service.

The accomplishments of the hundreds of Volunteer members of the Red Cross Women's Work Committees can never be measured by mere statistics. It is impossible to place an estimate on the time and talents of these dedicated workers. It is estimated that each sewn and knitted article produced by the Volunteers has a value at least three times that of the cost of the material.

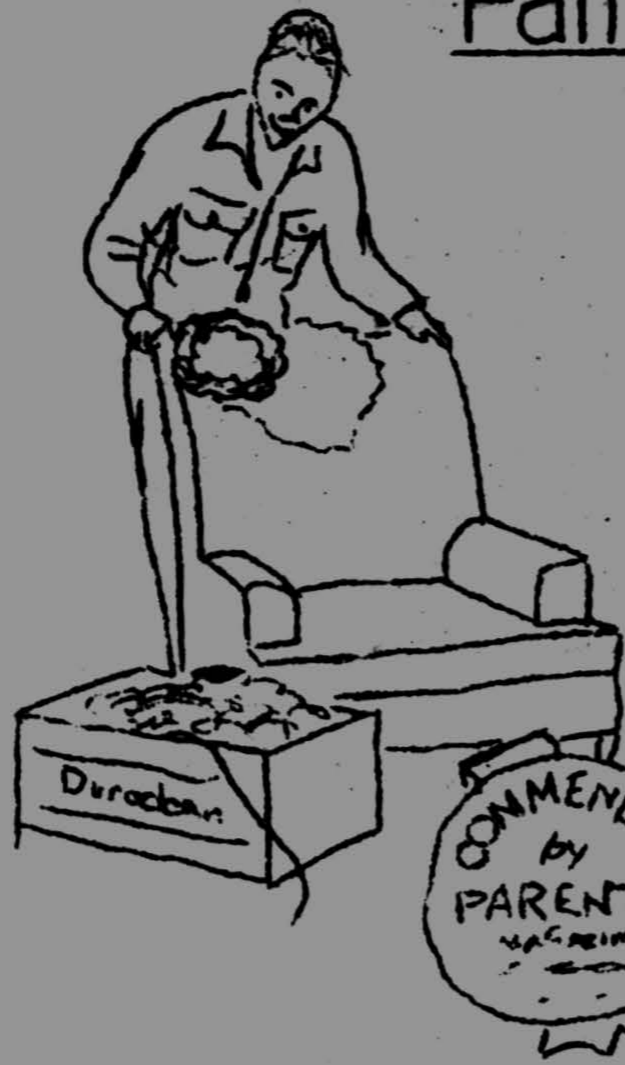

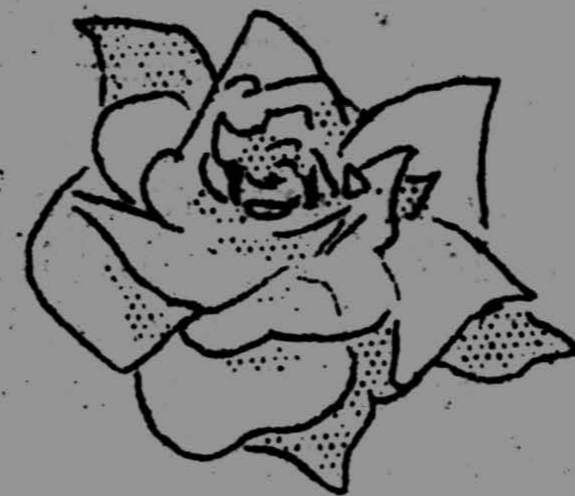

/// LOCAL GIRL BOUND FOR " CROSSROADS AFRICA " ///

MISS YVONNE R. SNELL, daughter of Mr & Mrs Lorne C. Snell, 624 Caribou Crescent, Labrador City, has been accepted to participate in Operation Crossroads Africa, an international program in developing areas of Africa. Miss Snell, presently a Physical Education student at the University of New Brunswick in Fredericton will likely participate in a work camp situation or on a medical team with African students during July and August. As yet, the exact country and duties have not been spelled out.

Miss Snell is one of seventy-five Canadian students and young professionals chosen to participate each summer. Since 1960, over 250 Canadians have participated and Crossroad teams have operated in 36 African countries. The teams typically do construction work, organize activities and live in rural African areas. A number of special projects, such as medical teams also do summer service. The Crossroads projects in Africa are undertaken only at the request of the local African authorities, who in turn encourage village support as well as select the African counterparts participating in the programme.

Operation Crossroads is a private voluntary organization financed by many Canadian organizations and individuals. In all cases, Crossroaders are responsible for financing part of the costs and often find it necessary to seek assistance from their home communities.

Miss Snell is one of two students chosen from among many candidates at U. N. B. She graduated from Labrador City High School in 1966 and expects to complete a Bachelor of Physical Education in May, 1970. She hopes to do graduate work in physical education, with community recreation as her goal.

Miss Snell is the recipient of an Iron Ore Company Scholarship. In 1965 she was one of four Girl Guides chosen to attend Heritage Camp in British Columbia.

AMANDA AMBROSE the well-known and popular entertainer will be giving a concert in the LABRADOR CITY COLLEGIATE at 8:30 pm on MARCH 17, 1969.

Since her arrival in New York City early in 1967, Amanda Ambrose has made news in every phase of the entertainment scene. The versatile singer-pianist made her New York recital debut in April at Carnegie Hall, where the young crowds wouldn't let her off the stage. She gave a dramatic performance in the Shakespeare Festival's "Evening of Poetry and Folk Music of the American Negro" at Delacorte Theatre, where Producer Joseph Papp concluded that among stiff competition, "she stole the show." Amanda, a "radiant personality", has made television appearances on the Merv Griffin show, on a Channel 13 Special and on WOR-TV's new "What's In" program, broadcast from the Bitter End club. She has had enormously successful runs at the New York clubs L'Intrigue and the Wheels (where the New Yorker praised "the kind of electric and eclectic singer cum piano with which we are so rarely blessed anymore") and also at the Cincinnati club, the Living Room, last spring. Equally impressive in recordings, Miss Ambrose's most recent release is "Amanda", on the Dunwich label, and she is scheduled for several more on the new label, BTP Records. Also this fall, this nationally popular entertainer flew to Cincinnati to give a special benefit performance and to the University of Maryland to perform at the National Student Association's Congress of Student Buyers, where she was the only entertainer to be invited to perform twice for the Congress, and first person ever to be named an honorary delegate to the NSA. Under the aegis of Columbia Artists Management, Amanda is about to embark on her first concert tour of the nation's colleges and major concert halls.

Amanda Ambrose is not new to the entertainment world. A native of St. Louis, she first became a musician as organist of the A.M.E. Zion Church. Singing at community dances led to night club engagements, where her sharp wit and talent at the piano, as well as her exciting voice, brought her early success. The nineteen fifties found her first on the West Coast, then in Chicago -- in both places she covered the night club circuit extensively.

Amanda has starred in Chicago productions of Finians Rainbow, Trouble in Tahiti, and West Side Story. She has appeared on the Mike Douglas Show and on CBS.Repertory Workshop.

Since 1963, Miss Ambrose has been performing in nightclubs, colleges and on the stage -- in the midwest and Canada as well as the West Coast. In 1964 she made a cross country tour with Harry Belafonte and in 1965 performed extensively in Germany.

Whether backed up by a jazz trio or on her own with voice and piano, Amanda's style is her own personal blend of blues, jazz, ballads, rock and gospel -- and her own very original blend of song, instrumental arrangement, fresh humor and much soul.

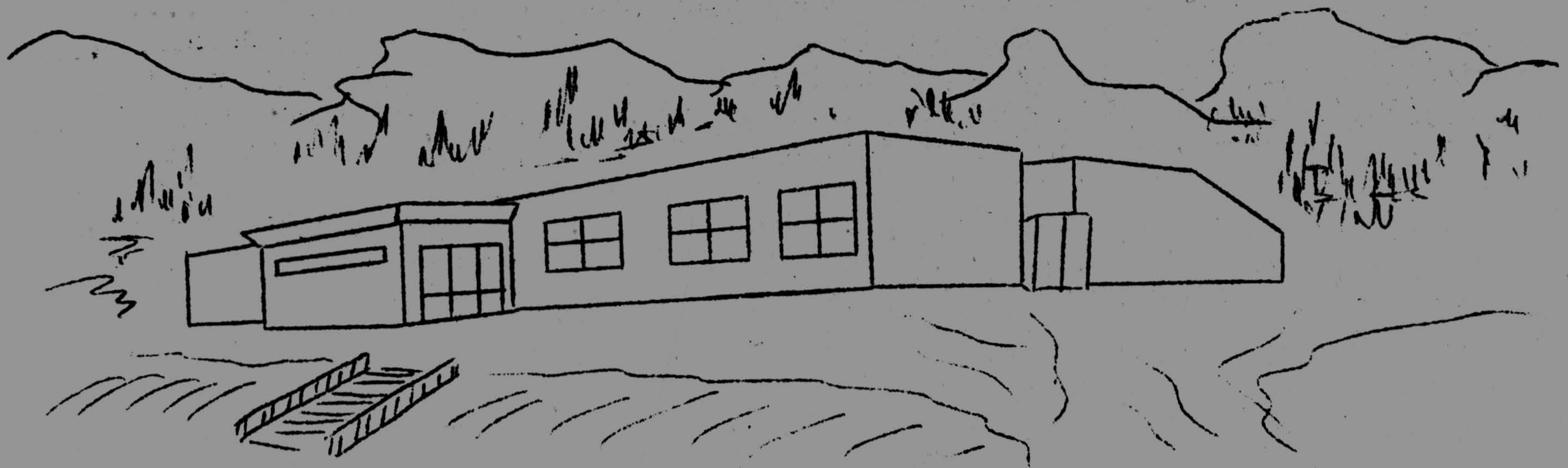

These are the headlines I would like to see in the forthcoming Newfoundland Provincial "A" Pee Wee Tournament to be held in the Labrador City Arena, March 28, 29, 30. When we mention Pee Wee tournaments we should think about the Quebec City tournament which originated in 1960 and considered to be a flash-in-the-pan idea. Since then they have had record crowd attendances and have had in excess of a million spectators in 1968. On Saturday, February 15, 1969, Montreal's forum had a full house of 22,500 spectators for the Montreal vs Boston game. Quebec's colliseum had in excess of 19,000 spectators gathered to watch the 9 - 12 year old Pee Wees play their final games.

What is a Pee Wee tournament? Here are some of the sights I saw whilst attending the 10th Annual Quebec Pee Wee Tournament:

Souvenirs exchanged before the game; players shaking hands without the least rancour at the end of the game. I saw a player in the penalty box wiping the tears from his eyes in fear that his team would lose because of him. There were families and friends who had lost their voices cheering on a team from another town, city or province. There were fifteen players who almost suffocated their goalie in thanking him for his help in winning the game. There was a crowd of 19,000 people cheering the exploits of the stronger team and wishing at the same time that the weaker team would score to win. Fathers sat with pre-school children and boxed lunches watching the games from 8:00 am to 6:00 pm and sometimes later. There were mothers who don't like sport, staying to see their billeted 'son' play hockey, not to mention all those people who 'live' in the arena from 8:00 am to 10:00 pm for eight days and never missing a single game.

A crowd totalling in excess of 19,000 spectators attended for the Pee Wee's final games, many coming at two and three o'clock in the morning to obtain the best seats. This is a Pee Wee tournament!

Goose Bay Labrador

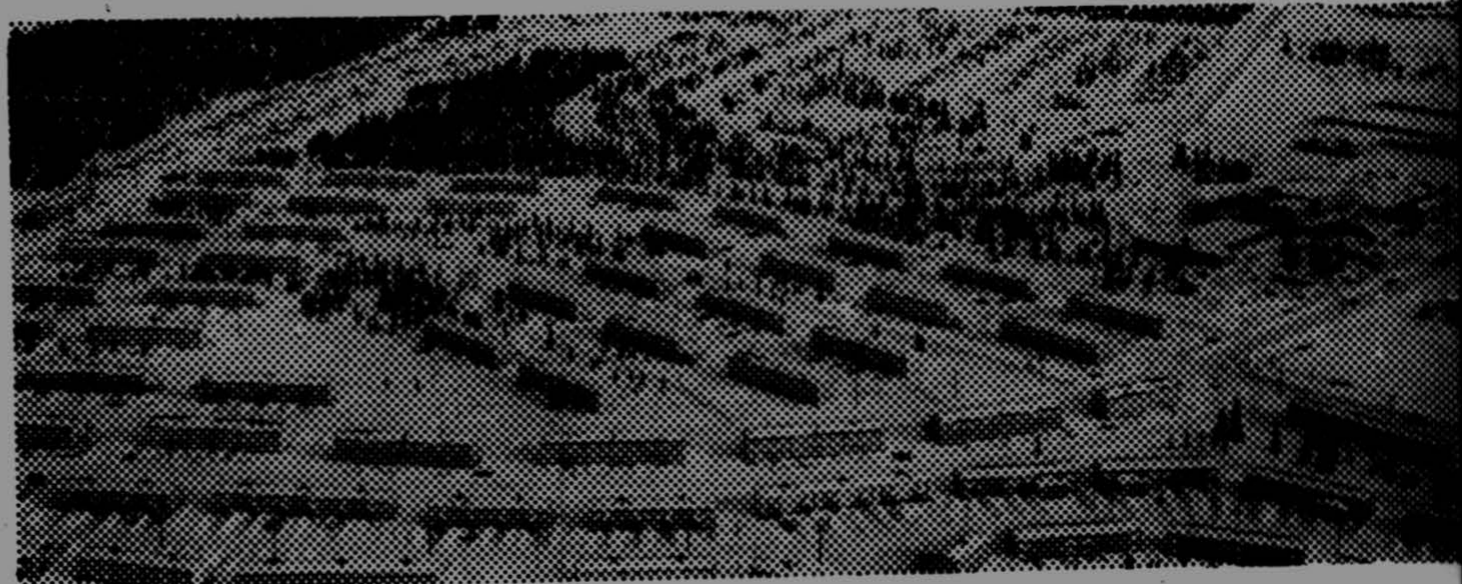
Goose Bay fut découpée d'une pièce dans l'immensité sauvage du nord afin de répondre aux exigences stratégiques de la défense aérienne de l'USAF et de l'ARC. Mais son visage change rapidement et ses activités s'accroissent à un rythme qui justifie plus que jamais son titre de "Porte du Labrador."

Dans l'espace de quelques années, Happy Valley, la compagne urbaine civile du complexe militaire de Goose Bay, est devenue un centre communautaire florissant qui s'industrialise de plus en plus grâce aux efforts de ses citoyens.

Une société de pâte à papier se prépare à construire un moulin à copeaux qui procurera sous peu des emplois permanents aux résidents des deux villes-soeurs, tout en contribuant à l'expansion de l'économie de Terre-Neuve.
