On April 4th, 5th and 6th, we are holding our Annual Invitational Meet, and at the same time our first C.A.S.A. Meet. It was planned earlier to have the C.A.S.A. function last weekend but transportation problems ruled this out and a schedule accompanying this Newsletter will illustrate how your Competition Committee hopes to make the Easter weekend a very memorable and successful event.

To summarize our schedule, please note,

VISITING TEAMS from Sept. Isles, Corner Brook, Schefferville, St. John's, and we hope from Baie Comeau and the Laurentian area will be registering with the Committee as soon as possible after arrival on Thursday.

Local skiers and visitors interested in racing are required to draw positions for their particular events on the evenings preceding the races. That is, Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights are draw nights.

Races get under way each morning at 9:00 a.m. Sharp, break at noon, and finish by 3:30 each afternoon. All racers are reminded that observance of race times is a must if we are to have a successful meet.

Non racers may be interested in lending a hand as officials. Much help is needed and if you have the time and inclination feel free to contact any member of the race committee.

Anyone not participating in the meet either as a racer or official is free to ski at all times but you are asked to respect the courses laid out, avoid going through start or finish gates and bear with the committee from time to time when it is necessary for racers (wearing numbers) to move to the head of the lift lines.

Facilities for spectators on our slopes are not the best but every effort will be made to provide standing space to view the races where practicable.

This will be the biggest event in Smokey Mountain's history, so let's make it successful, enjoyable, and the all-around bang-up weekend our visitors will want to come back to next year.

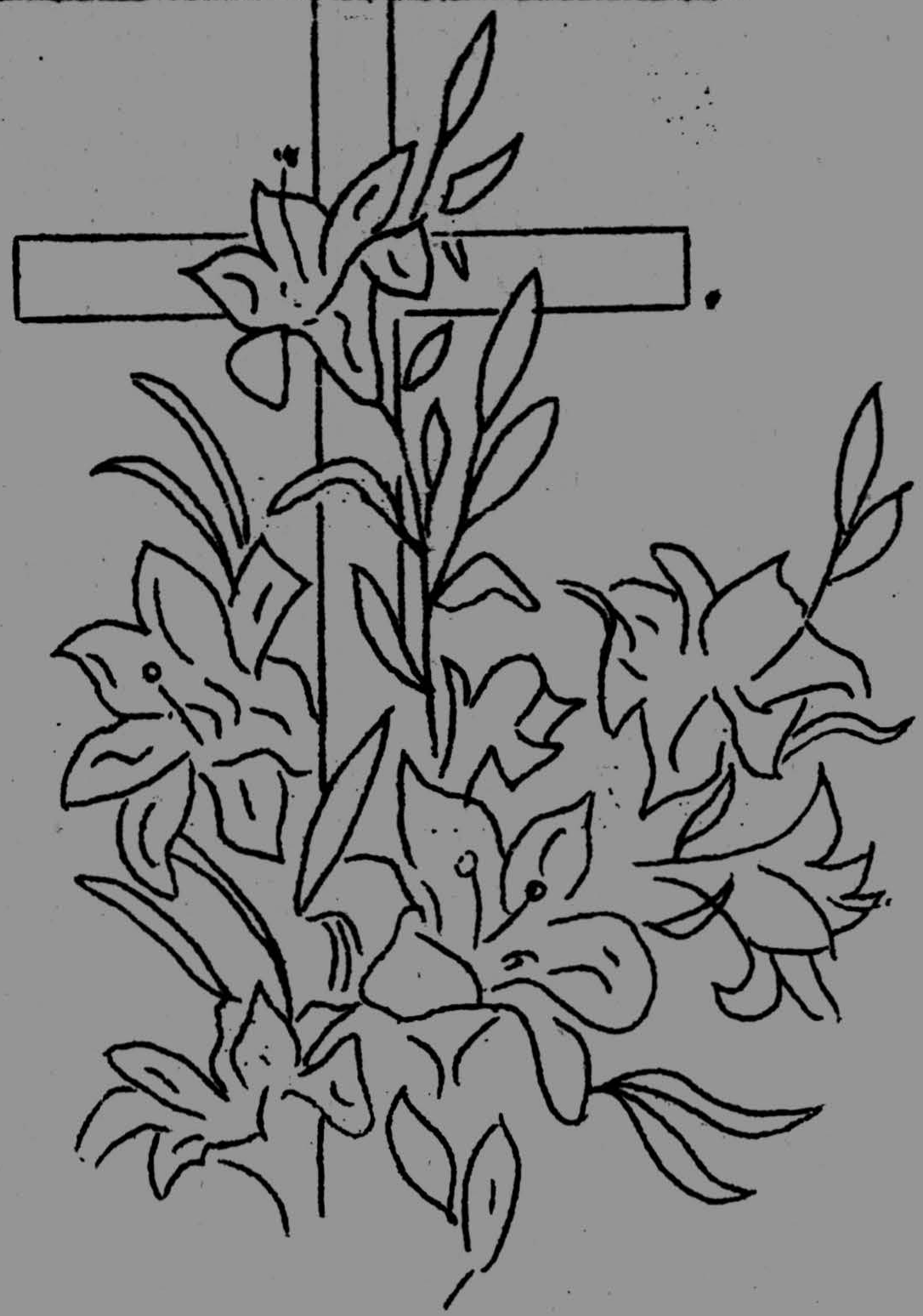

REPORT ON THE FESTIVAL by JEAN FARR.

The Carol Players of Labrador City, of which I am very proud to be a member, took part for the first time in the Regional Drama Festival on March 29th. The play chosen was "The Misunderstanding" by Albert Camus - a modern tragedy.

From the beginning we were well aware that this play was extremely difficult for such inexperienced players such as we, but it was a challenge we took up and we are quite proud of our results.

The adjudicator, M. Jacques Zouvi said that he will never quite understand why we chose this play, as it was wrong for us, but at the same time he felt that our production was a sincere one, and that was more important than the fact that it didn't come off!

The public in general are usually unaware of all the things that go on behind the scenes in such a production. The hours of work entailed, the personal sacrifices - financial and otherwise, the frustrations that often lead to frayed tempers, and, as the time draws nearer, the sleepless nights brought on by worry and doubts. We are very happy with our efforts and we don't feel in the least "put out" with the results.

I feel however, that with a lot more cooperation and help we could have done much better. We are very badly in need of a stage on which to rehearse much more often than once a week, we need also more people to assist in back stage work: electricians, carpenters, painters, sound technicians, costumes, properties and make-up. These people are just as important and sometimes more so than the directors and actors, for without them a production can't go on. It is not all hard work however, it is a lot of fun too, and I think our Carol Players are the nicest and happiest bunch of people one could meet.

One behind-the-scene "act" which at the time seemed tragic, but now quite funny, happened to yours truly. We were short of chairs for our set and so we borrowed two which unfortunately were the wrong colour and had to be painted only half an hour before curtain time. To make a long story short, "Mother" played by me, sat on the wet paint! I couldn't understand why the audience were so restless and it so unnerved me that I skipped quite a few lines, almost passing out backstage afterwards.

I would like to give a personal congrats. to my fellow players on what I consider a good performance, and I'm sure if an award was to be presented for comradeship, understanding, team spirit and friendliness - the Carol Players would most certainly be presented with it.

Our efforts didn't exactly come off unrewarded our wee Dianne (Stokes) got a special award - the adjudicator's personal award for her performance "Very good, imposing on stage, gave a very nice performance - and she is pretty too" was how Jacques Zouvi described our Dianne. So say all of us Dianne - we are proud of you !!!

/// SUCCESSFUL YEAR FOR C.N.I.B. ///

The CNIB Centre at Corner Brook was the scene of the Annual Meeting of the CNIB West Coast Advisory Board on Monday evening March 24th. Among those present were Mr. David Baird, Chairman of the Divisional Board of Management, St. John's, Mr. J.E. Caruk, Divisional Superintendent, Mr. E.P. Coleman, Employment and Rehabilitation Officer, and Mr. C.J. Presado, Supervisor of Catering Services.

The Board reported a successful year. More than 170 blind persons were served through the West Coast Office including 14 new clients registered during this period. 56 new cases were added to the Prevention of Blindness records, making a total of 792 persons now listed in the Prevention Group.

In addition to the above figures, over 1800 children were seen during the Amblyopia Detection Survey in May, 139 of whom were referred for treatment by an oculist.

Only one executive post changed hands as a result of the election of officers. Mr. B.R. Pryde was elected as First Vice-Chairman replacing Mr. H.K. Joyce who has left the Province. Re-elected were H.J. Reader, Honorary Chairman, V.J. Rossiter, Chairman, Reverend R. Campbell, Third Vice-Chairman, J.E. Quinn, Treasurer, and T. Stratton, Secretary.

In addressing the meeting Mr. J.E. Caruk, Superintendent, congratulated the Board for its important work in support of the CNIB service programme. He expressed his pleasure that the third Adjustment to Blindness Course to be given in Newfoundland would be held in Corner Brook in May and June.

In his remarks, Mr. Baird, Divisional Chairman, referred to the future need for more emphasis on prevention of blindness. He said: "The great challenge ahead of CNIB lies in the field of work in prevention of blindness. It is gratifying" he said, "to realize the effect our survey programme has had to date. In the brief 18-month period since our survey programme began, the vision of more than 6,000 children in 13 Newfoundland communities has been tested, and, as a result has brought timely eye treatment for 719 who were found to have defective sight".

The meeting concluded with a film on Rehabilitation of the blind in Newfoundland shown and commented on by Mr. E.P. Coleman CNIB Rehabilitation Officer.

The Labrador City Minor Hockey Association wishes to thank the citizens of Labrador City and Wabush for their attendance at the Pee Wee tournament. The arena manager, Whit Kean reports that the St. John's - Labrador City championship game was a record in paid attendance since the arena's opening. The visiting team's representatives commented on the warm hospitalities extended to them by the twin cities residents and praised the general participation. It was considered by all the centres to be one of the best tournaments.

The tournament was officially opened on Friday, March 28th at 7:30 pm. when Miss Lillian Bouzanne, Director of Labrador Affairs dropped the puck. Guest speakers were Mr. William Campbell, Chairman of the Board of Trustees and also representing the Iron Ore Co. of Canada, Mr. A.J. Rendell, Chairman of the Recreation Commission, Wilson Dutler, Acting Chairman of the N.A.H.A., Minor Hockey Committee, Mr. Rollie Belliveau, Recreation Director, and William West, President of the Labrador City Minor Hockey Association.

TOURNAMENT GAME HIGHLIGHTS

In the championship game St. John's strength showed in the third period when they scored 3 goals to defeat Labrador City 5 - 3, to win the Provincial Pee Wee A. Tournament. Zane Forbes was the 'big gun' for St. John's, receiving a hat trick, Bob O'Neil and Glenn Goss firing singles. John Bullen, Brendan Kerr and Bruce Bullen scored for Labrador City. It was a different game to the fans who saw St. John's defeat Labrador City 3 - 0 just 24 hours previous, when the Caps goalie, David Eaton received the 3rd shut-out of the tournament. Labrador City's goalie, Tony Fifield registered 2 shut-outs, when his team mates plastered Conception Bay South 6 - 0 and Grand Falls 3 - 0.

In the Grand Falls game, Brendan Kerr, Brian Reddick and John Bullen triggered a hat-trick with Paul Sweeney, Brendan Kerr and Ken Rogers registering one each. The game Labrador City had to win in order to place second was played on Sunday afternoon against Gander with Labrador City winning 5 - 2.

All books in the hospital will be catalogued in order to set up a patient library service.

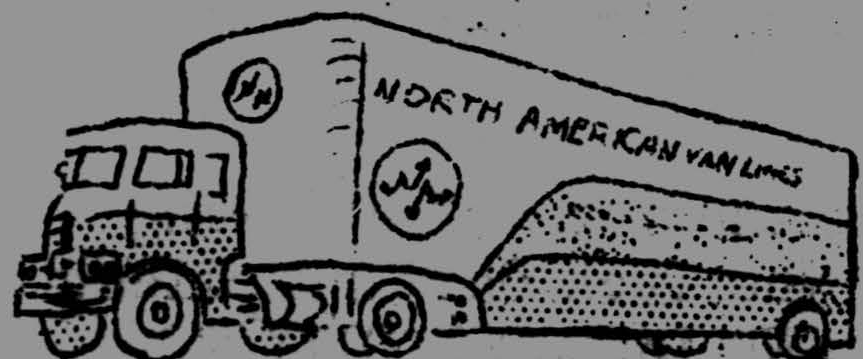

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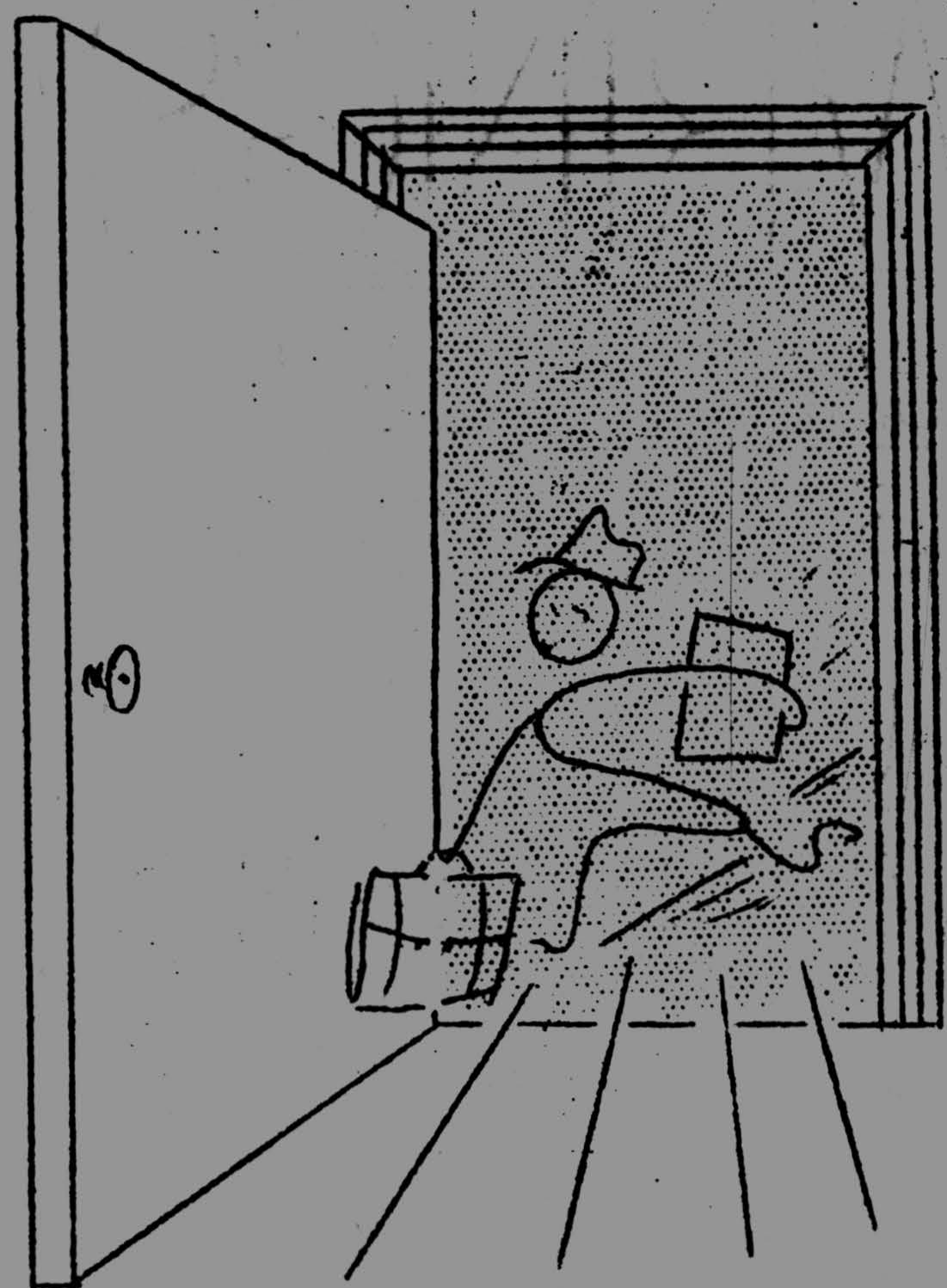
