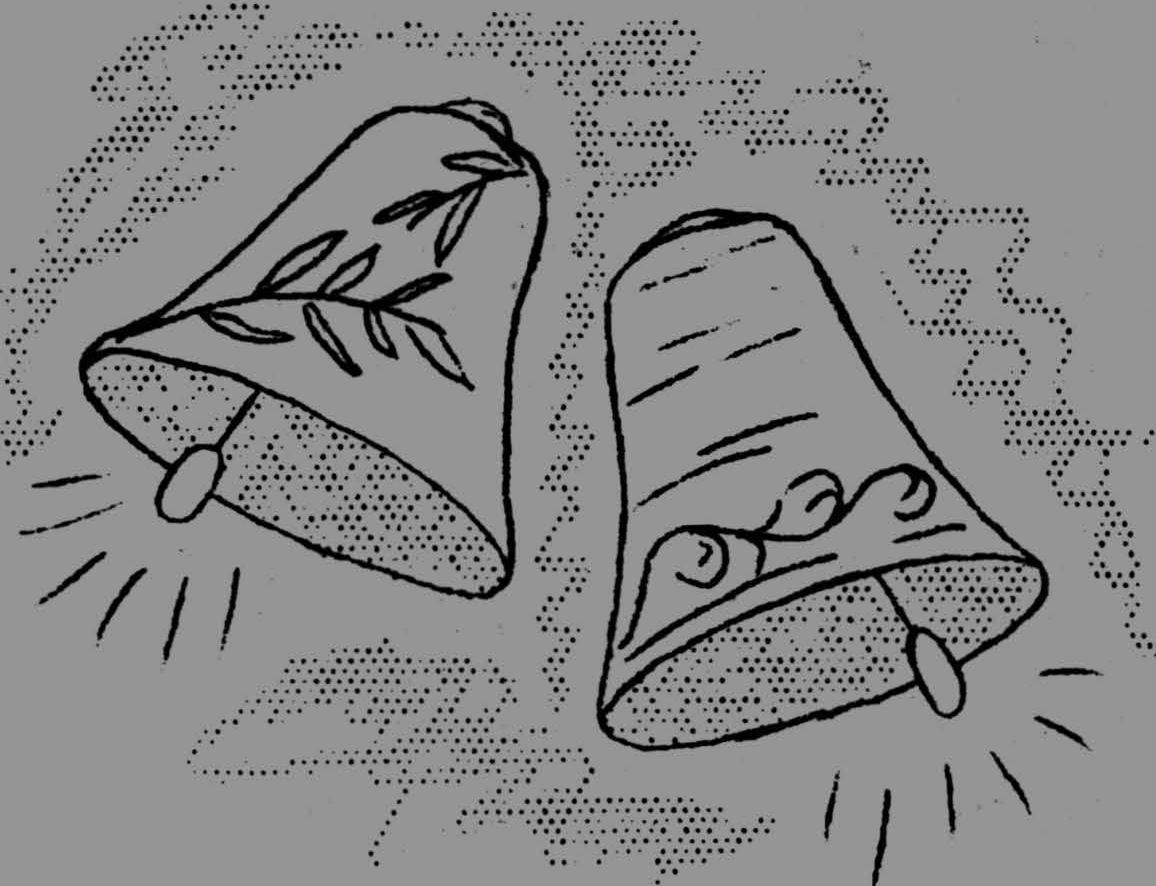
LES ECHO DES ILES

MORE ABOUT FISH by CLIVE CHEN

When you must handle your fish, never do so with dry hands because this will remove their scales. Always either wet your hands or better still - use a net. To prevent your fish from jumping right out of your hands, once you have caught him, pinch the net together - the fish won't mind. In this way he is kept still and therefore will not lose any scales in the mesh of the net.

FOOD: Some of the fried food that you can buy in the stores is quite alright, but, please remember to feed only the amount that the fish can eat at one meal, since the left-overs will go bad and turn the water cloudy and in turn, kill the fish.

If you are going to decorate your aquarium with plants and gravel etc, you should leave a space free from gravel in the front. Put the food into this space so that it can be easily cleaned away. Goldfish like a little meat occasionally, chopped worms - if you can get them, and, if you can afford it, very tiny pieces of beef or liver. Tie these to a piece of cotton for easy removal.

MCP, Newfoundland's new medical care plan started April 1st of this year.

However, in order to make the plan work, the public is requested to register with MCP immediately if they have not already done so.

The only requirement for coverage under MCP is that you must be a resident of Newfoundland (including Labrador). Visitors, tourists and transients are not covered.

Your private insurance plan, if you have one, may have covered all or part of your doctors' bills up to April 1st but since April 1st MCP is the only agency which covers basic doctors' bills and you are no longer covered by your private insurance.

Registration forms are available at doctors' offices, some of the stores in your neighborhood and the post office.

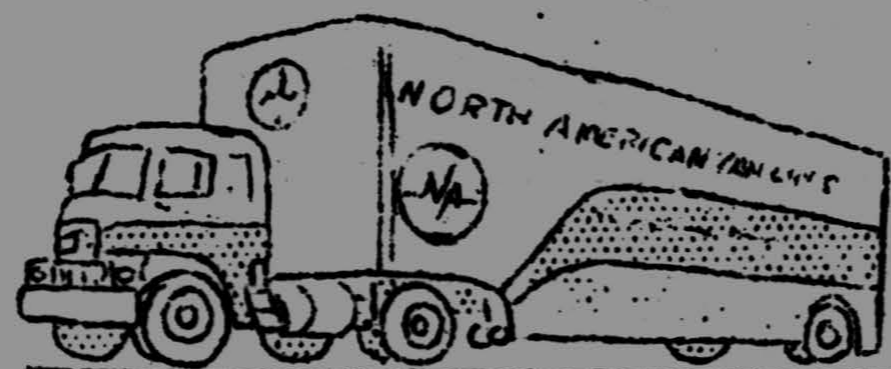

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NATIONAL HOSPITAL WEEK
MAY 11 - , MAY 18

Your hospital is a vital force within the community - not merely a place to be when you are ill. Hence, the slogan for National Hospital Week this year - ' YOUR HOSPITAL; THE PATHWAY TO PROGRESS IN COMMUNITY HEALTH!'

It is less than four years since the Jackman Memorial Hospital opened its doors to receive the first patient. Since that day in September, 1965, considerable progress has been made in widening the area of hospital service to this community. Highlights of the past year's service are varied and interesting.

The provision of a hospital-centred Public Health Nurse is a major step forward in the promotion of better community health by means of education and services. Such work includes Pre-natal classes, Well Baby clinics and Ambliopia clinics (pre-school vision testing in co-operation with the C.N.I.B.). Home visitation is also regularly done.

Hospital facilities are being used by the Red Cross workers to train another class of Red Cross Home Nurses. Provision is also made for graduate Home Nurses to do volunteer work in the hospital to put their training to good use.

Volunteer workers of the Hospital Auxiliary, among other things, assist with clinics whenever there is a need. Also, they regularly visit the Pediatric ward and conduct play groups with the children.

May 12 is the anniversary of Florence Nightingale's birth, and during National Hospital Week tribute is paid to all the members of the hospital team for their faithful service. Some indication of the work which is being done is seen in the following statistics for 1968:-
