/// SIMPLE RECIPES TO CUT OUT & KEEP ///

SANDWICHES

JUNIOR CLUBS: Make these like club sandwiches, but omit the centre slice of toast. Use one of the following combinations:

1. Chicken salad, sliced tomato, crisp bacon, lettuce.
2. Sliced chicken, sliced tomato, lettuce, sliced avocado, French dressing and crisp bacon
3. Tuna salad, Russian dressing, lettuce, sliced hard-cooked egg.
4. Sliced tongue, sliced tomato, mayonnaise or salad dressing or Russian dressing and crisp bacon.
5. Crabmeat salad, lettuce, sliced avocado, crisp bacon
6. Sliced sharp Cheddar cheese, sardines, sliced tomato, lettuce
7. Chicken salad, sliced hard-cooked egg, lettuce, sliced tomato, Thousand Island dressing.
8. Spread toast with mixture of cheese and butter or margarine. Fill with sliced chicken, sliced tomato, crisp bacon.

"MENTAL HEALTH WEEK - GREAT SUCCESS"

In a release, issued recently, Mr. James W. McLoughlan, President, Newfoundland Division of the Canadian Mental Health Association, stated that during Mental Health Week, May 1st to 7th, the Newfoundland Division carried out what Mr. McLoughlan termed, a most successful Educational Campaign, having filled over sixty speaking engagements in various parts of Newfoundland and Labrador.

Mr. McLoughlan said, as a result of the Education Programme, the Newfoundland Division has generated tremendous interest in Mental Health among service clubs, home and school associations, church groups and the general public.

Mr. McLoughlan went on to say, that one of the most successful undertakings of the Newfoundland Division for the month was an open public meeting held at Hotel Newfoundland on May 20th. Special guest speaker for the event was Dr. J. Hoenig, chairman, Department of Psychiatry, Memorial University of Newfoundland.

During the course of the evening, Dr. Hoenig discussed with the panel and general membership, the modern approach to the treatment of Mental Illness and the role that the psychiatric units of the general hospitals could play in the treatment of Mental Illness, if staffed by nurses who have had special psychiatric training.

Dr. Hoenig stressed the need for specialized psychiatric training, especially in the treatment of patients whose physical disabilities have emotional overtones.

Mr. McLoughlan added that the costs incurred by such an educational programme have been tremendous and it is hoped that people who have not contributed to the 1969 Financial Campaign will submit their contributions within the next several days.

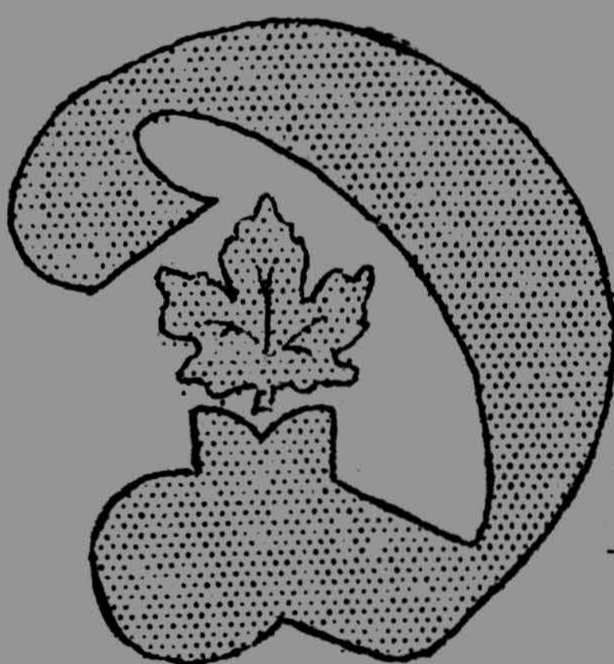
