Little creatures.

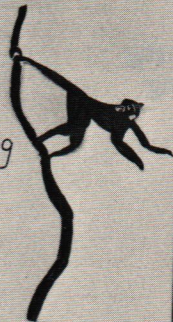

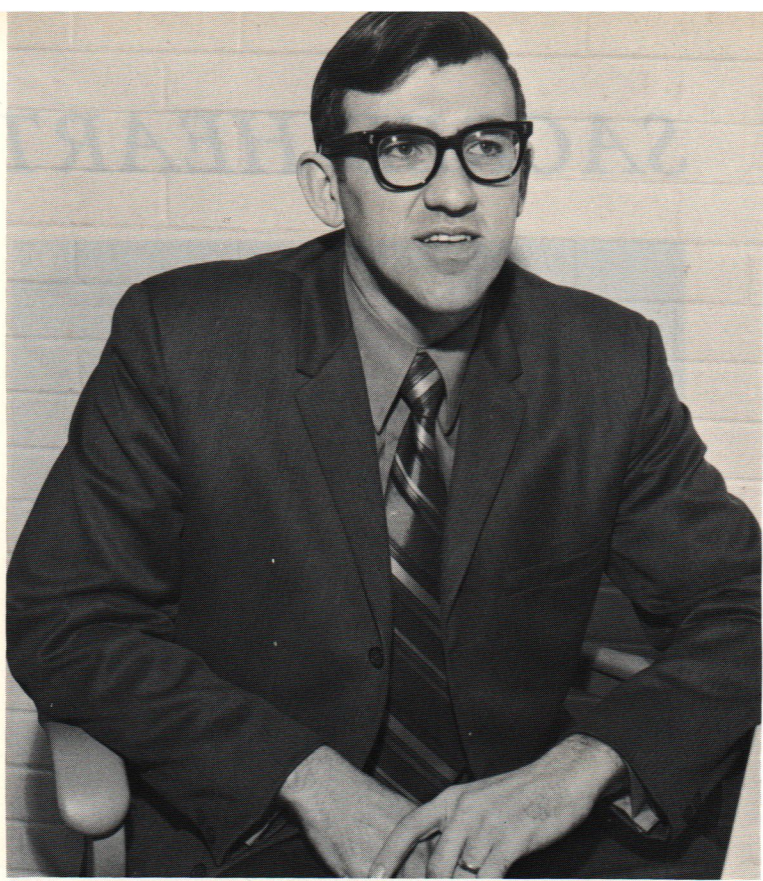
ADMINISTRATION
